And whereas by an Order in Council of the 20th day of December, 1927, Notice of such Representation was given, and it was ordered that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Privy Council on the 31st January next, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, as it is hereby ordered, that no new burial ground shall be opened in the Borough of Cowbridge in the County of Glamorgan save with the previous approval of the Minister of Health, and that burials shall be discontinued therein as follows, viz.:—

COWBRIDGE.—Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of Saint Mary, Cowbridge, and in the Churchyard attached thereto.

(a) In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing in the Churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.
