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Kenfington, Dec. 24.

Permit us, Great Sir, (after our Thanks to Almighty God) with all Joy heartily to Congratulate the most happy Success of Your Arms, whereby a tedious and expensive War (by Your Majesty's unparallel'd Care and Conduct) is changed into a Glorious and Advantageous Peace, one of the greatest of earthly Blessings; and yet a far greater have we to Congratulate, which is Your Majesty's Safe return to us; And as these Blessings are inseparable, so shall they oblige us to all that Faithfulness, Love and Duty that can be performed by the most obedient Subjects to the best of Princes, and chiefly Demonstrated by us in our Representatives in Parliament, whom we desire to continue their utmost Care and endeavour for the Preservation, Maintenance, and Support of Your Majesties most Sacred Person and Government, as well in Peace as they have in War; And that Almighty God who hath made Your Majesty as well the great restorer of Religion, Laws, and Liberties, as the establisher of the Peace of Christendom, will preserve Your Majesties Sacred Person from all Dangers and Conspiracies, and make Your Life and Reign as long and Happy as they are dear and desirable to us, shall be the constant Prayers of Your Majesties most Loyal and for ever Dutiful and Obedient Subjects and Servants; who, in Testimony hereunto affixed our Common Seal this Sixteenth day of December, in the Ninth Year of Your Majesties most Gracious and Augustinus Reign.

The Humble Adress of the Arch-Deacons of *Exon, Totnes* and *Barum*, together with the Clergy within the Archdeaconries in the Diocess of *Exon*, sent up by the Lord Bishop of *Exeter*, was presented to His Majesty by Major-General *Trelawney*.

The Humble Adress of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Common-Council of the City of *Exon* was presented to His Majesty by *Sir Edward Seymour Bar.*

The Humble Adress of the Bishop and Clergy of the Diocess of *Carlisle*, was presented to His Majesty by His Grace the Lord Arch-bishop of *York*.

The Humble Adress of the Mayor, Capital Burgessees, and others, the Inhabitants of the Borough of *Grampound*, was presented to His Majesty by *Hugh Fortescue Esq;* one of their Representatives in Parliament.

The Humble Adress of the Inhabitants of the Borough of *Ashburton* in the County of *Devon*, was presented to His Majesty by *William Stawell* and *Richard Duke Esqs;* their Representatives in Parliament.

The Humble Adress of the Mayor, Recorder, and Aldermen, of the Town of *Saffron-Walden* in the County of *Essex*, was presented to His Majesty by the Right Honourable the Earl of *Suffolke* their Recorder.

All which Adresses His Majesty received very Graciously

Cracow, Dec. 11. In a Council that was held here some days ago, the King of *Poland* being present, 'twas resolv'd, That a General Dyet be called, so soon as can be conveniently; That the Forces of this Kingdom be put into Winter-quarters, and the care thereof left to the Crown-General; That the Saxon Troops now in *Prussia*, shall be quarter'd in that Country during the Winter; That the late King's Funeral shall be forthwith performed with the usual Solemnity, and the Crown-Treasurer to furnish the Money that is necessary for the expences of it; The Complaints of the City of *Dantzicke* concerning several of their Ships being taken by the French, were likewise considered, and 'twas propos'd that by way of Reprifals, all the Effects of the French, that are found within this Kingdom should be seized, but they deferred taking a resolution in this matter. The Gentlemen of the Province of *Samogitia* in the Great Duchy of *Lithuania*, being lately met together to choose Deputies, to be sent to the King, with assurances of their Fidelity, there arose such warm Disputes amongst them, that they had recourse to their Sabres, and divers were desperately wounded, but in conclusion the Deputies were chosen; who arrived here 2 days ago, with others from the rest of the Gentry of that Duchy; and they have had Audience of the King and been very well

well received. The Tartars have put a Convoy of Provisions into *Cambria*, and are since retired to *Palachia*.

Warsaw, Dec. 16. Several of the Senators, who attended on the King at *Cracow* are arrived here; and His Majesty is expected against the 20th of this Month; Divers Gentlemen who were of the *Primate's* Party, and have since submitted to the King, are come hither to wait upon His Majesty, at his Arrival. The *Primate* remains at *Lowitz*, where the Great Treasurer *Lubomirsky*, is gone to make him a visit, and to try what influence his persuasions can have over him, in order to bring him off from the Interests wherein he is engaged.

Vienna, Dec. 17. This day died here, after a sickness of few days the Arch-Dutchess *Eleonora Maria*, Sister to the Emperor; She was born in *May 1653*, was Married in *February 1670* to *Korybut Wisnowisky* King of *Poland*, who died in *Nov. 1673*, and in *Feb. 1677* she Married *Charles 4th Duke of Lorraine*, by whom she had the present Duke of *Lorraine*, and 3 other Princes: The Imperial Forces in *Hungary* and *Transylvania* are gone into their Winter-Quarters. Prince *Lewis of Baden* is expected here towards the end of this Month.

Frankfort, Dec. 25. The French continue their preparations for the evacuating of *Philipsbourg, Brisac*, and *Fribourg*, but have yet set no time for doing of it.

Paris, Dec. 27. The Count de *Couvaige* is arrived here from the Duke of *Lorraine* and has had Audience of the King, to whom he made a Compliment in the Name of his Master, upon the Conclusion of the Peace, and the Requisition of the Duchy of *Lorraine*; He has since had several Conferences with the French Ministers, and 'tis said, that having proposed a Marriage between the Duke of *Lorraine*, and *Mademoiselle* Daughter of the Duke of *Orleans*, this Court has consented to it, and that the same will be declared in few days. Count *Tallard* and the *Marquis de Harcourt* are preparing for their Embassies to *England* and *Spain*, and the first before his departure will be made a Knight of the Order of the *Holy Ghost*, and receive the *Blue Ribbon*. The States of the Province of *Foix* assembled the 8th of this Month, and assisted in a Body at the singing of *Te Deum* in the Cathedral Church, for the Peace, on which occasion there have been very great Rejoicings in: II parts of the Kingdom. Since the return of the Prince of *Conoy*, little is said at this Court concerning the affairs of *Poland*, and they seem to have laid aside the thoughts of further prosecuting his pretension to that Crown, but their Regiment still continues against the City of *Danzicke*. An Edict is published here for continuing the Capitation Tax for the first quarter of the next Year. The business of the King's Secretaries is sealed, so are to be suppressed, and the Money they paid for these places to be reimbursed them, the other 300 who are continued, are to pay 20000 *Livres* each, and in consideration thereof their Salaries are to be augmented.

Brussels, Decem. 29. The Elector of *Cologne* is come hither from *Liege*, together with Prince *Cerolas de Tilly* General of his Troops. The French have sent several Battalions to *Dinant*, to demolish the Fortifications they have made there since the place was in their possession; which by the Treaty is to be restored to the Prince of *Liege* in the same condition, as when taken. 'Tis said the French will evacuate *Luxemburgh* the next Week, and some Regiments are ordered to march thither from *Namur* to take possession of that Town in the Name of the King of *Spain*. The States of *Brabant* have resolved to maintain 6000 Men for the security of this Province.

Hague, Dec 31. The States General have made choice of Monsieur *D' Odyks* to be their Ambassador Extraordinary to the most Christian King, and Monsieur *Heemkerke* who is returning from *Vienna* (where he has resided several years as their Envoy Extraordinary) is appointed their Ordinary Ambassador in *France*; And Monsieur *Rep* is to succeed him at the Emperor's Court. The Elector of *Brandenburgh* is sending Monsieur *Caniz*, one of his Council, as his Minister to the Court of *France*. The French Ambassadors Monsieur *Verjus* and Monsieur *Calliere* have deferred their departure for some days. Monsieur de *Equepos* is expected here the next Week with the same Character. The States of *Holland* are to meet again on the 8th of the next Month, at which time the Deputies of the Admiralty are likewise to be here. The last Letters from the Court of *Hanover*, left the Elector extremely ill. This day Monsieur *Dankelman* one of the Ambassadors of *Brandenburgh* passed from hence in order to his return to *Berlin*.

Dublin, Dec. 16. Brigadier *Wolfley* Master of the Ordnance, and Col. of a Regiment of Horse in this Kingdom, died here yesterday. The Letters from *Wassersford* give an account, that the *Hasting's* Frigate of 32 Guns, Cap. *Draper* Commander came to an Anchor in that Harborsmouth the 10th instant at Night, and a violent Storm arising, she was driven a-shore the day following, where the Ship staved to pieces, and all the Men on Board were drowned, except the Purser, and 4 or 5 Men more.
