Notice is hereby given, in pursuance of Section 49 (3) of the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894, that the Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries has made Orders declaring the following places to be free from Foot-and-Mouth Disease.

The whole of the lands and farm buildings known as Long Lane Farm (<i>excluding the meadows known as Soar, Wootton, Twelve Acre Field, Oven Field, Sixteen Acre Field, Six Acre, Fourteen Acre Field and Barn Field</i>), in the occupation of Richard Radford, in the parishes of Kegworth and Lockington, in the administrative county of Leicester. The fields known as Pasture Fields, at Long Lane, in the occupation of George Adkin, in the parish of Kegworth, in the administrative county of Leicester. The lands and buildings known as Blakemere Farm, and the fields known as Happle field and Ellis's field, in the occupation of Thomas Herbert Joshua Grant, and the field at Bakeacre Lane known as Salterway field, in the occupation of G. E. Mathers, and the field known as Applepit field at Bakeacre Lane, in the occupation of E. A. Johnson, all in the parish of Findern, in the administrative county of Derby. The buildings, yards and grass lands at Manor Farm, in the parish of Evington, together with the two grass fields adjoining the north of Stoughton Road, in the parish of Stoughton, in the administrative county of Leicester, all in the occupation of William Parker. The two grass fields in the occupation of George Moore, and the buildings and the field known as Townsend Field, being part of Field Farm, in the occupation of W. E. and J. T. Draycott, all situate in the parish of Rothley, in the administrative county of Leicester. The farm buildings, yards and paddocks, and the field known as Cottage Close Field and the sheep pastures at Carr Lodge Farm, in the occupation of Henry Beastall, in the parish of Loversall, in the administrative county of the West Riding of Yorkshire. The buildings, garden and paddock known as Manor House, in the occupation of Albert Francis Harrison, in the parish of Breaston, in the administrative county of Derby. All the buildings and lands at Highfields, Uttoxeter, in the occupation of William Moss, in the parish of Uttoxeter, in the administrative county of Stafford. All the buildings and lands at Ashencroft Farm, Willstock, in the occupation of Charles Mycock, in the parish of Uttoxeter, in the administrative county of Stafford. The buildings and land known as Upper Loxley Farm, in the occupation of Reginald Charles Whittaker, in the parish of Uttoxeter Rural, in the administrative county of Stafford. The whole of the buildings, yards and lands at Home Farm and the three grass fields known as Birchnalls Fields at Cropston Road, all in the occupation of Fred Hooke, together with the field known as Wadley Field, in the occupation of George H. Palmer, in the parish of Anstey, in the administrative county of Leicester. The field known as Horse Close and Back Field, and the whole of the farm buildings at Top Farm, in the occupation of Mrs. Alice Haxby, in the parish of West Ravendale, in the Parts of Lindsey Division of Lincoln. The field known as the Turnip Field and farm premises known as Church Farm, in the occupation of James B. Robinson, in the parish of North Thoresby, in the Parts of Lindsey Division of Lincoln. The two steadings known as Foxholes Farm, and the pastures known as First Meadow, Second Meadow, Sammy's pastures, the Ridding and the House field, in the occupation of George Bennett, in the parish of Hanbury, in the administrative county of Stafford. The home buildings and fields known as Langley Patch, Windmill Hill Fields, the Pikes, the Orchard and Lea Close, the whole being part of Uplands Farm, in the occupation of T. H. and F. Tomlinson and T. V. Deane, in the parish of Long Whatton, in the administrative county of Leicester. The farm premises, slaughterhouse, yard and Back field at No. 16, Kirkby Woodhouse, and the premises and field known as Smith's Croft, in the occupation of Thomas Voce, in the parish of Kirkby Woodhouse, in the administrative county of Nottingham.
