

the County of Nottingham and in the Diocese of Southwell, which are comprised within and are bounded by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the New Parish of Saint Christopher, Sneinton, in the said County and Diocese, from the said New Parish of Saint Matthias, Sneinton, at the centre of the bridge which carries the Nottingham Suburban Line of the London and North Eastern Railway across the road called Sneinton Dale, and extending thence northward along the middle of the said line of railway for a distance of $37\frac{1}{2}$ chains or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge which carries Carlton Road across such line of railway, and extending thence north eastward along the middle of Carlton Road for a distance of $3\frac{1}{2}$ chains or thereabouts to its junction with Thorneywood Lane, and extending thence northward along the middle of Thorneywood Lane (thereby following in part the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Saint Matthias, Sneinton, from the said New Parish of Saint Paul, Carlton in the Willows) for a distance of 37 chains or thereabouts to a point opposite to the middle of the course of the proposed new road running into Standhill Road, and extending thence first eastward and then north eastward along the middle of the course of the said proposed new road for a distance of 21 chains or thereabouts to its junction with Standhill Road, and extending thence south eastward along the middle of Standhill Road for a distance of 6 yards or thereabouts to a point opposite to the middle of the footpath leading into Foxhill Road, and extending thence north eastward to and along the middle of such footpath for a distance of 19 chains or thereabouts to its junction with Foxhill Road, and extending thence first eastward and then south eastward along the middle of Foxhill Road for a distance of 26 chains or thereabouts to its junction with the road called First Avenue, and extending thence south westward along the middle of First Avenue for a distance of 8 chains or thereabouts to a point opposite to the middle of the footpath leading into Hooton Road, and extending thence first southward to and along and then south westward along the middle of the last mentioned footpath for a distance of 9 chains or thereabouts to the point where it reaches Hooton Road, and extending thence first south westward and then southward along the middle of Hooton Road for a distance of 7 chains or thereabouts to its junction with the road called Carlton Hill, and extending thence eastward along the middle of Carlton Hill for a distance of $2\frac{1}{2}$ chains or thereabouts to a point due north of the northern end of the fence forming the boundary between the United Methodist Church and the house and premises known as Hawthorn Cottage, and extending thence in a straight line almost due south for a distance of $13\frac{1}{2}$ chains or thereabouts to the point upon the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Saint Paul, Carlton in the Willows, from the said Parish of Colwick where the fence forming the southern boundary of the Carlton Brick Works meets the fence which divides the close numbered 4 upon the Ordnance Survey Map of the Civil Parish of Colwick published in the year 1914 on the scale of 25 inches to a mile and upon the map or plan annexed to this

Scheme from the close numbered 3 upon the same maps, and extending thence southward along the last mentioned fence and along the fences forming the western boundaries of the closes numbered 5 and 11 upon the said maps for a distance in all of 22 chains or thereabouts to the point where the fence forming the western boundary of the said close numbered 11 reaches the middle of the present eastern end of Oakdale Road, and extending thence westward along the middle of Oakdale Road for a distance of $27\frac{1}{2}$ chains or thereabouts to the point where such road meets the road called Sneinton Dale where the boundaries of the said Parish of Colwick, the said New Parish of Saint Christopher, Sneinton, and the said New Parish of Saint Matthias, Sneinton, all meet, and extending thence first westward and then south westward along the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Saint Christopher, Sneinton, from the said New Parish of Saint Matthias, Sneinton (thereby following the middle of Sneinton Dale), for a distance of $39\frac{1}{2}$ chains or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge which carries the said Nottingham Suburban Line of the London and North Eastern Railway across Sneinton Dale, at which point the said imaginary line commenced."

And whereas drafts of the said Scheme have, in accordance with the provisions of the secondly hereinbefore mentioned Act, been transmitted to the Patron and to the Incumbents of the Cures, out of which it is intended that the District recommended in such Scheme to be constituted shall be taken, and such Patrons and Incumbents with the exception hereinafter mentioned have respectively signified their assent to such Scheme:

And whereas the Incumbent of the Rectory of the said Parish of Colwick has offered certain objections to the said Scheme:

And whereas notwithstanding the said objections the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Southwell.
