“ And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of any of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.”

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Hereford.

**WHEREAS** the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the 8th and 9th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 70, of the Act of the 14th and 15th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 97, and of the Act of the 19th and 20th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 55, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Representation, bearing date the 19th day of January, 1928, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

“ We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the 8th and 9th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 70, of the Act of the 14th and 15th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 97, and of the Act of the 19th and 20th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 55, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Representation as to the assignment of a Consolidated Chapelry to the consecrated Church of Saint Augustine, Ipswich, situate partly within the Extra Parochial Place called or known as Purdis Farm and partly within the Extra Parochial Place called or known as Warren House, both in the County of Suffolk and in the Diocese of Saint Edmundsbury and Ipswich:

“ Whereas within the said Extra Parochial Places called or known as Purdis Farm and Warren House and at certain extremities of the New Parish (sometime District) of Saint Bartholomew, Rose Hill, Ipswich, of the Parish of Rushmere Saint Andrew, of the Parish of Kesgrave and of the Extra Parochial Place called or known as Alnesbourn Priory, all in the said County and Diocese which are contiguous one to another, and are described in the Schedule hereunder written, there is

collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such New Parish and Parishes:

“ And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that the said Extra Parochial Places called or known as Purdis Farm and Warren House and the portions hereinbefore mentioned of the said New Parish of Saint Bartholomew, Rose Hill, Ipswich, of the said Parish of Rushmere Saint Andrew, of the said Parish of Kesgrave and of the said Extra Parochial Place called or known as Alnesbourn Priory should be formed into a Consolidated Chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said Church of Saint Augustine, Ipswich, situate as aforesaid:

“ Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Walter Godfrey, Bishop of Saint Edmundsbury and Ipswich, as such Bishop, as the Patron in right of his See as well of the Vicarage of the said New Parish of Saint Bartholomew, Rose Hill, Ipswich, as of the said Parish of Kesgrave and also as having by virtue of his jurisdiction as Ordinary all the rights (if any) of a Patron in the said Extra Parochial Places called or known as Purdis Farm, Warren House and Alnesbourn Priory, and with the consent of the Most Honourable Frederick William Fane, Marquess of Bristol, as the Patron of the Vicarage of the said Parish of Rushmere Saint Andrew (in testimony whereof they the said consenting parties have respectively signed and sealed this Representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that the said Extra Parochial Places called or known as Purdis Farm and Warren House and all those portions hereinbefore mentioned of the said New Parish of Saint Bartholomew, Rose Hill, Ipswich, of the said Parish of Rushmere Saint Andrew, of the said Parish of Kesgrave and of the said Extra Parochial Place called or known as Alnesbourn Priory, which are described in the Schedule hereunder written and which, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one Consolidated Chapelry for the said Church of Saint Augustine, Ipswich, situate as aforesaid, and that the same should be named ‘ The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Augustine, Ipswich.’

“ We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal Wisdom shall seem meet.

“ THE SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

“ The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Augustine, Ipswich, comprising:—

“ All those portions of the New Parish (sometime District) of Saint Bartholomew, Rose Hill, Ipswich, of the Parish of Rushmere Saint Andrew, of the Parish of Kesgrave and of the Extra Parochial Place called or known as Alnesbourn Priory and also all those Extra Parochial Places called or known as Purdis Farm and Warren House, all in the County of Suffolk and in the Diocese of Saint
