

day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid be assigned to and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said George Kennedy Allen, Bishop of Chichester, and his successors for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of any of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

"THE SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of Saint Augustine, Scaynes Hill, being:—

"All that part of the Parish of Lindfield, in the County of Sussex and in the Diocese of Chichester, which is bounded upon part of the north partly by the Parish of Horsted Keynes and partly by the Parish of Fletching, upon the east and upon part of the south by the Parish of Chailey, upon the remaining part of the south and upon the west by the Parish of Wivelsfield, all in the said County and Diocese, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the north west and upon the remaining part of the north, by an imaginary line commencing at the point where the boundary which divides the said Parish of Wivelsfield from the said Parish of Lindfield crosses the middle of Sluts Lane, and extending thence north eastward along the middle of Sluts Lane for a distance of 37 chains or thereabouts to its junction with the road leading from Scaynes Hill to Lindfield, and extending thence first northward and then north westward along the middle of the last mentioned road for a distance of 15½ chains or thereabouts to its junction near Walstead Farm with the road leading past the southern side of Walstead Common to East Mascalls, and extending thence first northward and then north eastward along the middle of the last mentioned road for a distance of 67½ chains or thereabouts to the centre of East Mascalls Bridge, which carries such road across the River Ouse, and extending thence first south eastward and then southward along the middle of the River Ouse for a distance of 45 chains or thereabouts to a point opposite to the place where the Cockhaise Brook diverges south eastward and runs parallel with the River Ouse, and extending thence in a straight line due east for a distance of 1 chain or thereabouts to a point in the middle of the Cockhaise Brook upon the boundary which divides the said Parish of Lindfield from the said Parish of Horsted Keynes."

And whereas drafts of the said Scheme have, in accordance with the provisions of the secondly hereinbefore mentioned Act, been transmitted to the Patrons and to the Incumbent of the Parish of Lindfield out of which it is intended that the District recommended in such Scheme to be constituted shall be taken, and such Incumbent has signified his assent to such Scheme:

And whereas the said Patrons have offered certain objections to the said Scheme:

And whereas notwithstanding the said objections the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Chichester.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the 3rd and 4th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 113, of the Act of the 6th and 7th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 37, and of the Act of the 19th and 20th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 104, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Scheme, bearing date the 21st day of November, 1929, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the 3rd and 4th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 113, of the Act of the 6th and 7th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 37, and of the Act of the 19th and 20th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 104, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for constituting a separate District for spiritual purposes to be taken partly out of the Parish of Horfield and partly out of the Parish of Filton, both in the County of Gloucester and in the Diocese of Bristol:

"Whereas we are satisfied that the said Parish of Horfield and the said Parish of Filton are Cures wherein or in parts whereof the provision for public worship and for pastoral superintendence is insufficient for the spiritual wants of the inhabitants thereof and it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular portions of the said Parish of Horfield and of the said Parish of Filton, which are hereinafter mentioned and described, should be constituted a separate District in the manner which is hereinafter set forth:

"And whereas there is not at present within the limits of the said proposed separate District any consecrated Church or Chapel in use for the purposes of Divine Worship:

"And whereas we have agreed to make and pay out of the Common Fund created by the firstly herein mentioned Act a grant of £200
