WHEREAS His Majesty was pleased by His Commission dated the 4th day of December, 1928, to nominate and appoint Her Majesty The Queen, His Royal Highness The Prince of Wales, K.G., K.T., K.P., G.C.S.I., G.C.M.G., G.C.I.E., G.C.V.O., G.B.E., His Royal Highness The Duke of York, K.G., K.T., G.C.M.G., G.C.V.O., the Most Reverend Father in God Cosmo Gordon, Archbishop of Canterbury, the Right Honourable Douglas McGarel, Baron Hailsham, Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and the Right Honourable Stanley Baldwin, Prime Minister and First Lord of the Treasury, or any three of them, during His Majesty's illness, to summon and hold on His Majesty's behalf His Privy Council, and to signify thereat His Majesty's approval of any matter or thing to which His Majesty's approval in Council is required:

And whereas by "The Consular Salaries and Fees Act, 1891," His Majesty The King is authorised by Order in Council to fix the fees to be taken in respect of any matter or thing done by a Consular Officer in the execution of

his office, and to vary such fees by way of increase or decrease, and to abolish fees, and to create new fees:

And whereas by "The Foreign Marriage Act, 1892," by "The Marriage with Foreigners Act, 1906," and by "The Foreign Marriages Order in Council, 1913," it is provided that certain things may or shall be done on payment of the proper fee, and those Acts further provide that the proper fee shall be such fee as may for the time being be fixed under "The Consular Salaries and Fees Act, 1891," and that the fee so fixed as respects a Consul shall be the fee which may be taken by any marriage officer:

And whereas it is expedient that the notes set forth in the Table of Consular and Marriage fees in China, annexed to "The Consular Fees (Amendment) Order in Council, 1923," should be varied in certain respects:

Now, therefore, His Royal Highness The Prince of Wales, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and the Prime Minister and First Lord of the Treasury, being authorised thereto by His Majesty's said Commission in pursuance of the said Acts and of all other powers enabling them in that behalf, by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, on His Majesty's behalf are pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. This Order may be cited as "The Consular Fees (Amendment) Order in Council, 1929," and shall be read as one with "The Consular Fees Order in Council, 1921," and "The Consular Fees (Amendment) Order in Council, 1923."

2. Note 5 of the notes set forth in the table annexed to "the Consular Fees (Amendment) Order in Council" is hereby withdrawn and
