THE following Adress from Leominster was presented to His Majesty by the Right Honourable my Lord Conings-land and John Dutton Cole Esq; their Representatives in Parliament.

To the King's Most Excellent Majesty.

The Humble Adress of the Bayliff, High Steward, Recorder, Justices of the Peace, and Capital Burgeses of Your Majesty's Antient and Loyal Borough of Leominster in the County of Hereford.

Most Dread Sovereign,
Permit us, Great Sir, (after our Thanks to Almighty God) with all Joy heartily to Congratulate the most happy Success of Your Arms, whereby a tedious and expensive War (by Your Majesty's unparallel'd Care and Conduct) is changed into a Glorious and Advantageous Peace, one of the greatest of earthly Blessings; and yet a far greater have we to Congratulate, which is Your Majesty's Safe return to us; And as these Blessings are inestimable, so shall they oblige us to all that Faithfulness, Love and Duty that can be performed by the most obedient Subjects to the best of Princes, and chiefly Demonstrated by us in our Representatives in Parliament, whom we desire to continue their utmost Care and endeavour for the Preservation, Maintenance, and Support of Your Majesties most Sacred Person and Government, as well in Peace as they have in War; And that Almighty God who hath made Your Majesty as well the great restorer of Religion, Laws, and Liberties, as the establisher of the Peace and Christian Freedom, will preserve Your Majesties Sacred Person from all Dangers and Conspiracies, and make Your Life and Reign as long and Happy as they are dear and desirable to us, shall be the constant Prayers of Your Majesties most Loyal and for ever Dutiful and Obedient Subjects and Servants; who, in Testimony hereunto affixed our Common Seal this Sixteenth day of December, in the Ninth Year of Your Majesties most Gracious and Augustinus Reign.

The Humble Adress of the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, Common-Council, Clergy, Gentlemen, and other the Inhabitants of the Borough of Leeds, was presented to His Majesty by His Grace the Duke of Leeds.

The Humble Adress of the Mayor, Recorder, Masters, and Burgeses, and other Inhabitants of the City of Wells in the County of Somerset, was presented to His Majesty by Serjeant and their Recorder, introduced by his Grace the Duke of Ormonde.

The Humble Adress from the Town and Liberties of Ecclestone in the County of Stafford, signed by the Bishop of Litchfield and Coventry, (who resides there) Sir Thomas Pershall and Brian Broughton Barons, and all the rest of the Gentlemen, Freeholders, and Householdiers in the Neighbourhood, was presented to His Majesty by John Pershall Esq; introduced by the Right Honourable the Earl of Abermarle.

The Humble Adress of the Bayliffs, Recorder, Port-men, Common-Council, and the rest of the Free Burgeses of the Corporation of Ipswich in the County of Suffolk, was presented to His Majesty by Charles Whitaker and Richard Philips Esqs; their Representatives in Parliament, introduced by the Right Honourable my Lord Cornwallis, Lord Lieutenant of the County, High Steward of the Corporation.

The Humble Adress of the Bishop, Dean, Prebendaries, and other the Cathedral Church of Wells, was presented to His Majesty.

The Humble Adress of the Dean and Chapter, Dignitaries, and Prebendaries of the Cathedral Church of Sarum, was presented to His Majesty.

The Humble Adress of the Constable, Portrieve, Burgeses, and other Inhabitants of the Borough of Chard in the County of Somerset, was presented to His Majesty.

The Humble Adress of the Mayor, High Steward, Recorder, Aldermen, Capital-Burgeses, and Inhabitants of the Borough of Stafford, was presented to His Majesty by the Right Honourable my Lord Ferrers their High Steward, and Philip Foley and Thomas Foley Esqs; their Representatives in Parliament.

The Humble Adress of the Inhabitants of the Borough of Ailsbury in the County of Bucks, was presented to His Majesty by Sir Thomas Lee Bar, and James Herbert Esq; their Representatives in Parliament, introduced by the Right Honourable the Earl of Bridgewater.

The Humble Adress of the Deputy-Lieutenants, Justices of the Peace, and others, Gentlemen and Inhabitants of the County of Stafford, was presented to His Majesty by the Honourable Henry Paget Esq; one of the Knights of the Shire for the said County.

The Humble Adress of the Arch-Deacons of Exon, Totnes and Barum, together with the Clergy within the Archdeaconries in the Diocess of Exon, sent up by the Lord Bishop of Exeter, was presented to His Majesty by Major-General Trelawney.

The Humble Adress of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Common-Council of the City of Exon was presented to His Majesty by Sir Edward Seymour Bar.

The Humble Adress of the Bishop and Clergy of the Diocess of Carlisle, was presented to His Majesty by His Grace the Lord Arch-bishop of York.

The Humble Adress of the Mayor, Capital Burgeses, and others, the Inhabitants of the Borough of Grampond, was presented to His Majesty by Hugh Fortescue Esq; one of their Representatives in Parliament.

The Humble Adress of the Inhabitants of the Borough of Ashburton in the County of Devon, was presented to His Majesty by William Stawell and Richard Duke Esqs; their Representatives in Parliament.

The Humble Adress of the Mayor, Recorder, and Aldermen, of the Town of Saffron-Walden in the County of Essex, was presented to His Majesty by the Right Honourable the Earl of Suffolk their Recorder.

All which Adresses His Majesty received very Graciously

Cracow, Dec. 11. In a Council that was held here some days ago, the King of Poland being present, 'twas resolv'd, That a General Dyet be called, so soon as can be conveniently; That the Forces of this Kingdom be put into Winter-quarters, and the care thereof left to the Crown-General; That the Saxon Troops now in Prussia, shall be quarter'd in that Country during the Winter; That the late King's Funeral shall be forthwith performed with the usual Solemnity, and the Crown-Treasurer to furnish the Money that is necessary for the expences of it; The Complaints of the City of Danzicke concerning several of their Ships being taken by the French, were likewise considered, and 'twas propos'd that by way of Reprifals, all the Effects of the French, that are found within this Kingdom should be seized, but they deferred taking a resolution in this matter. The Gentlemen of the Province of Samogitia in the Great Duchy of Lithuania, being lately met together to choose Deputies, to be sent to the King, with assurances of their Fidelity, there arose such warm Disputes amongst them, that they had recourse to their Sabres, and divers were desperately wounded, but in conclusion the Deputies were chosen; who arrived here 2 days ago, with others from the rest of the Gentry of that Duchy; and they have had Audience of the King and been very well
