

the said New Parish of Delaval from the said New Parish of Cullercoats, Tynemouth, crosses the middle of the Avenue Branch Line of the London and North Eastern Railway, and extending thence first south eastward, then southward and then again south eastward along the middle of the said line of railway for a distance of 74½ chains or thereabouts to its junction with the Newcastle, Tynemouth and Newcastle Line of the same railway, and extending thence south eastward along the middle of the last mentioned line of railway for a distance of 6 chains or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge which carries Coldwell Lane across such line of railway, and extending thence north eastward along the middle of Coldwell Lane and along the middle of the road in continuation thereof which is known as Marine Avenue for a distance in all of 46 chains or thereabouts to its junction with Blyth Road and the road called The Promenade, and extending thence eastward along the middle of The Promenade for a distance of 4 chains or thereabouts to its junction with Watt's Road, and extending thence eastward along the middle of Watt's Road for a distance of 5 chains or thereabouts to its eastern end, and extending thence in a straight line due east to the Sea."

And whereas drafts of the said Scheme have, in accordance with the provisions of the secondly hereinbefore mentioned Act, been transmitted to the Patrons and to the Incumbent of the said New Parish of Cullercoats, Tynemouth, out of which it is intended that the District recommended in such Scheme to be constituted shall be taken, and such Patrons have signified their assent to such Scheme:

And whereas the Incumbent of the said New Parish of Cullercoats, Tynemouth, has offered certain objections to the said Scheme:

And whereas a period of more than one calendar month has elapsed since the transmission of such drafts as aforesaid:

And whereas notwithstanding the said objections the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Newcastle.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the 3rd and 4th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 113, of the Act of the 48th and 49th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 55, and of the

Ecclesiastical Commissioners Measure, 1926, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Scheme bearing date the 28th day of July, 1927, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting in pursuance of the Act of the 3rd and 4th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 113, of the Act of the 48th and 49th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 55, and of the Ecclesiastical Commissioners Measure, 1926, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme for augmenting the incomes of the Archdeaconry of Furness and the Archdeaconry of Westmorland, both in the Diocese of Carlisle:

"Whereas it appears to us to be desirable that the incomes of the said Archdeaconry of Furness and of the said Archdeaconry of Westmorland should be augmented in the manner which is hereinafter recommended and proposed:

"And whereas the grants hereinafter recommended and proposed, together with any existing grant or grants now payable by us in augmentation of the incomes of the said Archdeaconries, will not have the effect of raising the annual incomes provided for such Archdeaconries out of the Common Fund created by the said Act of the 3rd and 4th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 113, beyond the sum of £300 and will not raise the whole incomes of those Archdeaconries, including the income derived from any ecclesiastical office or preferment annexed thereto, beyond the sum of £1,000 per annum:

"Now, therefore, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, with the consent of the Right Reverend Henry Herbert, Bishop of Carlisle (testified by his having signed and sealed this Scheme), humbly recommend and propose that, subject as is hereinafter mentioned, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, be authorised to pay out of the said Common Fund by equal quarterly payments on the first day of January, the first day of April, the first day of July, and the first day of October, or on such other quarterly days as the payments now made by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, in respect of the incomes of the respective Archdeaconries are usually made in every year (first) to the Archdeacon of the said Archdeaconry of Furness and to his successors in the same Archdeaconry a further yearly sum of £170, and (secondly) to the Archdeacon of the said Archdeaconry of Westmorland and to his successors in the same Archdeaconry a further yearly sum of £100, such yearly sums to take effect and be calculated as from the 1st day of January, 1927. Provided always that before any payment in respect of any of the said yearly sums shall be made by us we shall require to be satisfied that the Archdeacon who applies for the same has during the previous 12 calendar months complied with the conditions as to residence which for the time being are required by law.

"And we further recommend and propose that procurations, synodals, visitation fees and induction fees or any of these fees or payments shall no longer be receivable by the Archdeacons of the said Archdeaconries, and
