And whereas the said Convention is an arrangement of the nature contemplated by the said Section 91:

And whereas by Order in Council dated the 26th June, 1884, S.R. & O., Rev. 1904, IX, Patents, &c. p. 5, Her late Majesty Queen Victoria has been pleased to declare that the provisions of Section 103 of the Patents, Designs and Trade Marks Act, 1883, 46-7 V., c. 57, should apply to Belgium and certain other foreign countries, and it is expedient, on the making of this Order, that the said Order, in so far as it applies to Belgium, should be revoked:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, in exercise of the powers conferred upon Him in manner hereinbefore recited and of all other powers in that behalf, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to declare, and it is hereby declared, as follows:—

1. The laws of Belgium confer rights with respect to the use of inventions in vessels, aircraft and land vehicles of the United Kingdom when coming into Belgium or the territorial waters thereof, corresponding to those mentioned in Section 48 of the Patents and Designs Acts, 1907 to 1928.

2. The provisions of Section 91 of the Patents and Designs Acts, 1907 to 1928, shall be applicable to Belgium.

3. The Order in Council dated the 26th June, 1884, in so far as it relates to Belgium, is hereby revoked.

4. This Order may be cited as The Industrial Property Convention (Belgium) Order, 1929.

WHEREAS by the Burial Act, 1855, it was, amongst other things, enacted that it should be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, from time to time to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, should or should not have arrived), as to His Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, might seem fit:

And whereas an Order in Council was made on the 29th day of March, 1854, directing the discontinuance of burials in the burial ground and in the ground under the chapel of the Roman Catholic Chapel at Banbury, in the County of Oxford:

And whereas the said Order in Council of the 29th day of March, 1854, was varied by the Order in Council of the 12th day of August, 1907:

And whereas it seems fit to His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, that the said Orders in Council of the 29th day of

March, 1854, and the 12th day of August, 1907, should be further varied:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the Order in Council of the 29th day of March, 1854, relating to burials in the burial ground and in the ground under the chapel of the Roman Catholic Chapel at Banbury, in the County of Oxford, as varied by the Order in Council of the 12th day of August, 1907, shall be further varied by the addition thereto of the following further excepting clause:—

(a) In an earthen grave space in the Roman Catholic burial ground in which no interment has heretofore taken place, the burial may be allowed of the body of the late Reverend George Abraham Brabazon, subject to the condition that no part of the coffin containing the body shall be at a depth less than three feet below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave.

GEORGE THE FIFTH, by the Grace of God, of Great Britain, Ireland and the British Dominions beyond the Seas King, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India, to all to whom these Presents shall come,

Greeting!

WHEREAS We, having taken into Our Royal consideration the faithful and devoted service rendered by members of the Special Constabulary during the War, and being desirous of distinguishing such service by some mark of Our Royal Favour, and also of providing a means of recognizing continued and efficient service which may be rendered in the future by members of any Special Constabulary Reserve hereafter constituted, did by Warrant under Our Sign Manual dated the 30th August, 1919, institute and create a new Medal to be awarded for such service as aforesaid;

AND WHEREAS We did by Warrant under Our Sign Manual dated the 31st January, 1920,
