And whereas it is desirable that certain provisions of the Act of 1928 shall apply to vessels containing certain gases compressed therein:

And whereas the provisions of section 1 of the Rules Publication Act, 1893, have been complied with:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue of the powers conferred on Him by section 19 of the Act of 1928 and of all other powers enabling Him in that behalf, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. Sections five and six, subsections two and three of section thirteen and sections fourteen, fifteen, sixteen and eighteen of the Act of 1928 shall apply to the gases mentioned in the Schedule to this Order when any such gas is compressed in any metal cylinder, and the said sections and subsections shall, in their application to those gases when so compressed, have effect subject to the following modifications, that is to say:—for references in the said sections and subsections to petroleum-spirit or to petroleum there shall be substituted references to the said gases when so compressed as aforesaid, and in the said section five, for the words from “words ‘petroleum-spirit’” to the end of subsection one thereof there shall be substituted the words “name of the gas and the name and address of the person by whom it was compressed”.

2. The Interpretation Act, 1889 (52-3 V. c. 63), shall apply with respect to the interpretation of this Order as it applies with respect to the interpretation of an Act of Parliament.

3. This Order may be cited as the Petroleum (Compressed Gases) Order, 1930.

SCHEDULE.

GASES TO WHICH, WHEN COMPRESSED IN METAL CYLINDERS, THE PETROLEUM (CONSOLIDATION) ACT, 1928, APPLIES.

Air, argon, carbon monoxide, coal gas, hydrogen, methane, neon, nitrogen, and oxygen.

WHEREAS the Right Reverend Frank Theodore, Lord Bishop of Winchester, has, under Section 26 of the Pluralities Act, 1838, made a Representation to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Cosmo Gordon, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, in the following terms:—

“I, Frank Theodore, Bishop of Winchester, in pursuance of the twenty-sixth section of the Pluralities Act, 1838, do hereby represent to Your Grace as follows:—

“There is in the County of Southampton and Diocese of Winchester the Vicarage or Benefice of Hinton Admiral the Parish whereof contains a population (according to the last Census) of two hundred and thirty-three or thereabouts with accommodation in the Parish Church for two hundred persons.

“The net annual value of the said Benefice of Hinton Admiral is seventy-eight pounds or thereabouts.

“There is also in the same County and Diocese the Rectory or Benefice of Milton the Parish whereof contains a population (according to the last Census) of three thousand two hundred and forty-eight or thereabouts with accommodation in the Parish Church for five hundred persons.

“The net annual value of the said Benefice of Milton is three hundred and ninety pounds or thereabouts.

“There is also in the same County and Diocese the Vicarage or Benefice of Bransgore the Parish whereof contains a population (according to the last Census) of one thousand one hundred and twenty-one or thereabouts with accommodation in the Parish Church for two hundred and twenty persons.

“The net annual value of the said Benefice of Bransgore is three hundred and seventy-five pounds or thereabouts.

“There is also in the same County and Diocese the Vicarage or Benefice of Highcliffe the Parish whereof contains a population (according to the last Census) of one thousand six hundred and eighty-nine or thereabouts with accommodation in the Parish Church for three hundred persons.

“The net annual value of the said Benefice of Highcliffe is three hundred and ninety-eight pounds or thereabouts.

“There is also in the same County and Diocese the Vicarage or Benefice of Christchurch the Parish whereof contains a population (according to the last Census) of seven thousand one hundred and seventy-four or thereabouts with accommodation in the Parish Church for two thousand persons.

“The net annual value of the said Benefice of Christchurch is four hundred pounds or thereabouts.

“There is also in the same County and Diocese the Vicarage or Benefice of Sopley the Parish whereof contains a population (according to the last Census) of seven hundred and eighty-eight or thereabouts with accommodation in the Parish Church for two hundred and fifty-five persons.

“The net annual value of the said Benefice of Sopley is three hundred and eighty-two pounds or thereabouts.

“There is also in the same County and Diocese the Extra Parochial place known as the New Forest.

“That it appears to me and I do hereby represent to Your Grace that under the provisions of the said Pluralities Act, 1838:—

“(1) Two portions of the Parish of Milton (the boundaries of which portions are delineated on the map attached to the annexed Scheme and thereon verged red) may be advantageously separated from the Parish of Milton and annexed to the Parish of Hinton Admiral to which they are contiguous.

“(2) A portion of the Parish of Bransgore (the boundaries of which portion are delineated on the map attached to the annexed Scheme and thereon verged green) may be advantageously separated from the Parish of Bransgore and be annexed to the Parish of Hinton Admiral to which it is contiguous.

“(3) Two portions of the Parish of Highcliffe (the boundaries of which portions are
