had with extraordinary courage made a fairy upon the Turks, which though performed with great execution upon the Enemy, was not without confiderable loss of many of their own which were killed upon the place, and feveral others wounded ; adding farther, that the Turks had gained fo much ground upon the City, that without an extraordinary fuccor it could not be able to make any long rafiltance.

Amfterdam, Feb. 1. This day was made an E ection of Bourgomasters for this City, the choice talling upon the Heer Cornelis Van Vloofwick, Gerrit Haffelser, Ni holas Pany cras, and coonrard Van Beuningen.

From the ZexeT they tell us, that the leas being now prerey well cleared from the Ice, the Merchants fhips begin again to appear, but by a late great florm at leas, leveral fluips are laid to have been caft sway in the River of Ross, and others upon the Englift coafts, amongit many others, we are particularly told of the loss of one first of Hamborage and another of Dors, with a confiderable fraught.

From cadts we are told of the fafe arrival there of the Convoy which parted from the Icxel in Naumber laft, whereof five of that number were gone forwards, and were put the Streights on their way for Malaga, and that the Rotterdam Convoy was fafely there arrived the 30th of December 1.0 n Malaga, and intended in four or five days to put to fea in order to their voyage homewards.

Several thips belonging to Zealand were in their way to Malaga att nded by the Corfairs of Barbary, and had run much hazard, had not the men of war, their Convoy, timely come up with them, upon whole appearance the Turks made off again to lea and left them, of which Convoy were arrived there the first past, the Orange branch, and Golden Lyan, and the reft daily expected.

Paris, Feb. 6. The Drums are already beating for Volunteers to ferve under the Command of the Mareihal de Bellefonds, who upon lis own expense, intends to raife two thouland men for the affistance of the Republick of Venice, in the defence of Candia, he pretending not to enter upon that fervice as a Ma ethal of France, but as a Christian for the interest of Religion, on which account he will not be over ferupulous in receiving Orders from the Venetian Gemeral. Montieur de Turenne intends allo to raife a Regimente of two thousand for the same tersice, which with Iome other Gompanies may be joyzed with 4000 of the Popes forces, which are now raising for the same imployment.

From Wurtsburg in Frasconia, we are adviled, that the sight paft, 3000 of the Dukes of Lunenburg forces paffed by that place on their way for *Candia*, intending fo to order their march, as to arrive these within the fpace of one moneth.

His Majefty has been pleafed to concurre with the Duke of Lorrain's defires, upon the disbanding of the reft of his Army, to grant him the liberty of keeping ftill in Arms Twelve hundred Foot and Six hundred Horfe for the guard of his perfon: that Duke has already disbanded the greateft part of his forces, but from Pont-a-Mouffon we are told, that the German Regiments of Horfe difinited from his fervice, have committed many violencies in the Countrey, adventuring alfo to plunder fome houfes in the Town, whereof complaints being made to the Duke of Lorrain, he was pleafed to fend to the Marcfhal de Grequy, defiring him to order a party of his forces to advance to wards them, to reduce them to better order.

Here is lately arrived a Courier from Rome, bringing with him to the Popes Nuncic, four Briefs, directed to the four Bishops, formerly interested upon the account of the Doctrines of Fanfenius, ratifying and confirming all that had been done for the composure of those disputes.

Paris, Feb. 9. From Barsellons we are adviled, that Don Fuand' Auffris has received a Letter from the Council of Spain informing him of the Queens pleafure to give him a moneths time to refolve upon h's return to Confuegra ; etherating him with fome fevere refolution which will be taken againft him, if in that space he comply not with her Will : That the Queen has made a great change in Catalosis and the adjacent Countries , putting into all Places and Commands luch Perfons of whole Fidelity the is well affutode. However the Marchail de Bellefonds fill continues his Levies, with a resolution to lead them into the service of the Republick of Maintage-where they should probably arrive too late for the prefervation of the (ity of Candia.

From Confiantinople we are adviced, that about the end of December laft arrived at the Port of that City the three French flips for thither to attend the Sieur dela Hays AmbaGadour there from His Moft Chriftian Majefly, who immediately upon the News of their arrival, made his Addreffes to the Gaymakan, demanding leave for his return, according to the Orders font to him from the King his Maffer; with Pafs-ports for his leaurity in his paffage, but was anfwered by that Minister, that he could not licenfe his Departure, without first acquainting the Grand Segnior of his intentions, and receiving his Orders thereupon; but that he believed His Highnels would hardly be induced to confine to it, till another Ambaffadour were first arrived to fupply his room.

From port Louis we have the news of the arrival of the good thip called the St. John, from the East-Indies, laden with Spices and o her rich Merchandiles, to the value of Fwelve hundred thousand Livers upon the account of the lately eftablisht Company for that Trade.

His Majefty has ordered a new Post to be seeled from **Pa** ris to Brifach, for the more regular maintenance of a correspondency with Germany by the way of Alfatia, and has bestowed the profits and advantages which will arise upon this establishment upon Monsieur de Louvoy.

We have little confidence of any good effect from the Negoriation of our Commiffioners at Lille with those of **spain** about the fatisfaction of all pretentions, the Marefhal de Humieres having taken notice of the care taken by the Spaniards in well fortilying their Towns, and that befides the forces they have in Garrilon, they have about ten thouland Horse and fixteen thousand Foor in readiness to take the field, has defired His Majefty to give order for the lupply of 7 or 8 thousand men for the reinforcement of his frontiet Garrilons,

All the Cavalry belonging to His Majeflies Houfhold are ferurned, and the Regiment of Guards are in few days expected.

Rinfa'e, Jan. 22. On Saturday morning laft wascaft away upon these Coat's a Dútch ship of 360 Tuns, leden with Wine and Salt from France, intended for Dubling the Master and 13 Men perishing with her.

The Milford and Pearl are fill at spitthead exped fting a favourable wind. The Portland is refitting with all diligence, and may be ready to put to lea in two or three dayes.
