At the Court at *Buckingham Palace*, the 1st day of *November*, 1928.

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the 22nd day of October, 1928, (C.W. 5650/28), in the words following, viz. :—

“Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that all pay, pensions, or other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being or having been an Officer, Seaman, or Marine therein, or to the widow or any relative of a deceased Officer, Seaman or Marine, shall be paid in such manner, and subject to such restrictions, conditions and provisions as are from time to time directed by Order in Council:

“And whereas, under various Orders in Council, provision is made for the payment of gratuities to Officers of Your Majesty's Naval and Marine Forces on retirement or discharge, and of allowances to the children and brothers and sisters of deceased Officers:

“And whereas we consider it undesirable, as a general rule, that these gratuities and allowances should be paid direct to persons under the age of 21 years:

“We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to authorize us, at our

discretion, to pay such gratuities and allowances to the parent or guardian of the Officer or child, or to such other person as we may think fit.”

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS by virtue of Section 10 of the Welsh Church Act, 1914, and the Orders in Council made thereunder, the powers of the Commissioners of Church Temporalities in Wales were to continue until the end of the year 1919:

And whereas by Section 1 of the Welsh Church (Temporalities) Act, 1919, it was provided that His Majesty in Council might on the application of the said Commissioners suspend the dissolution of the said Commissioners, and, subject to revision by the Treasury of the salaries of the said Commissioners, and the remuneration and number of their officers, continue their powers for such time as His Majesty thinks fit:
