THE CORONERS (AMENDMENT) ACT, 1926.

ORDER FOR THE DIVISION OF THE COUNTY INTO CORONERS' DISTRICTS.

Whereas the Administrative County of Bedford is not at present divided into Coroners' Districts:

And whereas on the 25th day of December, 1928, a vacancy occurred in the office of Franchise Coroner for the Coroner's district comprising certain parishes within the Administrative County of Bedford and certain other parishes within the Administrative County of Buckingham and heretofore known as the Honor of Ampthill, and the parts of the district within the County of Bedford by the operation of Section 4 of the Coroners (Amendment) Act, 1926, thereupon merged in the County for all purposes relating to Coroners:

And whereas it is expedient that the Administrative County of Bedford should be divided into Coroners' Districts:

Now therefore in pursuance of the powers conferred on me by Section 12 of the said Act,
