

and Ivy Cottage, and extending thence south eastward along the middle of such roadway for a distance of $3\frac{1}{2}$ chains or thereabouts to the fence at its southern end, and extending thence first westward along such fence and then first southward and then in various directions along the fences forming the eastern boundary of the closes numbered 977, 973, 970 and 312a upon the same maps for a distance in all of 39 chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said Parish of Egham from the said New Parish of Christ Church, Virginia Water."

And whereas drafts of the said Scheme have, in accordance with the provisions of the secondly hereinbefore mentioned Act, been transmitted to the Patrons and to the Incumbent of the Parish of Egham out of which it is intended that the District or New Parish recommended in such Scheme to be constituted shall be taken:

And whereas the said Patrons and Incumbent have offered certain objections to the said Scheme:

And whereas notwithstanding the said objections the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Guildford.

WHEREAS the Minister of Health, after giving 10 days' previous notice of his intention in that behalf, has, under the provisions of the Burial Act, 1853, as amended by subsequent enactments, made a Representation to His Majesty in Council that for the protection of the Public Health, the opening of any new burial ground in the City of Winchester, in the County of Southampton, save with the previous approval of the Minister of Health, should be prohibited, and that burials should be discontinued therein as follows, viz.:-

WINCHESTER.—Forthwith and entirely in Saint Faith's Churchyard: provided that:—

In such earthen graves now existing in the said Churchyard as can be opened to a depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed, at their decease, of widows, widowers, parents and children of those already interred therein.

Now, therefore, His Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give Notice of such Representation and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Privy Council on the 31st day of January next.

And His Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the

London Gazette, and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the Churches or Chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within the Parishes affected by such Representation one month before the said 31st day of January.
