In pursuance of the Telephone Regulations, 1924, His Majesty's Postmaster General hereby gives notice that the charges for telephonic communication between Great Britain and the United States of America and the Island of Cuba are as specified in the schedule hereto:—

## THE SCHEDULE.

For telephonic communication between any place in Great Britain and any place in the

first American Zone, including the States of Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Connecticut, New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Maryland, Delaware and the District of Columbia:—

First 3 minutes—£15.

Per additional minute or fraction thereof—£5.

For telephonic communication between any place in Great Britain and any place in the second American Zone, including the States of Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Michigan, Wisconsin, Virginia, West Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Kentucky, Tennessee:—

First 3 Minutes—£15 12s. Od.

Per additional minute or fraction thereof—£5 4s. Od.

For telephonic communication between any place in Great Britain and any place in the third American Zone, including the States of Florida, Alabama, Mississippi, Minnesota, North Dakota, South Dakota, Iowa, Nebraska, Missouri, Kansas, Arkansas, Oklahoma, Louisiana:—

First 3 minutes—£16 4s. Od.

Per additional minute or fraction thereof—£5 8s. Od.

For telephonic communication between any place in Great Britain and any place in the fourth American Zone, including the States of Montana, Wyoming, Idaho, Colorado, Utah, New Mexico, Texas:—

First 3 minutes—£16 16s. Od.

Per additional minute or fraction thereof—£5 12s. Od.

For telephonic communication between any place in Great Britain and any place in the fifth American Zone, including the States of Washington, Oregon, California, Nevada, Arizona:—

First 3 minutes—£17 8s. Od.

Per additional minute or fraction thereof—£5 16s. Od.

For telephonic communication between any place in Great Britain and:—

Cuba (Havana)—First 3 minutes £17 8s. Od.

Per additional minute or fraction thereof—£5 16s. Od.

Cuba—(Other places)—First 3 minutes £18 0s. Od.

Per additional minute or fraction thereof—£6 0s. Od.

NOTE.—Calls may be booked either:—

(a) for a specified telephone station, in which case only the telephone number of the Station required should be given, or

(b) for a particular person in which case the name of the person required as well as his usual telephone number, and the name associated with this number in the Telephone Directory, should be given. Where the American telephone number is not known by the caller an effort will be made to trace it, if the name and address of the person required is given. Callers should, if possible, intimate at the time of booking a "particular person" call, the
