had with extraodinary counge made a fally-upon the Tarks, which though performed with great cecurion upon the Enemy, was not without connterable lofs of many of their own which were killed upon the place, and fevesal athers wounded, adding farther, thas the Tuiks had gained fo much ground upon the City , that withour an extraordinary fuccor it could not be able to make any long sd Giltance.

Amfter̀dam, Feb. 1. This day was made an E'ection of Bourgomafters for this City, the chaice talling upon the Heer Cornelis Van Vloofwiti, Geeric Haffder, Ni:holas Pank cras, and coomrard tran Beiningen.

From the TexeTtbey tell us, thar the feas being now prerzy well cleared from the Ice, the Merchanes ihips begin again to appear; bur by à late great florm at fea, leveral flips ate faid to have been caft sway in the River of Ranes and a.thers upon thes Englifh coaftsis amongit many otbets, we are particularly told otit the lo's of one friffof Hamband and another of Dorss with a confiderable fraught.
From cadis we aretold of the fafe arrival there of the Convoy which parted from the Itxel in Nooumber lalt, whereof five ofthat number were gone forwards, and were prit tie streights on their way for Malagi, and that the Rosterdam Convoy was lafely there arrved the $30: h$ of Decemberfoon Malaga, and intended in four or five days to put to tea in oraer to their voyage homewards.
Several hips belonging to 2 eatand were in that way to sfalagazatt nded by the Corlairs of Barbary, and had ran much hazard, had not the men of war, their Convoy. timeIy come up with them, upon whofe appearance the Turks made off again to fea and left them, of which Convoy were arived there the firft paft, the orange brauch, and Golder Lyan, and the reft daily expetted.

Paris, Feb. 6. The Diums are already beating for Volunceers to ferve under the Command of the Mareitial de Bellefords. wha upon tis own expence, intends to raife two thoufand men for the affittance of the Republick of Venice, in the defence of candia, be pretending not to enter upen that Cervice as a Ma eihal of France, bue as a Chritian for the insereft of Religion, on which accourt he will not be over fcrupulous in receiving Orders from the Venetian Gemeral. Monlisur de Turenne intends alfoto raife a Regimeno of two thoufand for the fame fer ife, which with fome othar Companies may be joysed with 4000 of the Popes forces, which are now raining for the fame imployment.

From Wurwbuxg in Fra:conia, we are advifed, that the $s_{12 t}$ paft, 3000 of the Dubes ol Lunenburg forces paflied by what paceon their way for Candia, inteading foto order their mareh, as to arrive theie wirhin tre fpace of one moneth.
His Majeilly has been plenfed to concurre wish shie Duke of Lorrain's defires, upon the disbanding of the reft ofthis Atmy, to grant him the liberty of keeping fill in Arms Twelve hundred Foot and Six hu idred Horlo for the guard of his perfon: that Duke his already disbanded the greaten part of his forcessbut from Pomb-a-Moufon we are told, that the German Regimenes of Horfe difnilled from his fer-s yise, have commitred many violencies in the Councrey, adventuring alfo co plunder fome houles in the Tuwn, whereof complaints being made to the Duke of Lorraing he was pleafed to fend to the Mareithal de Crequy, defiring hime to order a pariy af his foices co advance to ands them, to reduce them to better or der.
Here is larely arrived a Couridr from $\boldsymbol{R}$ ome, bringing *ith him to the Popes Nuncic, four Briefs, directed to the four Bifhops, Formerly interefledupols the account of the Doctrines of fanfenias, ratifying and confiming all that had been done for the compofure of thofe difpute.

Paris, Fib. 9. Fromi Barcellozs we are adviled, that Don fuarde' Auftria has reccived a Letter from the Council of Spain informing him of the Queens pleafure to give him a moneths timer to refolve upon his return to Confuegra; threaning hism with fome fevere refolurion which will be taten againf him, if in that fpace le comply not with her Will : That the Queen has made a great clange in Cataloaia and the adjacent Countrigs a putting into all Places and

Commands Fuch Perfons of whofe fidelity fine is well affuredt. They farther inform us, that Don Juam is again zeturnstetarkerds Barceliona, and is frequently diverting himfelf

From conftantinople we are adviled, that about the end of December laft arrived at the Port of that City stre three Prench mips fent thither to atend the Siear de la Haye Ambafiadour there from His Mon Chriftian Majefly; wha imd medizely apon the News of their arrival, made his Addref fes to the Caymakan, demanding leave for his retum, aca cording to the Orders fent to him from the King his Maftery with Pals-ports for his lecuxity in his paffage, but was anfwe red by that Minifter, that he could noe licenfe his Departure, *ithour firft acquaint ing the Grand Segnior of his intentions, sad receiving his Orders thereupon ; bat that he believed His Haghnefs would hardly Ee induced to confent to it, till another ambafladour were firft arrived to fupply his room.
From port I ouis we have the news of the arrival of the good thip called the Sr. Jobs, from the Eaff-Indies, laden with Spices and o her rich merchandifes, to the value of Fwelve hundred thouland Livers upon the acconnt of the lately eftablifte Company for that Trade.

His-Majefty has ordered a new Poft to be fetied from Pida ris to Brifach, for the more regular maintenance of a cotre* fpondency with Germany by the way of Alfatia, and had beftowed the profis and advantages which will arife upen this effablifhment upon Monfeur de Lourvay.
We have little confidence of any good effect from the Ned gotiation of our Commiffioners at Lille with thofe of $\$ p$ aid abour the fatisfection of all prerenfions, the Marefhal de Hxmicras having taken notice of the eare taken by the Spanis ards in well fortitiving their Towns, and that befides the forces they have in Grarrifon, they have about ten thourand Horle and fixteen thouland Foor in readinels to take the field, has defired His Majefty to give order for the fupply of 7 or 8 thoufand men for the reinforcement of his frontiet Garrifons:

All the Cavalry belonging to His Majeßies Houhtold are. treurned, and the Regiment of Guards art in few days expreted.

Rinfa'e, Jame 22. On Saturday morning laft wascaft away upon thefe Coat's a Datch thip of 360 Tuns, ledent with Wine and Sale from France, intended for Dublia $;$ the Mafter ánd ${ }_{13}$ Men peribhing with her.

Tarmouth, Feb, 1. There have lately within thefe who or three dayes paft chrough this Road near 30 fail of thipe from the Northwards, and this aternoon two veffels front Hull imended for the River: About 20 fail more aze noth at Anchor in thefe Roads bound for the Southwards and fet, veral light flips fir the North.

Fortfmouth, Feb. 2. The fhip which was thought e6 be the Dartmouth, riding in 8t. Ellens Road, proves to be a Durch Man of War bound forthe Streights, but predeftru ed in her Voyage by contrary winds, is fince come in to Spitth bead.
The Milford and Pearl are fill at spitthead exped Eting a favourable wind. The Portland is refiring with all diligence, and may be ready to pat to fea in two or thred dayes.
