And whereas by Treaty, grant, usage, sufferance, and other lawful means, His Majesty the King has jurisdiction in Western Samoa:

And whereas His Majesty the King is satisfied that the Legislature of Western Samoa has made adequate provision for the recognition in Western Samoa of Probates and Letters of Administration granted by the Courts of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland:

And whereas it is expedient that the Colonial Probates Act, 1892, should be extended to Western Samoa in accordance with the provisions of the Foreign Jurisdiction Acts, 1890 and 1913:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of all the powers enabling His Majesty in that behalf by the Foreign Jurisdiction Acts, 1890 and 1913, or otherwise in His Majesty vested, is pleased by and with

the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

The Colonial Probates Act, 1892, shall from the date of this Order apply to Western Samoa, as though that country were a British Possession.

And the Right Honourable Sidney James, Baron Passfield, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Dominion Affairs, is to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Union of Benefices Measure, 1923, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Scheme bearing date the 12th day of December, 1929, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting in pursuance of the Union of Benefices Measure, 1923, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for effecting the unions (1) of the Benefice (being a Vicarage) of Benthall and the Benefice of Broseley (being part of the United Benefice of Broseley with Linley) and (2) of the Benefice (being a Rectory) of Astley Abbots and the Benefice of Linley (being the remaining or other part of the said United Benefice of Broseley with Linley) all of which Benefices are situate in the County of Salop and in the Diocese of Hereford:

"Whereas Commissioners appointed at our request by the Right Reverend Martin Linton, Bishop of Hereford, pursuant to the provisions of the said Union of Benefices Measure, 1923, to inquire into and report (*inter alia*) upon the unions (1) of the said two Benefices of Benthall and Broseley and (2) of the said two Benefices of Astley Abbots and Linley duly made their Report to the said Bishop of Hereford and therein recommended the said unions of Benefices and the terms for effecting the same including an alteration of boundaries affecting the Parish of the said Benefice of Benthall, and the said Bishop of Hereford signified in writing his approval of the said Report:

"And whereas we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, have prepared this Scheme for the said unions of Benefices based upon the terms recommended in the said Report:

"And whereas all of the said Benefices of Benthall, Broseley with Linley and Astley Abbots are at present full, the Reverend William Arthur Terry being the present Incumbent of the said Benefice of Benthall, the Reverend Charles Strathnairn Jackson being the present Incumbent of the said Benefice of Broseley with Linley and the Reverend Anthony Hodgson being the present Incumbent of the said Benefice of Astley Abbots:

"And whereas it was one of the terms of the said Report to the said Bishop of Hereford that after the union of the said Benefices of Benthall and Broseley as hereinafter recommended and proposed the Patronage of the United Benefice should belong as to the first and second of every three successive turns of presentation or nomination thereto to the Patron of the said Benefice of Broseley and as to the third turn to the Patron of the said Benefice of Benthall:

"And whereas the Patronage of the said Benefice of Broseley with Linley now belongs to the Right Honourable George Cecil Beaumont, Baron Forester, who is also Patron of the Benefice of Little Wenlock, situate in the said Diocese of Hereford:

"And whereas the Patronage of the said Benefice of Benthall now belongs to the Reverend John William Isherwood, Vicar or Incumbent of the Benefice of Much Wenlock in the said Diocese of Hereford, and his successors Vicars or Incumbents of the said Benefice of Much Wenlock:

"And whereas the said George Cecil Beaumont, Baron Forester, and the said John William Isherwood, are consenting to this Scheme to the intent that an exchange shall be made of a one-third share in the Patronage of the said Benefice of Little Wenlock, for such share in the Patronage of the United Benefice of Broseley with Benthall as was recommended as aforesaid to be assigned to the said John William Isherwood and his successors Vicars or Incumbents of the said Benefice of Much Wenlock:

"And whereas such proposed exchange of Patronage appears to us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, to be desirable for the purpose of more conveniently carrying into execution the provisions of the said Union of Benefices Measure, 1923, in regard to the union of the said Benefices of Benthall and Broseley which is hereinafter recommended and proposed:

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said Martin Linton, Bishop of Hereford (in testimony whereof he has signed this Scheme), and with the consents of the said George Cecil Beaumont, Baron Forester, and John William Isherwood (in testimony whereof they have respectively signed this Scheme), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, do humbly recommend and propose to Your Majesty as follows, that is to say:—

"1. That the said Benefice of Broseley shall be severed from the said Benefice of Broseley with Linley and the said Benefice of Broseley so severed and the said Benefice of Benthall shall be permanently united together and form one Benefice with Cure of Souls under the style of 'The United Benefice of Broseley with Benthall' but the Parishes of the said Benefices of Benthall and Broseley shall continue distinct in all respects.

"2. That the said Benefice of Astley Abbots and the said Benefice of Linley shall be permanently united together and form one Benefice with Cure of Souls under the style of 'The United Benefice of Astley Abbots with Linley' but the Parishes of the said Benefices of Astley Abbots and Linley shall continue distinct in all respects and no part of the endowments of the said Benefice of Broseley with Linley shall be transferred to

the United Benefice of Astley Abbots with Linley.

"3. That with the consents of the said Charles Strathnairn Jackson and the said Anthony Hodgson (testified by their signing this Scheme), upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council affirming this Scheme shall be published in the London Gazette the union referred to in Clause 2 of this Scheme shall forthwith take effect and the said Anthony Hodgson if he is then Incumbent of the said Benefice of Astley Abbots shall become the first Incumbent of the United Benefice of Astley Abbots with Linley.

"4. That with the consent of the said Charles Strathnairn Jackson (testified as aforesaid), if upon the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council affirming this Scheme the said Benefice of Benthall shall be vacant the union referred to in Clause 1 of this Scheme shall forthwith take effect and the said Charles Strathnairn Jackson shall become the first Incumbent of the United Benefice of Broseley with Benthall, but if upon that day the said Benefice of Benthall shall be full then the union of the said Benefices of Broseley and Benthall shall take effect immediately upon the first vacation thereafter of the said Benefice of Benthall and the said Charles Strathnairn Jackson or his successor, Incumbent of the said Benefice of Broseley, shall be the first Incumbent of the United Benefice of Broseley with Benthall.

"5. That upon the union referred to in Clause 1 of this Scheme taking effect the Parsonage House at present belonging to the said Benefice of Broseley with Linley shall become and be the house of residence for the Incumbent of the United Benefice of Broseley with Benthall.

"6. That upon the union referred to in Clause 2 of this Scheme taking effect the Parsonage House at present belonging to the said Benefice of Astley Abbots shall become and be the house of residence for the Incumbent of the United Benefice of Astley Abbots with Linley.

"7. That after the union referred to in Clause 1 of this Scheme has taken effect all right claim or title of the said John William Isherwood, Vicar or Incumbent of the said Benefice of Much Wenlock, and his successors Vicars or Incumbents of the said Benefice of Much Wenlock, to any interest in the Patronage of the United Benefice of Broseley with Benthall shall be transferred to the said George Cecil Beaumont, Baron Forester, to the intent that the whole Patronage of the United Benefice of Broseley with Benthall shall belong to the said George Cecil Beaumont, Baron Forester, and that in exchange for such right of Patronage so transferred the said John William Isherwood, Vicar or Incumbent of the said Benefice of Much Wenlock and his successors Vicars or Incumbents of the said Benefice of Much Wenlock, shall as from the same day be entitled to a one third share in the Patronage of the said Benefice of Little Wenlock, that is to say that in every series of three successive turns of presentation or nomination to be made thereafter to the said Benefice of Little Wenlock, the said George Cecil Beaumont, Baron Forester, shall have the first and second turns

and the said John William Isherwood, Vicar or Incumbent of the said Benefice of Much Wenlock, and his successors Vicars or Incumbents of the said Benefice of Much Wenlock shall have the third turn.

"8. That after the union referred to in Clause 2 of this Scheme has taken effect the Patronage of the United Benefice of Astley Abbots with Linley shall belong wholly to the Patrons of the said Benefice of Astley Abbots.

"9. That upon the union referred to in Clause 1 of this Scheme taking effect the whole of the extra-parochial place called or known as Posenhall lying between the Parish of the said Benefice of Benthall and the Parish of the Benefice of Barrow (being one of the Parishes of the United Benefice of Willey with Barrow, in the said Diocese of Hereford) shall be transferred and annexed to and for all ecclesiastical purposes form part of the Parish of the said Benefice of Benthall and the United Benefice of Broseley with Benthall.

"Provided always that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Measure, or of any other Measure of the National Assembly of the Church of England, or of any Act of Parliament."

And whereas drafts of the said Scheme have been duly published in accordance with the provisions of the said Union of Benefices Measure, 1923, and Notices have been transmitted to the persons or bodies entitled under the same Measure to receive Notice requiring any objections to such draft Scheme to be stated or transmitted in writing to the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners within the time prescribed in the Statutory Rules applicable to proceedings under the said Union of Benefices Measure, 1923:

And whereas certain objections have been so stated or transmitted to the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners within the time prescribed in the same Rules:

And whereas the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners after giving full consideration to such objections have deemed right to make certain alterations in such draft Scheme:

And whereas public notice of the certification to His Majesty in Council of the said Scheme and the consent thereto in writing of the Bishop of Hereford has been duly given in the manner and within the time prescribed in the Statutory Rules aforesaid:

And whereas no appeal has been made to His Majesty in Council within the period of one month after the date of the said public notice in accordance with the provisions of the said Measure against the said Scheme or any part thereof by any person who has made objection as aforesaid to the said draft Scheme:

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to affirm the said Scheme and to order that the Benefices therein recommended to be united shall be united to the extent and for the purposes recommended in the said Scheme, and further to order and direct that the said Scheme and every part thereof shall be

effectual in law immediately from and after the date when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Measure.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Hereford.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have in pursuance of the Act of the 3rd and 4th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 113, and of the Act of the 17th and 18th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 84, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Scheme bearing date the 12th day of December, 1929, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

“We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the 3rd and 4th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 113, and of the Act of the 17th and 18th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 84, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for apportioning the income of the Benefice of Little Wenlock, in the County of Salop and in the Diocese of Hereford, between that Benefice and a certain other Benefice namely the Benefice of Willey with Barrow, which said last named Benefice is situate in the said County of Salop and in the said Diocese of Hereford:

“Whereas the Right Honourable George Cecil Beaumont, Baron Forester, is the Patron of the said Benefice of Little Wenlock and also of the said Benefice of Willey with Barrow:

“And whereas it has been made to appear to us that the said Benefice of Willey with Barrow is at present insufficiently endowed; and that the said Benefice of Little Wenlock has endowments of such an amount as that after the charge hereinafter recommended and proposed to be made shall have been placed upon the same endowments, the said Benefice of Little Wenlock will still be sufficiently endowed:

“And whereas the Right Reverend Martin Linton, Bishop of the said Diocese of Hereford, has represented to us, and we are of opinion, that it is desirable that additional provision should be made for the Cure of Souls within the Parish of Willey with Barrow aforesaid, by means of that apportionment of the income of the said Benefice of Little Wenlock which is hereinafter recommended and proposed:

“And whereas the said Benefice of Little Wenlock is now full, the Reverend Alfred Charles Howell being the Rector or Incumbent thereof:

“Now, therefore, with the consent of the said Martin Linton, Bishop of the said Diocese of

Hereford, acting as such Bishop (in testimony whereof he has signed this Scheme and sealed the same with his Episcopal Seal), and with the consent of the said George Cecil Beaumont, Baron Forester, as the Patron of each of the said two Benefices as aforesaid (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this Scheme), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this Scheme and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same all the Tithe rent charges Glebe lands and all (if any) other the endowments which shall then belong to the said Benefice of Little Wenlock or which may thereafter belong to the same Benefice shall be charged and for ever thereafter chargeable in favour of the Incumbent for the time being of the said Benefice of Willey with Barrow with the annual sum or yearly charge hereinafter mentioned that is to say a clear annual sum or yearly charge of £100 the same annual sum or yearly charge of £100 to be due and payable to the Incumbent of the said Benefice of Willey with Barrow and the same annual sum or yearly charge to be apportionable between any outgoing Incumbent of the Benefice of Willey with Barrow or his representatives on the one hand and his successor in the same incumbency on the other hand; and to be receivable by the Incumbent in whose favour it is charged as aforesaid by equal half yearly payments on the first day of May and the first day of November in every year: and that in the event of the said Benefice of Little Wenlock being avoided by the said Alfred Charles Howell by retirement under the provisions of the Incumbents Resignation Acts and a pension under those Acts being awarded to him the said rentcharge of £100 per annum shall take effect upon the cessation of such pension, and in the event of the said Benefice of Little Wenlock being avoided by the said Alfred Charles Howell without the grant of any pension to him under the said Resignation Acts then the said rentcharge of £100 per annum shall take effect upon such avoidance.

“And we further recommend and propose that for the recovery of the said yearly charge of £100 the Incumbent of the said Benefice of Willey with Barrow and his successors shall have and be entitled to all the powers and remedies provided by Sections 121 and 122 of the Law of Property Act, 1925, in respect of rentcharges to which those Sections apply.

“Provided always that if at any time the Incumbent for the time being of the said Benefice of Little Wenlock shall by any deed duly executed by him under his hand and seal in accordance with the provisions of any Statute in that behalf enabling him, grant convey and annex to the said Benefice of Willey with Barrow any part or parts of the Rectorial endowments belonging to the said Benefice of Little Wenlock which shall in the opinion of the Bishop of Hereford for the time being be a just and fair equivalent or not less than an equivalent for the said yearly charge of £100 hereby proposed to be created as aforesaid then the same annual sum or yearly charge of £100 shall thereupon and thenceforth cease and determine, and be no longer payable as hereinbefore recommended and proposed.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Hereford.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting in pursuance of the Union of Benefices Measure, 1923, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for effecting the unions (1) of the Benefice of Troston with the Benefice of Great Livermere (being part of the United Benefice of Great Livermere with Little Livermere) and (2) of the Benefice of Ampton with the Benefice of Little Livermere (being the remaining part of the said United Benefice of Great Livermere with Little Livermere) all of which Benefices are situate in the County of Suffolk and in the Diocese of Saint Edmundsbury and Ipswich:

"Whereas Commissioners appointed at our request by the Right Reverend Walter Godfrey, Bishop of Saint Edmundsbury and Ipswich, pursuant to the provisions of the said Union of Benefices Measure, 1923, to inquire into and report upon the unions (1) of the said Benefice of Troston with the said Benefice of Great Livermere and (2) of the said Benefice of Ampton with the said Benefice of Little Livermere duly made their Report to the said Bishop of Saint Edmundsbury and Ipswich and therein recommended the said unions of Benefices and the terms for effecting the same, and the said Bishop of Saint Edmundsbury and Ipswich signified in writing his approval of the said Report:

"And whereas we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, have prepared this Scheme for the said unions of Benefices based upon the terms recommended in the said Report:

"And whereas the said Benefices of Troston and Great Livermere with Little Livermere are now full, the Reverend Henry North George Hall being the present Incumbent of the said Benefice of Troston and the Reverend Henry Carey Dobrée being the present Incumbent of the said Benefice of Great Livermere with Little Livermere, and the said Benefice of Ampton is at present vacant:

"Now, therefore, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, with the consent of the said Walter Godfrey, Bishop of Saint Edmundsbury and Ipswich (in testimony whereof he has signed this Scheme), do humbly recommend and propose to Your Majesty as follows, that is to say:—

"1. That the said Benefice of Troston and the part of the said United Benefice of Great Livermere with Little Livermere which consists of the said Benefice of Great Livermere shall be permanently united together and form one Benefice with Cure of Souls under the style of 'The United Benefice of Great Livermere with Troston' but the Parishes of the said Benefices shall continue distinct in all respects.

"2. That the said Benefice of Ampton and the part of the said United Benefice of Great Livermere with Little Livermere which consists of the said Benefice of Little Livermere shall be permanently united together and form one Benefice with Cure of Souls and one Parish for ecclesiastical purposes under the style of 'The United Benefice of Ampton with Little Livermere' and that such United Benefice shall be included in and form part of the Rural Deanery of Thingoe.

"3. That the Church of the Parish of Ampton shall be the Parish Church of the United Parish of Ampton with Little Livermere and that the Table of Fees for the said Parish of Ampton shall (until revised or altered by proper authority) be the Table of Fees for the same United Parish.

"4. That the said unions shall take effect on the next avoidance of the said Benefice of Troston if the Incumbent at that time of the said Benefice of Great Livermere with Little Livermere shall have been instituted to the said Benefice of Great Livermere with Little Livermere subsequently to the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme or if instituted before that date shall with the approval of the Bishop of Saint Edmundsbury and Ipswich consent to become the Incumbent of the United Benefice of Great Livermere with Troston but if he shall have been instituted to the said Benefice of Great Livermere with Little Livermere before that date and shall not so consent, or if the Bishop of Saint Edmundsbury and Ipswich shall not approve as aforesaid, then the said unions shall take effect immediately upon the next vacancy of the said Benefice of Great Livermere with Little Livermere following such avoidance of the said Benefice of Troston and the then Incumbent of the said Benefice of Troston shall become the first Incumbent of the United Benefice of Great Livermere with Troston, and in either case the Incumbent (if any) of the said Benefice of Ampton shall become the first Incumbent of the United Benefice of Ampton with Little Livermere.

"5. That upon the said unions taking effect (a) the Parsonage House at present belonging

to the said Benefice of Troston shall subject as hereinafter provided become and be the house of residence for the Incumbent of the United Benefice of Great Livermere with Troston and (b) the Parsonage House at present belonging to the said Benefice of Ampton shall become and be the house of residence for the Incumbent of the United Benefice of Ampton with Little Livermere and (c) so soon as conveniently may be the Parsonage House at Great Livermere at present belonging to the said Benefice of Great Livermere with Little Livermere and the site and appurtenances thereof and the grounds heretofore usually occupied and enjoyed therewith shall be sold and disposed of by us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners at such time or times and in such manner in all respects as to us shall seem expedient and that the net proceeds of such sale shall be applied as follows, that is to say, that if within a period of three years from the date of the taking effect of the said unions the Bishop of Saint Edmundsbury and Ipswich with the consent of the Incumbent of the United Benefice of Great Livermere with Troston shall decide that a new house of residence more conveniently situated should be provided for the United Benefice of Great Livermere with Troston then the Parsonage House at present belonging to the said Benefice of Troston and the site and appurtenances thereof and the grounds heretofore usually occupied and enjoyed therewith shall be sold and disposed of by us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners in such manner in all respects as to us shall seem expedient and the net proceeds of such sale together with the net proceeds of the sale hereinbefore recommended and proposed of the Parsonage House at Great Livermere belonging to the said Benefice of Great Livermere with Little Livermere shall be appropriated towards the cost of providing a new house of residence for the Incumbent of the United Benefice of Great Livermere with Troston and any balance of the net proceeds of such sales after such new house of residence shall have been provided shall be held and invested by us for the benefit of the United Benefice of Ampton with Little Livermere: provided that if within the said period of three years it shall not be decided as aforesaid to provide a new house of residence for the United Benefice of Great Livermere with Troston the net proceeds of the sale hereinbefore recommended and proposed of the Parsonage House at present belonging to the said Benefice of Great Livermere with Little Livermere shall be held and invested by us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners as to one moiety thereof for the benefit of the United Benefice of Great Livermere with Troston and as to the other moiety thereof for the benefit of the United Benefice of Ampton with Little Livermere.

" 6. That after the said unions have taken effect the course and succession in which the respective Patrons shall present or nominate to the United Benefice of Great Livermere with Troston from time to time as the same shall become vacant shall be as follows, that is to say, the right of presentation shall be exercised by the Patrons of the said two Benefices of Troston and Great Livermere with Little Livermere alternately, the Patron of the said

first presentation to such United Benefice to be made after the union and every alternate right of presentation and the Patron of the said Benefice of Great Livermere with Little Livermere having the right of presentation upon the second presentation to the same United Benefice to be made after the union and every alternate turn thereafter.

" 7. And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Canterbury.

“ We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the 3rd and 4th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 113, of the Act of the 6th and 7th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 37, of the Act of the 19th and 20th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 104, and of the Act of the 37th and 38th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 63, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for constituting a separate District for spiritual purposes to be taken out of the Parish of Christ Church at the Quinton, in the County of Worcester and in the Diocese of Birmingham:

“ Whereas we are satisfied that the said Parish of Christ Church at the Quinton is a Cure wherein or in parts whereof the provision for public worship and for pastoral superintendence is insufficient for the spiritual wants of the inhabitants thereof and it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular part of the said Parish of Christ Church at the Quinton which is hereinafter mentioned and described should be constituted a separate District in the manner which is hereinafter set forth:

“ And whereas there is not at present within the limits of the said proposed separate District any consecrated Church or Chapel in use for the purposes of Divine Worship:

“ And whereas we have agreed to make and pay out of the Common Fund created by the firstly herein mentioned Act a grant of £200 per annum to the Minister of the said proposed separate District so soon as a Minister shall have been duly licensed in accordance with the provisions of the secondly herein mentioned Act and to his successors:

“ And whereas the said grant of the said yearly sum of £200 will, after the publication in the London Gazette of an Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme, be made and secured by an Instrument to be executed by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, under our Common Seal in accordance with the provisions of the Act of the 29th and 30th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 111:

“ Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Ernest William, Bishop of Birmingham (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this Scheme), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that all that part of the said Parish of Christ Church at the Quinton which is described in the Schedule hereunder written, all which part together with the boundaries thereof is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, shall, upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme as aforesaid, become and be constituted a separate District

for spiritual purposes and that the same shall be named ‘ The District of Saint Hilda, Warley Woods,’ and that such District shall be included in and form part of the Rural Deanery of Smethwick and the Archdeaconry of Birmingham within the said Diocese of Birmingham.

“ And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of any of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

“ The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

“ The District of Saint Hilda, Warley Woods, being:—

“ All that part of the Parish of Christ Church at the Quinton, in the County of Worcester and in the Diocese of Birmingham, which is bounded upon the north by the District of Saint Mark, Londonderry, situate partly in the said County of Worcester and partly in the County of Stafford, and wholly in the said Diocese of Birmingham, upon the east partly by the New Parish of Smethwick and partly by the New Parish of Saint Mary, Smethwick, upon the south by the Parish of Harborne, all in the said County of Stafford and in the said Diocese of Birmingham, and upon the remaining side, that is to say, upon the west by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said Parish of Harborne from the said Parish of Christ Church at the Quinton at the junction of Beech Lane with Harborne Road where such boundary is crossed by the boundary of the County Borough of Smethwick, and extending thence first north westward and then northward along the said county borough boundary for a distance of 72 chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said Parish of Christ Church at the Quinton from the said District of Saint Mark, Londonderry.”

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Birmingham.

“We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting in pursuance of the Union of Benefices Measure, 1923, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for the pulling down of the Church of Saint Mary the Virgin, situate in the New Parish of All Saints, Clapton Park, in the County of Middlesex and in the Diocese of London, and for the sale of the materials and site of the same and of the ground annexed or belonging thereto and for other matters incidental to such pulling down and sale:

“Whereas the said Church of Saint Mary the Virgin was consecrated on the 30th day of March, 1900, and is a Chapel of Ease in the said New Parish of All Saints, Clapton Park:

“And whereas the said Church of Saint Mary the Virgin has ceased to be used and is no longer required for the purposes of Divine Service:

“Now, therefore, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, with the consent of the Right Reverend Arthur Foley, Bishop of London (in testimony whereof he has hereunto set his hand), do humbly recommend and propose to Your Majesty as follows, that is to say:—

“1. That the said Church of Saint Mary the Virgin shall be pulled down and the materials and site of the same and the ground or part of the ground annexed or belonging thereto (not being ground forming part of a Churchyard which shall have been used for burials) shall be sold and disposed of by us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners at such time or times and in such manner in all respects as we shall deem expedient. Provided always that such sale or disposal shall be subject to the conditions and restrictions imposed by the said Union of Benefices Measure, 1923.

“2. That the net proceeds to arise from the sale or sales to be made by us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners as aforesaid after the payment thereof of all costs and expenses of and in relation to such sale or sales and to the carrying into effect of this Scheme shall constitute and form part of the Expenses Fund established pursuant to the 32nd Section of the said Union of Benefices Measure, 1923.

“Provided always that this Scheme shall not take effect until the consents and approval which by the said Union of Benefices Measure, 1923, are made requisite to the sale under the powers conferred by that Measure of the site of any Church shall be obtained to the sale hereby proposed of the said Church of Saint Mary the Virgin and of the site thereof together with any ground annexed or belonging thereto.

“And provided also that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measure relating to

the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Union of Benefices Measure, 1923, or of any other Measure of the National Assembly of the Church of England, or Act of Parliament.”

And whereas drafts of the said Scheme have been duly published in accordance with the provisions of the said Union of Benefices Measure, 1923, and Notices have been transmitted to the persons or bodies entitled under the same Measure to receive Notice requiring any objections to such draft Scheme to be stated or transmitted in writing to the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners within the time prescribed in the Statutory Rules applicable to proceedings under the said Union of Benefices Measure, 1923:

And whereas the prescribed time has elapsed and no such objections have been so stated or transmitted to the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners:

And whereas public notice of the certification to His Majesty in Council of the said Scheme and the consent thereto in writing of the Bishop of London has been duly given in the manner and within the time prescribed in the Statutory Rules aforesaid:

And whereas the said Scheme has been laid before both Houses of Parliament for the space of two calendar months:

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to affirm the said Scheme and to order and direct that the said Scheme and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the date when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Measure.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of London.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Union of Benefices Acts, 1860 and 1898, that is to say, the Act of the 23rd and 24th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 142, and the Act of the 61st and 62nd years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 23, and the Parochial Church Councils (Powers) Measure, 1921, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Scheme bearing date the 17th day of October, 1929, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

“We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting in pursuance of the Union of Benefices Acts, 1860 and 1898, that is to say, the Act of the 23rd and 24th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 142, and the Act of the 61st and 62nd years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 23, and the Parochial Church Councils (Powers) Measure, 1921, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your

Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for effecting an union of two contiguous benefices situate within the Metropolis, and within the Diocese of London, namely, the Benefice (being an United Benefice) of Christ Church, Spitalfields, with Saint Mary, Spitalfields, and the Benefice (being a Vicarage) of Saint Stephen, Spitalfields, and for effecting certain other measures incidental to or arising out of such union:

"Whereas the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Arthur Foley, Bishop of the said Diocese of London, has caused Proposals for a Scheme for effecting an union of the said two Benefices to be laid before us, which Proposals were prepared under the 7th and 8th sections of the first mentioned Act and were approved by the said Arthur Foley, Bishop of the said Diocese of London, and were assented to by the Patrons of the said two Benefices, that is to say, by the said Arthur Foley, Bishop of London, as the Patron, in right of his See, of the said Benefice of Christ Church, Spitalfields, with Saint Mary, Spitalfields, and by the Church Patronage Trustees as the Patrons of the said Benefice of Saint Stephen, Spitalfields, and the same Proposals were also assented to by the Parochial Church Council of the Parish of Christ Church, Spitalfields, with Saint Mary, Spitalfields, and by the Parochial Church Council of the New Parish of Saint Stephen, Spitalfields:

"And whereas it appears to us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, to be expedient that the said proposed union of the said two Benefices should be effected and that such arrangements relating thereto and to the other matters hereinafter contained should be made as are hereinafter mentioned:

"And whereas both of the said Benefices are now full, the Reverend Colin Causton Kerr, Clerk in Holy Orders, being the present Incumbent of the said Benefice of Christ Church, Spitalfields, with Saint Mary, Spitalfields, and the Reverend Frederick Lewis Jones, Clerk in Holy Orders, being the present Incumbent of the said Benefice of Saint Stephen, Spitalfields:

"And whereas the said Colin Causton Kerr has consented to become the first Incumbent of the United Benefice if and when the union which is hereinafter recommended and proposed shall take effect:

"And whereas the said Arthur Foley, now Bishop of London, as such Bishop and as such Patron as aforesaid, and the said Church Patronage Trustees, as such Patrons as aforesaid, and the Parochial Church Councils of the said parishes respectively are willing that the Scheme for effecting the said union should embody certain modifications of the said Proposals: and this present Scheme does embody the same modifications accordingly but otherwise is based upon the said Proposals:

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said Arthur Foley, Bishop of London (in testimony whereof he has to this Scheme set his hand and his Episcopal Seal), and with the consent of the said Church Patronage Trustees, that is to say, of John Francis William Deacon, of Mabledon, Tonbridge, in the County of Kent, Esquire, the Reverend Ernest Newton Sharpe, of the Vicarage, Paddington, London, Clerk in Holy Orders and a Prebendary in

the Cathedral Church of Saint Paul in London, the Very Reverend Henry Lawe Corry Vully de Candole, Dean of the Cathedral Church of Bristol, John Malcolm Falconer, of Calverley House, Leeds, in the County of York, Esquire and the Reverend Douglas Harry Grose Sargent, of Number 27, Chancery Lane, London, Clerk in Holy Orders (in testimony whereof they have signed and sealed this Scheme), and with the consents of the Parochial Church Council of the said Parish of Christ Church, Spitalfields, and Saint Mary, Spitalfields, and of the Parochial Church Council of the said Parish of Saint Stephen, Spitalfields (in testimony of which consents this Scheme is signed, in the case of each of the said Parochial Church Councils, by the Chairman and two other Members present at a meeting of the same Parochial Church Council duly convened for the purpose of giving such consent), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose to Your Majesty in Council all that is in this Scheme contained under the several parts or headings hereinafter mentioned as follows:—

"PART I.

"As to the proposed union itself and certain immediate incidents thereof, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, recommend and propose:—

"1. That the said Benefice of Christ Church, Spitalfields, with Saint Mary, Spitalfields, and the said Benefice of Saint Stephen, Spitalfields, be united into one Benefice under the style of 'The United Benefice of Christ Church with Saint Mary and Saint Stephen, Spitalfields,' which said United Benefice is hereinafter called the United Benefice.

"2. That if upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme shall be published in the London Gazette both of the said present Benefices shall be vacant, the union shall forthwith take effect, and if the said Benefice of Saint Stephen, Spitalfields, only shall then be vacant, the said union shall also forthwith take effect and the Incumbent of the said Benefice of Christ Church, Spitalfields, with Saint Mary, Spitalfields, shall be the first Incumbent of the United Benefice, and if upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme shall be published in the London Gazette both of the said present Benefices shall be full, then the said union shall take effect on the next avoidance of the said Benefice of Saint Stephen, Spitalfields, and the then Incumbent of the said Benefice of Christ Church, Spitalfields, with Saint Mary, Spitalfields, shall be the first Incumbent of the United Benefice, and in any case, it shall be lawful for the Bishop of the said Diocese of London to admit to the United Benefice such first Incumbent (if an Incumbent for the time being of the said Benefice of Christ Church, Spitalfields, with Saint Mary, Spitalfields), without any form or fee of or for presentation, and he shall thereupon become the Incumbent of the United Benefice. Until the time of the union taking effect the said two Benefices shall remain separate, and the rights and liabilities in respect thereof, and of the Incumbents of each of them shall remain unaffected.

"3. That if after this Scheme shall have been ratified by an Order of Your Majesty in Council and before the said union shall have taken effect the Incumbent for the time being of the said Benefice of Saint Stephen, Spitalfields, shall, with the consent of the Bishop of London, retire from his Incumbency in order that the said union may take immediate effect, then the Incumbent so retiring from his Incumbency shall be entitled, during the period hereinafter specified, to receive out of the annual income of the United Benefice and by way of compensation an annual sum of £346 16s. 4d. consisting of the income at present paid by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, to the Incumbent of the said Benefice of Saint Stephen, Spitalfields; namely: (a) a sum of £188 7s. 4d. per annum payable quarterly on the 1st day of February, the 1st day of May, the 1st day of August, and the 1st day of November in each and every year, and (b) the dividends amounting to £158 9s. per annum in respect of a sum of £5,281 14s. 2d. Local Loans £3 per cent. Stock, such annual sum to commence to be payable as from the day on which the said union shall take effect, and to be payable to the retiring Incumbent upon the quarterly days upon which the said payments are received by the Incumbent of the United Benefice during the remainder of the life of the retiring Incumbent if he continue to be a member of the Church of England or until he shall accept other Church preferment of a net annual value equal to or greater in amount than the said annual sum to be so paid to such retiring Incumbent, but upon his accepting such preferment the said annual sum shall thenceforth absolutely cease to be payable, and if he shall accept other Church preferment of a less net annual value (to be ascertained without reference to, and exclusively of, the house of residence, if any) than £346 16s. 4d. then whilst he shall hold such other preferment the said annual sum of £346 16s. 4d. shall in each year be reduced by a sum equal in amount to the net annual sum (to be ascertained as aforesaid) payable to him for the said year in respect of such other preferment. Provided always that if such retiring Incumbent shall hereafter be convicted of any offence which in the case of a clergyman holding preferment would be an offence against the Ecclesiastical Law the punishment for which would be deprivation or suspension his right to receive such annual sum, payable by way of compensation as aforesaid, shall cease or shall be suspended as from the date of such conviction. And provided also that if the same annual sum, or any part thereof, payable by way of compensation as aforesaid, shall cease to be payable to such retiring Incumbent by his ceasing to be a member of the Church of England as aforesaid, or by his being convicted of any offence against the Ecclesiastical Law as aforesaid, or by his acceptance of such Church preferment as aforesaid, or by his death (as the case may be) on any day other than one of the quarterly days of payment, then he or his executors or administrators shall be entitled to a proportionate part of the said annual sum for the period which, at the time of such cesser, shall have elapsed of the current quarter, which proportionate part shall be payable at the end of that current quarter.

"4. That the said annual sum shall be charged upon the annual income of the United Benefice and shall be payable out of the same by the Incumbent for the time being of the United Benefice, and as between the Incumbent for the time being of the United Benefice and the retiring Incumbent and his assigns the said annual sum shall be a first charge at law and in equity upon the income of the United Benefice and the Incumbent of the United Benefice shall be deemed to have accepted the same subject to a trust to pay to the said retiring Incumbent or his assigns the said annual sum out of the income of the said United Benefice and for that purpose to use all due diligence to receive and collect the income of the said United Benefice: and that, if any part of such annual sum shall at any time be in arrear and unpaid for more than 28 days after it has been paid to the Incumbent of the United Benefice and the fact of the same being so in arrear shall be verified by the declaration of the Incumbent who shall have so retired or his assigns, or in such other or further manner as shall be required by the Bishop of London, it shall be lawful for the said Bishop to make an order upon the Incumbent for the time being of the United Benefice requiring him to pay the amount in arrear within a time to be specified in such order and, if the same be not paid within such period, then it shall be lawful for the said Bishop to sequester the profits of the said United Benefice until all such arrears and the costs of the sequestration shall have been paid and satisfied, but the power to be so conferred upon the said Bishop shall not in any wise abridge or interfere with the rights of the Incumbent who shall have so retired, or his assigns, to recover the said annual sum and all arrears thereof by proceedings at law or in equity, or with the legal or equitable rights of the Incumbent for the time being of the United Benefice to recover from the preceding Incumbent of the United Benefice, his executors or administrators, any arrears of the said annual sum which ought to have been paid by such preceding Incumbent.

"PART II.

"As to the Parish Church of the United Benefice and the Church of Saint Stephen, Spitalfields, and certain officers of the same and certain matters connected therewith, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further recommend and propose:—

"1. That upon the union taking effect, Christ Church, Spitalfields, shall become, and thereafter continue to be the Parish Church of the United Benefice.

"2. That upon the union taking effect the font, communion table, sacramental plate, furniture and fittings of the Church of Saint Stephen, Spitalfields, or such of them as the Parochial Church Council of the United Benefice shall select, shall be transferred to the Church of the United Benefice; but such of these articles as shall not be claimed by the said Parochial Church Council for the Church of the United Benefice shall be transferred to such church or chapel within the Diocese of London as the Bishop may select; provided always that any articles which shall not be appropriated in any of the above ways, except the font, communion table and sacramental

plate, may be sold and the proceeds shall be added to the aggregate fund which is contemplated by Part V of this Scheme; and any monuments in the Church of Saint Stephen, Spitalfields, which may not be claimed by those who, under the said Union of Benefices Act, 1860, have a right to claim them, shall be re-erected in the Church of the United Benefice or transferred to such other Church as the Bishop of London may direct.

" 3. That upon the union taking effect, if the tables of fees used in the two Churches be alike in all particulars the table of fees used in the Church which will become the Church of the United Benefice shall (until revised or altered by proper authority) be the table of fees for the United Parishes, but if such tables of fees be not alike in all particulars the same shall be of no authority and a new table of fees shall be made by the proper authority for the use of the United Parish.

" 4. That upon the union taking effect the register books of baptisms, marriages and burials of the New Parish of Saint Stephen, Spitalfields, shall be transferred to the Parish Church of the said United Benefice, but the marriage registers (in duplicate) shall in the first place be sent by the Incumbent of the United Benefice to the Registrar General to be closed officially.

" 5. That as soon as conveniently may be after the union has taken effect, the Church of Saint Stephen, Spitalfields, shall be taken down.

" 6. That, subject to the provisions contained in Clause 2 of this Part of this Scheme, the furniture or fittings (other than the font, communion table, and sacramental plate) and the materials and site of the said Church, together with any ground annexed thereto and necessary for the use and enjoyment thereof, shall be sold and disposed of by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, at such time or times and in such manner in all respects as to us shall seem expedient, subject to the provisions of the 17th section of the said Union of Benefices Act, 1860.

" 7. That upon the union taking effect, any one or more of the Church Servants of the Church of Saint Stephen, Spitalfields, whose services shall in consequence of the union be no longer required, shall receive by way of compensation for the loss of his, her or their offices such gratuity or gratuities as having regard to age, length of tenure of office, and other circumstances of the case, shall seem to us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, and to the Bishop of the said Diocese of London equitable and proper: such gratuity or gratuities to be paid by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, out of the proceeds of the sale or sales contemplated by this Scheme and, if necessary, to be advanced out of the fund created by the 22nd section of the said Union of Benefices Act, 1860.

" 8. That after the union has taken effect no Church Servant shall have any larger estate and interest in his Office than he possessed in his original office before the union.

" PART III.

" As to the endowments and Parsonage House of the United Benefice, we, the said

Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further recommend and propose:—

" 1. That upon the union taking effect all the properties revenues and income constituting the endowments of the Benefice of Christ Church, Spitalfields, with Saint Mary, Spitalfields, and of the Benefice of Saint Stephen, Spitalfields, shall be transferred and annexed to the United Benefice, and that so soon after the union taking effect as any compensation payment hereinbefore provided to be paid to a retiring Incumbent shall have ceased and determined or shall have been diminished in accordance with any provision in that behalf hereinbefore contained, the Incumbent at that time of the said United Benefice and his successors shall be entitled to retain a part of the existing endowments of the said Benefice of Saint Stephen, Spitalfields, such part being (a) a sum of £57 13s. 6d. per annum payable quarterly by us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners on the 1st day of February, the 1st day of May, the 1st day of August and the 1st day of November in each and every year, and (b) the dividends amounting to £158 9s. 0d. per annum in respect of the said sum of £5,281 14s. 3d. Local Loans £3 per cent. Stock held by us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners in trust for the said Benefice of Saint Stephen, Spitalfields, or so much of these sums as shall have been set free by such cesser or diminution as hereinbefore mentioned of the aforesaid compensation payment and that the residue of the endowments of the said Benefice of Saint Stephen, Spitalfields, shall be applied in such manner as may be directed by us for or towards the endowment of the new District constituted or to be constituted as contemplated by Part VI of this Scheme, and until such new District shall have been constituted any income arising in respect of such residue shall be paid to or retained by us and be accumulated by us towards the endowment of such new District.

" 2. That upon the union taking effect the present Parsonage House of the Benefice of Christ Church, Spitalfields, with Saint Mary, Spitalfields, shall be the Parsonage House of the United Benefice, and the present Parsonage House of the Benefice of Saint Stephen, Spitalfields, shall be vested in us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, and shall be sold and disposed of by us at such time or times and in such manner in all respects as to us shall seem expedient, and that the net annual rent which may be derived from the letting of such Parsonage House pending such sale or sales and the net proceeds arising from such sale or sales shall form part of the aggregate fund referred to in Part V hereof and shall be applied by us to the purposes therein mentioned provided always that if the present Parsonage House of Saint Stephen, Spitalfields, is let by us for church purposes we shall be at liberty so long as we see fit to let the property for such purposes to require no more than a nominal rent for the property.

" PART IV.

" Upon the subject of Patronage, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further recommend and propose:—

" 1. That on the day preceding the date of the union taking effect the Patronage of the said Benefice of Saint Stephen, Spitalfields,

which is now vested in the Church Patronage Trustees shall without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than the duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme be transferred from the said Church Patronage Trustees and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in the said Arthur Foley, Bishop of London, and his successors for ever, and that in exchange for such Patronage so transferred the Patronage of the Benefice (being a Vicarage) of Saint Jude, Bethnal Green, in the said County of Middlesex and in the said Diocese of London, which Patronage is now vested in the said Arthur Foley, Bishop of London, as such Bishop, shall in like manner and by the same authority and upon and as from the same date be transferred from the said Arthur Foley, Bishop of the said Diocese of London, and his successors Bishops of the same Diocese, and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in the said Church Patronage Trustees their heirs and assigns for ever.

"2. That the whole Patronage of the United Benefice shall be vested in the Bishop of London for the time being.

"PART V.

"As to the proceeds of any sale or sales of the materials, site, furniture, or fittings of the existing Church of Saint Stephen, Spitalfields, and the Parsonage House thereof, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further recommend and propose that the net proceeds to arise from the sale or sales to be made by us as aforesaid shall form one aggregate fund and shall be applied (a) for the payment of the gratuity or gratuities which are contemplated by Clause 7 of Part II of this Scheme, and (b) for or towards the acquisition of a suitable site for and the erection of a new Church within the limits of the said new District constituted or to be constituted as contemplated by Part VI of this Scheme, and to be erected as the Church of such new District, and (c) the provision of a Parsonage House for the same new District.

"PART VI.

"As to a certain new District we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further recommend and propose:—

"1. That an ecclesiastical District within the limits of the Metropolis or within the vicinity of the Metropolis as defined by the said Union of Benefices Act, 1898 (such District having then been or being then about to be formed or legally constituted under some or one of the Acts of Parliament relating to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England authorising the formation or constitution of such District), shall be selected by the Bishop of London as the District for which a Church shall be built and a Parsonage House provided as hereinbefore recommended.

"2. That the Patronage of such new District shall be vested in the Bishop of London for the time being.

"3. That when a Church for such new District has been built as hereinafter recommended it shall be consecrated by the name and style of Saint Stephen or by such other name as the Bishop of London shall approve.

"Provided always that this Scheme shall not take effect until the consents and approval which, by the 17th Section of the said Union of Benefices Act, 1860, are made requisite to the sale or letting or appropriation under the powers conferred by that Act of the site of any Church shall be obtained to the sale and appropriation hereby proposed of the Church of Saint Stephen, Spitalfields, and of the site thereof, together with any ground annexed thereto and necessary for the use and enjoyment thereof, and to the mode of dealing with such site which is hereby proposed.

"And provided also that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of any of them, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said Scheme has been laid before both Houses of Parliament for the space of two calendar months:

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of London.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Union of Benefices Measure, 1923, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Scheme bearing date the 21st day of November, 1929, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting in pursuance of the Union of Benefices Measure, 1923, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for effecting the union of the Benefice (being a Rectory) of Frilsham and the Benefice (being a Rectory) of Yattendon, both of which Benefices are situate in the County of Berks and in the Diocese of Oxford:

"Whereas Commissioners appointed at our request by the Right Reverend Thomas Banks, Bishop of Oxford, pursuant to the provisions of the said Union of Benefices Measure, 1923, to inquire into and report upon the union of the said two Benefices of Frilsham and Yattendon duly made their Report to the said Bishop of Oxford and therein recommended the union of the said two Benefices and the terms for effecting the union, and the said Bishop of

Oxford signified in writing his approval of the said Report:

"And whereas we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, have prepared this Scheme for the union of the said two Benefices based upon the terms recommended in the said Report:

"And whereas both of the said Benefices of Frilsham and Yattendon are now full, the Reverend Joseph Thomas Parfit being the present Incumbent of the said Benefice of Frilsham and the Reverend John Ernest Smith-Masters being the present Incumbent of the said Benefice of Yattendon:

"Now, therefore, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, with the consent of the said Thomas Banks, Bishop of Oxford (in testimony whereof he has signed this Scheme), do humbly recommend and propose to Your Majesty as follows, that is to say:—

"1. That the said Benefice of Frilsham and the said Benefice of Yattendon shall be permanently united together and form one Benefice with cure of souls under the style of 'The United Benefice of Yattendon with Frilsham,' but the Parishes of the said Benefices shall continue distinct in all respects.

"2. That if upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme shall be published in the London Gazette both of the said two Benefices shall be vacant the union of the same two Benefices shall take effect forthwith; and if one only of the said two Benefices shall be then vacant the said union shall take effect upon the next avoidance of the other of the said two Benefices; and if neither of the said two Benefices be then vacant the said union shall take effect upon the next avoidance of that one of the said two Benefices which shall last be avoided after the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme.

"3. That upon the said union taking effect the Parsonage House at present belonging to the said Benefice of Yattendon shall become and be the house of residence for the Incumbent of the United Benefice and so soon as conveniently may be the Parsonage House at present belonging to the said Benefice of Frilsham and the site and appurtenances thereof and the grounds heretofore usually occupied and enjoyed therewith shall be sold and disposed of by us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners at such time or times and in such manner in all respects as to us shall seem expedient and that the net proceeds of such sale shall constitute and form part of the Expenses Fund established pursuant to the 32nd Section of the said Union of Benefices Measure, 1923.

"4. That after the said union has taken effect the course and succession in which the respective Patrons shall present or nominate to the United Benefice from time to time as the same shall become vacant shall be as follows, that is to say, the right of presentation shall be exercised by the Patrons of the said two Benefices alternately, and the first turn of presentation or nomination to be made to the United Benefice after the union shall belong to the Patron of that one of the said two Benefices of Frilsham and Yattendon an Incumbent of which does not become the first Incumbent

of the United Benefice under any of the provisions of Clause 2 of this Scheme.

"5. That upon the union taking effect all the Tithe rentcharges Glebe lands and all other the endowments belonging to the said United Benefice or which may hereafter belong to the same United Benefice shall be charged and for ever after be chargeable in favour of the Incumbent for the time being of the Benefice of Lambourne, in the said Diocese of Oxford, with the annual sum or yearly rentcharge hereinafter mentioned that is to say a clear annual sum or yearly rentcharge of £118; the same annual sum or yearly rentcharge to be as from the date of the said union taking effect due and payable to the Incumbent of the said Benefice of Lambourne, and the said annual sum or yearly rentcharge to be apportionable between any outgoing Incumbent of the said Benefice of Lambourne or his representatives on the one hand and his successor in the same Incumbency on the other hand and to be receivable by the Incumbent in whose favour it is charged as aforesaid by equal half yearly payments on the first day of May and the first day of November in every year and for the recovery of the said yearly rentcharge the Incumbent of the said Benefice of Lambourne and his successors shall have and be entitled to all the powers and remedies provided by Sections 121 and 122 of the Law of Property Act, 1925, in respect of rentcharges to which those Sections apply. Provided always that if at any time the Incumbent for the time being of the said United Benefice shall by any deed duly executed by him under his hand and seal in accordance with the provisions of any Statute in that behalf enabling him, grant, convey and annex to the said Benefice of Lambourne any part or parts of the endowments belonging to the said United Benefice which shall in the opinion of the Bishop of Oxford for the time being be a just and fair equivalent or not less than an equivalent for the said yearly rentcharge hereby proposed to be created as aforesaid then such annual sum or yearly rentcharge shall thereupon and thenceforth cease and be no longer payable.

"Provided always that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Measure, or of any other Measure of the National Assembly of the Church of England, or of any Act of Parliament."

And whereas drafts of the said Scheme have been duly published in accordance with the provisions of the said Union of Benefices Measure, 1923, and Notices have been transmitted to the persons or bodies entitled under the same Measure to receive Notice requiring any objections to such draft Scheme to be stated or transmitted in writing to the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners within the time prescribed in the Statutory Rules applicable to proceedings under the said Union of Benefices Measure, 1923:

And whereas certain objections have been so stated or transmitted to the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners within the time prescribed in the same Rules:

And whereas the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners after giving full consideration to such

objections have deemed right to make no alterations in such draft Scheme:

And whereas public notice of the certification to His Majesty in Council of the said Scheme and the consent thereto in writing of the Bishop of Oxford has been duly given in the manner and within the time prescribed in the Statutory Rules aforesaid:

And whereas no appeal has been made to His Majesty in Council within the period of one month after the date of the said public notice in accordance with the provisions of the said Measure against the said Scheme or any part thereof by any person who has made objection as aforesaid to the said draft Scheme:

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to affirm the said Scheme and to order that the Benefices therein recommended to be united shall be united to the extent and for the purposes recommended in the said Scheme, and further to order and direct that the said Scheme and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the date when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Measure.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Oxford.

“We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the 6th and 7th years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, Chapter 77, and of the Act of the 5th and 6th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 26, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for authorising certain improvements at the Archbishop's Residence belonging to the See of York, which is situate at Bishopthorpe in the County of York:

“Whereas the Right Honourable and Most Reverend William, now Archbishop of York, is desirous that certain improvements should be made at the said Archbishop's Residence and has submitted to us the particulars of such improvements and we have specified our general approval of the same:

“And whereas the said Archbishop is also desirous and it appears to us to be expedient that towards the cost of effecting the aforesaid improvements a sum of £200 (being a sum which together with the outstanding balance of the sums already borrowed upon the same security under the authority of the statutes hereinbefore mentioned, does not exceed two years income of the See) should be provided by his borrowing the same by way of mortgage upon the security of all and every part of the lands tenements and hereditaments endowments or emoluments which now belong or may hereafter belong to the Archbishopric of York:

“Now, therefore, with the consent of the said William, Archbishop of York (testified by his having affixed his signature and Archbishop's Seal to this Scheme), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that the said Archbishop be authorised to borrow from the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and that the said Governors be empowered to lend under the provisions of the above mentioned Acts any sum not exceeding £200 and that as a security for the same the said Archbishop do mortgage all and every part of the lands, tenements and hereditaments and endowments or emoluments which now belong or may hereafter belong to his said See to the said Governors by Deed for a term of 12 years or until the said sum of £200 with interest for the same as hereinafter mentioned, and all costs and charges which may attend the recovery thereof, shall be fully paid and satisfied and that such principal sum shall be repaid with interest in the manner following, that is to say, during and in respect of the first period of 12 months of the said term computed from the day of the date of the mortgage, no part of the said principal sum shall be repayable but the said Archbishop or his successors shall yearly at the end of the second period of 12 months so computed and at the end of every such like period of 12 months thereafter, pay to the said Governors their successors or assigns one tenth part of the said principal sum of £200 until the whole thereof shall be repaid, and shall also at the end of the first and each succeeding period of 12 months, computed as aforesaid, pay interest at the rate of £4 per centum per annum on the said principal sum or on so much thereof as shall from time to time remain unpaid. And that if and when it shall happen that either the principal or the interest directed to be paid as hereinbefore mentioned shall be in arrear and unpaid for the space of 40 days after the same shall have become due it shall and may be lawful for the said Governors their successors and assigns to recover the same and the costs and charges attending the recovery thereof by distress and sale in the like manner as rents may be recovered by landlords or lessors from their tenants by the laws in force at the time of such distress and sale. And that such mortgage deed shall be in the form and to the effect to be approved by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, and shall bind as well the said William, now Archbishop of York, as every succeeding Archbishop of York, until the principal money and interest costs and charges shall have been paid off and discharged.

"And we further recommend and propose that the said sum of £200 so to be borrowed as aforesaid shall be paid to us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, that the said Governors and their successors shall not be bound or required to see to the application thereof, and that upon the receipt of the said sum so to be borrowed as aforesaid the whole or any part or parts thereof shall be applied by us at such time or times and in such manner as shall appear to us to be expedient towards effecting the said proposed improvements at the Archbishop's Residence aforesaid.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them in conformity with the provisions of the herein named Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of York.

Benefice') of Fawkham, in the County of Kent, and in the Diocese of Rochester:

"Whereas by an Indenture made the 22nd day of November, 1929, between Nora Daune, of Number 19, Blomfield Road, Paddington, London, Widow, Gertrude Annie Worthington-Evans, of Number 6, Eaton Place, in the said County of London, the wife of the Right Honourable Sir Laming Worthington-Evans, Baronet, G.B.E., M.P., and Sydney Edward Jones, of Number 2, Suffolk Lane, Cannon Street, in the City of London, Esquire, of the one part and the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Rochester (hereinafter called 'the said Dean and Chapter') of the other part, after reciting that the said Nora Daune, Gertrude Annie Worthington-Evans, and Sydney Edward Jones were seised in fee simple of the alternate right of Patronage of and presentation to the said Benefice of Fawkham, it was witnessed that in consideration of the sum of £100 the said Nora Daune, Gertrude Annie Worthington-Evans, and Sydney Edward Jones did thereby convey unto the said Dean and Chapter the said alternate right of Patronage of and presentation to the said Benefice of Fawkham, to hold the same unto and to the use of the said Dean and Chapter in fee simple:

"And whereas by a second Indenture also made the 22nd day of November, 1929, between Philip Francis Bouverie Pusey, of Pusey House, Faringdon, in the County of Berks, Esquire, of the one part, and the said Dean and Chapter of the other part, after reciting that the said Philip Francis Bouverie Pusey was seised in fee simple of the other alternate right of Patronage of and presentation to the said Benefice of Fawkham, it was witnessed, that in consideration of the sum of £100 the said Philip Francis Bouverie Pusey did thereby convey unto the said Dean and Chapter the said other alternate right of Patronage of and presentation to the said Benefice of Fawkham, to hold the same unto and to the use of the said Dean and Chapter in fee simple:

"And whereas the said Conveyances were made with the intention of vesting the whole of the said Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to the said Benefice of Fawkham in the said Dean and Chapter, and the parties thereto are desirous that anything which by way of further assurance or otherwise may be required effectually to carry out that intention may be done, and have applied to us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, that a Scheme under the Acts hereinbefore mentioned may be prepared for the said purpose and submitted to Your Majesty in Council:

"And whereas the said Nora Daune, Gertrude Annie Worthington-Evans, Sydney Edward Jones, and Philip Francis Bouverie Pusey and the said Dean and Chapter are consenting to this Scheme and in token of such consent have executed this Scheme as herein-after mentioned:

"And whereas the Right Reverend John Reginald, now Bishop of Rochester, has executed this Scheme as herein-after mentioned in token that the same transfer has that consent of the Bishop of the Diocese which by the Acts in the hereinbefore mentioned Act recited or by some or one of them is made necessary:

" And whereas the transfer of the Patronage of the said Benefice of Fawkham which is hereinbefore mentioned and hereinafter recommended and proposed will in our opinion tend to make better provision for the cure of souls in the Parish or District in or in respect of which the right of Patronage or Advowson so recommended and proposed to be transferred as aforesaid arises or exists, that is to say, in the Parish of Fawkham :

" Now, therefore, with the consent of the said Nora Dauney, Gertrude Annie Worthington-Evans, Sydney Edward Jones, and Philip Francis Bouverie Pusey (in testimony whereof they have signed and sealed this Scheme), and with the consent of the said Dean and Chapter (in testimony whereof they have caused their Common or Capitular Seal to be affixed to this Scheme), and with the consent of the said John Reginald, Bishop of Rochester (in testimony whereof he has signed this Scheme and sealed the same with his Episcopal Seal), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the whole Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to the said Benefice of Fawkham shall be transferred to the said Dean and Chapter and their successors, and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Dean and Chapter and by their successors for ever.

" And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council :

His Majesty The KING has been graciously pleased to make the posthumous award of the Decoration of the Albert Medal in recognition of the gallantry displayed by Mr. Alexander Johnston and Mr. William Hall, Chief Engineer and Second Engineer respectively, of the s.s. "Tritonia," of Glasgow.

The following is an account of the services in respect of which the Decoration has been awarded.

The s.s. "Tritonia," of Glasgow, with a general cargo on board and a quantity of

explosives in No. 3 hold, arrived at Buenaventura, Columbia, on the 27th February, 1929. On the following day the discharging of the cargo was begun, a shore gang being employed for the purpose. During the afternoon a fire was discovered among the cases of dynamite which were stowed in the bridge space of No. 3 hold; the alarm was at once given, and the shore gang with most of the crew left the ship.

The Master, Officers, and a few members of the crew who remained on board immediately took steps to deal with the fire. Unfortunately they were unable to control it and the ship had to be abandoned owing to the intense heat and dense smoke as well as the danger of explosion.

Upon reaching the shore the Master, after consultation with the Port Authorities, decided to try to sink the "Tritonia," because of the danger of serious damage to persons and property in the port if the explosives on the ship blew up. Accordingly the Master and the Chief Engineer and Second Engineer (Mr. A. Johnston and Mr. W. Hall respectively) went back to the burning ship. The two Engineer Officers went on board for the purpose of opening the sea cocks. The launch drew off and waited until it was seen that the two Engineers were approaching the ship's side in readiness to leave again. The launch was about to proceed to the "Tritonia" to take off the two officers when the ship blew up and both Engineers were killed.

The launch was severely damaged and those on board were taken on to another launch which cruised about for some time in a vain search for the missing Engineers before returning to the shore.

The two Engineers, fully aware of the very serious risk they ran, sacrificed their lives in a heroic attempt to prevent the explosion.

AGRICULTURAL WAGES (REGULATION)
ACT, 1924.

Whereas the Agricultural Wages Committee for the area comprising the administrative county of Durham which, for the purposes of the Agricultural Wages (Regulation) Act, 1924, shall be deemed to include the county boroughs of Darlington, Gateshead, South Shields, Sunderland and West Hartlepool, have in pursuance of the above Act, duly fixed minimum and overtime rates of wages for workers employed in agriculture for time work in that area, and the said rates are set out in the Schedule to this Order. Now the Agricultural Wages Board, in pursuance of the said Act, and for the purpose of carrying out the decision of the said Committee, hereby order that the provisions contained in the Schedule to this Order shall become effective from the 14th day of May, 1930.

SCHEDULE.

1. The Wages payable for the employment of male workers of 21 years of age and over (other than casual workers) shall be not less than wages at the following minimum rates:—

(a) Workers employed wholly or mainly as horsemen:—

(i) Workers who are householders: 32s. per week of 50 hours with in addition 7s. per week to cover all time customarily spent in attention to horses.

(ii) Workers who are not householders and do not receive board and lodging provided by the employer: 31s. per week of 50 hours with in addition 3s. 6d. per week to cover all time customarily spent in attention to horses.

(iii) Workers who receive board and lodging provided by the employer: 31s. (which sum shall include the value of such board and lodging as defined by the Committee) per week of 50 hours and any additional time customarily spent in attention to horses.

(b) Workers employed wholly or mainly as stockmen or shepherds:—

(i) Workers who are householders: 43s. per week of the hours customarily spent in attention to stock.

(ii) Workers who are not householders and do not receive board and lodging provided by the employer: 36s. 10½d. per week of the hours customarily spent in attention to stock.

(iii) Workers who receive board and lodging provided by the employer: 35s. (which sum shall include the value of such board and lodging as defined by the Committee) per week of the hours customarily spent in attention to stock.

(c) Other male workers (except casual workers): 31s. per week of 50 hours (excluding Sunday, Christmas Day and Good Friday).

2. The wages payable for the employment of male workers under 21 years of age (other than casual workers of 19 years of age and over) shall be not less than wages at the following minimum rates:—

3. The wages payable for the employment of male casual workers of 19 years of age and over shall be not less than wages at the rate of 6d. per hour.

4. For the purpose of the above rates a casual worker shall be deemed to be a worker employed by the same employer for any number of days, whether consecutive or otherwise, not exceeding 28 in any one year.

5. Where a whole-time male worker is employed by the week or any longer period and the hours of work agreed between the worker and the employer in any week (excluding hours of overtime employment) are:—

(a) In the case of a horseman of 21 years of age or over less than 50 hours and time customarily spent in attention to horses,

(b) In the case of a stockman or shepherd of 21 years of age or over less than customary hours,

(c) In the case of any other male worker of 21 years of age or over less than 50 hours, or

(d) In the case of any male worker under 21 years of age less than 50 hours and time customarily spent in attention to horses or stock,

the rates of wages applicable to that worker shall be such as to secure to the worker the wages which would have been payable if the agreed hours had been the full hours mentioned above in the case of that worker.

6. The expression "week" means a week of employment of the worker.

7. The wages payable for the employment of female workers shall be not less than wages at the following minimum rates:—

18 years of age and over, 2s. 6d. per day (other than Sunday, Christmas Day and Good Friday) of 8 hours.

14 and under 18 years of age, 2s. per day (other than Sunday, Christmas Day and Good Friday) of 8 hours.

8. For the purpose of the above rates, the hours of work shall not include meal times, but shall include any time during which by reason of weather conditions an employer has prevented from working a worker who was present at the place of employment and ready to work.

9. The differential rates of wages for overtime employment shall be not less than the following minimum rates:—

(a) Male workers of 21 years of age and over (other than casual workers):—

- (a) Horsemen, stockmen or shepherds of 21 years of age and over, or
- (b) Any worker under 21 years of age,

in attention to horses or stock.

2.—(a) In the case of male workers of 21 years of age and over employed wholly or mainly as horsemen:—

(i) All employment on a Sunday, Christmas Day and Good Friday except time customarily spent in attention to horses.

(ii) All employment in any week in excess of 50 hours (excluding all hours which are to be treated as hours of overtime employment) and any time customarily spent in attention to horses.

(b) In the case of male workers of 21 years of age and over employed wholly or mainly as stockmen or shepherds all employment in any week (including Sunday, Christmas Day and Good Friday) in excess of the hours customarily spent in attention to stock.

(c) In the case of other male workers (except casual workers of 19 years of age and over):—

(i) All employment on a Sunday, Christmas Day and Good Friday except that in the case of workers under 21 years of age

no time customarily spent in attention to horses or stock shall rank as overtime employment.

(ii) All employment in any week in excess of 50 hours (excluding all hours which are to be treated as hours of overtime employment) except that in the case of workers under 21 years of age no time customarily spent, whether on weekdays, Sundays, Christmas Day or Good Friday, in attention to horses or stock shall rank as overtime employment.

3. In the case of female workers:—

(i) All employment on a Sunday, Christmas Day and Good Friday.

(ii) All employment in any week (excluding Sunday, Christmas Day and Good Friday) in excess of 44 hours.

1. In the case of male workers (other than casual workers of 19 years of age and over):

All employment after 12 noon on Saturday except time customarily spent by

(a) Horsemen, stockmen or shepherds of 21 years of age and over, or

(b) Any worker under 21 years of age in attention to horses or stock.

2.—(a) In the case of male workers of 21 years of age and over employed wholly or mainly as horsemen:

(i) All employment on a Sunday, Christmas Day and Good Friday except time customarily spent in attention to horses.

(ii) All employment in any week in excess of 50 hours (excluding all hours which are to be treated as hours of overtime employment) and any time customarily spent in attention to horses.

(b) In the case of male workers of 21 years of age and over employed wholly or mainly as stockmen or shepherds all employment in any week (including Sunday, Christmas Day and Good Friday) in excess of the hours customarily spent in attention to stock.

(c) In the case of other male workers (except casual workers of 19 years of age and over):

(i) All employment on a Sunday, Christmas Day and Good Friday except that in the case of workers under 21 years of age no time customarily spent in attention to horses or stock shall rank as overtime employment.

(ii) All employment in any week in excess of 50 hours (excluding all hours which are to be treated as hours of overtime employment) except that in the case of workers under 21 years of age no time customarily spent whether on weekdays, Sundays, Christmas Day or Good Friday in attention to horses or stock shall rank as overtime employment.

3. In the case of female workers:—

(i) All employment on a Sunday, Christmas Day and Good Friday.

(ii) All employment in any week (excluding Sunday, Christmas Day and Good Friday) in excess of 44 hours.

For the purpose of this Order a casual worker shall be deemed to be a worker employed by the same employer for any number of days, whether consecutive or otherwise, not exceeding 28 in any one year.

Whereas the Agricultural Wages Committee for the area comprising the administrative counties of the Parts of Kesteven and Lindsey Divisions of Lincolnshire, which, for the purposes of the Agricultural Wages (Regulation) Act, 1924, shall be deemed to include the city and county borough of Lincoln, and the county borough of Grimsby, have in pursuance of the above Act duly fixed minimum and overtime rates of wages for workers employed in agriculture for time work in that area and the said rates are set out in the Schedule to this Order. Now the Agricultural Wages Board, in pursuance of the said Act, and for the purpose of carrying out the decision of the said Committee, hereby order that the provisions contained in the Schedule to this Order shall become effective from the 3rd day of March, 1930.

(a) In the case of flocks ranging from 50 to 100 sheep—£3 10s. 0d.

(b) For every additional 100 sheep, £1 and so in proportion in respect of smaller numbers over 100.

(iii) In the case of workers of 21 years of age and over employed wholly or mainly as stockmen, 38s. per week of 53 hours in summer and 48 hours in winter and such additional hours as may be required by the employer for the performance of customary duties in connection with the care of stock, but so that the total number of hours per week shall not exceed 56 in summer and 58 in winter.

(iv) Provided that nothing in this Order shall prejudice the right of any worker to be paid at a rate not less than the minimum rate of wages fixed for overtime employment in the fields:—

(a) In hay or corn harvest.

(b) In late potato harvest, while engaged in this work.

(b) In the case of all other male workers:—

(d) In the case of all other male workers, less than 48 in winter or 53 in summer,

the rate of wages applicable to that worker shall be such as to secure to that worker the wages which would have been payable if the agreed hours had been the full hours mentioned above in the case of that worker.

4. For the purpose of the above rates employment in summer shall be deemed to be employment during the period commencing on the first Monday in March and terminating on the day before the first Monday in November, and em-

ployment in winter shall be deemed to be employment during the rest of the year.

5. For the purpose of the above rates, the hours of work shall not include meal times, but shall include any time during which by reason of weather conditions an employer has prevented from working a worker who was present at the place of employment and ready to work.

6. The differential rates of wages for overtime employment in the case of male workers shall be not less than the following minimum rates:—

(b) All employment after 1 o'clock in the afternoon of such day as is above referred to.

(c) All employment on a Sunday.

(d) All employment in excess of 53 hours (excluding all hours which are treated as hours of overtime employment) in any week in summer.

(e) All employment in excess of 48 hours (excluding all hours which are treated as hours of overtime employment) in any week in winter.

2. In the case of male workers employed wholly or mainly as:—

(a) *Waggoners*:

(1) All employment in any week in excess of 61 hours during the period commencing on the 15th October and ending on the 13th May.

(2) All employment in any week in excess of 58 hours during the remainder of the year.

(b) *Shepherds* of 21 years of age and over:

(1) All employment in any week in excess of 55 hours in summer.

(2) All employment in any week in excess of 56 hours in winter,

but so that no employment on customary duties in connection with the care of sheep during the lambing season on the premises

on which the worker is employed shall rank as overtime employment.

(c) *Stockmen* of 21 years of age and over :

(1) All employment in any week in excess of 56 hours in summer.

(2) All employment in any week in excess of 58 hours in winter,

provided that in the case of all workers specified in Clause 2 (a), (b) and (c) above, all employment other than employment on customary duties in connection with the care of horses, sheep and stock respectively in excess of 53 hours per week in summer and 48 hours per week in winter shall be deemed to be overtime employment.

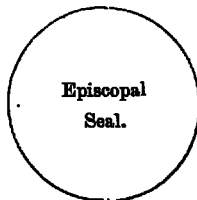
