

The Prince of Wales, K.G., K.T., K.P., G.C.S.I., G.C.M.G., G.C.I.E., G.C.V.O., G.B.E., His Royal Highness The Duke of York, K.G., K.T., G.C.M.G., G.C.V.O., the Most Reverend Father in God Cosmo Gordon, Archbishop of Canterbury, the Right Honourable Douglas McGarel, Baron Hailsham, Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and the Right Honourable Stanley Baldwin, Prime Minister and First Lord of the Treasury, or any three of them, during His Majesty's illness, to summon and hold on His Majesty's behalf His Privy Council, and to signify thereat His Majesty's approval of any matter or thing to which His Majesty's approval in Council is required:

And whereas by an Order in Council of the 9th day of September, 1884, made under the provisions of the Burial Act, 1853, it was ordered that burials, except as otherwise provided, in (amongst other places) the Parish of Barking, in the County of Essex, should be discontinued as follows, viz. :—

Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of Barking, in the County of Essex, and also in the Churchyard:

And whereas by the Burial Act, 1855, it is, amongst other things, provided that it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, from time to time to vary any Order in Council made under the Burial Act, 1853, as to His Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, may seem fit:

And whereas by Orders in Council of the 5th day of March, 1885, the 29th day of December, 1885, and the 26th day of June, 1886, the time for discontinuance of burials in the said Parish Church and Churchyard was postponed until the 1st day of October, 1886:

And whereas the Minister of Health, after giving to the Incumbent and the Churchwardens of the said Parish of Barking ten days' previous notice of his intention in that behalf, has made a Representation to His Majesty in Council that, for reasons of public health, so much of the said Order in Council of the 9th day of September, 1884, as relates to burials in the Parish of Barking aforesaid, should be varied as hereinafter directed:

And whereas by an Order in Council of the 21st December, 1928, Notice of such Representation was given, and it was ordered that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Privy Council on the 31st January, 1929, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed as required by the Burial Act, 1853:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty The Queen, His Royal Highness The Prince of Wales, His Royal Highness The Duke of York, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and the Prime Minister and First Lord of the Treasury, being authorised thereto by His Majesty's said commission in pursuance of the said Acts of Parliament and of all other powers enabling them in that behalf, by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, on His Majesty's behalf are pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered that so much of the said Order in Council of the 9th September, 1884, as relates to burials in the Parish of Barking aforesaid shall be varied,

so as to provide that except as hereinafter provided burials shall be discontinued in the Parish of Barking as follows, viz. :—

BARKING.—Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of Saint Margaret and in the Churchyard attached thereto:

Provided that:—

(a) In the walled grave now existing in the said Churchyard in which the remains of Richard Louth are interred, the burial may be allowed at her decease of the body of Louisa Louth, subject to the condition that the coffin be separately enclosed by brickwork or stonework properly cemented.

(b) In earthen graves, now existing in the said Churchyard, the burials may be allowed at their decease of the following relations of those already interred therein—Clara Ann Carter, Kate Ford, Rebecca Jackson, Fanny Pearson, Caroline Porter, Sarah Rayment, Arthur Isaac Wiseman, Sarah Matilda Wiseman, Harriet Wiseman, Jacob Wiseman, and Walter Frederick Wiseman, provided that the coffins can be deposited at or below the depth of five feet from the surface of the ground without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains.

TENDERS FOR TREASURY BILLS.

1. The Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury hereby give notice that Tenders will be received at the Chief Cashier's Office, at the Bank of England, on Friday, the 22nd February, 1929, at 1 o'clock, for Treasury Bills to be issued under the Treasury Bills Act, 1877, the National Debt Act, 1889, and the War Loan Acts, 1914-1919, to the amount of £30,000,000.

2. The Bills will be in amounts of £5,000 or £10,000. They will be dated at the option of the Tenderer on any business day from Monday, the 25th February, 1929, to Saturday, the 2nd March, 1929, inclusive, and will be payable at three months after date.

3. The Bills will be issued and paid at the Bank of England.

4. Each tender must be for an amount not less than £50,000, and must specify the date on which the Bills required are to be dated, and the net amount per cent. (being an even multiple of one penny) which will be given for the amount applied for. Separate Tenders must be lodged for Bills of different dates.

5. Tenders must be made through a London Banker, Discount House or Broker.

6. The persons whose Tenders are accepted will be informed of the same not later than the following day, and payment in full of the amounts of the accepted tenders must be made to the Bank of England by means of Cash or a Banker's Draft on the Bank of England not later than 2 o'clock (Saturday 12 o'clock) on the day on which the relative Bills are to be dated.
