

Derby, in the said County and Diocese, upon the south by the said Parish of Normanton, upon the south east by the above described portion of the said Parish of Osmaston, upon the north east by the said New Parish of Saint Andrew, Derby, and upon the remaining part of the north west, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Saint Andrew, Derby, from the said New Parish of Saint James the Greater, Derby, at the centre of the bridge which carries Osmaston Road across the Birmingham to Derby Line of the London, Midland and Scottish Railway, and extending thence south westward along the middle of the said line of railway for a distance of 19 chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Saint James the Greater, Derby, from the said New Parish of Saint Thomas, Derby.

" III. And also all that contiguous portion of the said Parish of Normanton which is bounded upon the east by the above described portion of the said Parish of Osmaston, upon the north by the above described portion of the said New Parish of Saint James the Greater, Derby, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the north west, upon the west and upon the south west, by an imaginary line commencing at the point in the middle of the said Birmingham to Derby Line of railway where the boundaries of the said New Parish of Saint Thomas, Derby, the said New Parish of Saint James the Greater, Derby, and the said Parish of Normanton all meet, and extending thence south westward along the middle of the said line of railway for a distance of 17 chains or thereabouts to its junction with the Derby and Melbourne Line of the said London, Midland and Scottish Railway, and extending thence first south westward and then southward and then south eastward along the middle of the last mentioned line of railway for a distance of 57 chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said Parish of Normanton from the said Parish of Osmaston."

And whereas the said Representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Derby.

WHEREAS the Minister of Health, after giving to the Incumbent and Churchwardens of the Parish of East Stockwith, in the Parts of Lindsey, in the County of

Lincoln, 10 days' previous notice of his intention in that behalf, has, under the provisions of the Burial Act, 1853, as amended by subsequent enactments, made a Representation to His Majesty in Council that for the protection of the Public Health, the opening of any new burial ground in the Civil Parish of East Stockwith, in the said County of Lincoln, save with the previous approval of the Minister of Health, should be prohibited, and that burials should be discontinued therein as hereinafter directed:

And whereas by an Order in Council of the 22nd March, 1928, Notice of such Representation was given, and it was ordered that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Privy Council on the 3rd day of May next, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, as it is hereby ordered, that no new burial ground shall be opened in the said Civil Parish of East Stockwith save with the previous approval of the Minister of Health, and that burials shall be discontinued therein as follows, viz. :—

EAST STOCKWITH. — Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of Saint Peter, East Stockwith, and in the Churchyard attached thereto.

THE SAFEGUARDING OF INDUSTRIES (EXEMPTION)
No. 3 ORDER, 1928, DATED 11TH MAY, 1928,
MADE BY THE TREASURY UNDER SECTION 10 OF
THE FINANCE ACT, 1926 (16 & 17 GEO. V,
c. 22).

Whereas it is provided by sub-section (5) of Section 10 of the Finance Act, 1926 (16 & 17 Geo. V, c. 22), that the Treasury may by order exempt from the duty imposed by Section one of the Safeguarding of Industries Act, 1921 (11 & 12 Geo. V, c. 47), as amended by the Finance Act, 1926, for such period as may be specified in the Order, any article in respect of which the Board of Trade are satisfied on a representation made by a consumer of that article that the article is not made in any part of His Majesty's Dominions in quantities which are substantial having regard to the consumption of that article for the time being in the United Kingdom and that there is no reasonable probability that the article will within a reasonable period be made in His Majesty's Dominions in such substantial quantities:
