

"THE SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of All Saints, New Clipstone, being:—

"All that part of the Parish of Edwinstowe, in the County of Nottingham and in the Diocese of Southwell, which is bounded upon the south west by the Parish of Mansfield Woodhouse, in the said County and Diocese, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the north west, upon the north east, and upon the south east by an imaginary line commencing at the point where the boundary which divides the said Parish of Mansfield Woodhouse from the said Parish of Edwinstowe crosses the middle of the road leading from Forest Town past the southern side of Cavendish Wood to Clipstone, and extending thence north eastward along the middle of the said road for a distance of 1 mile and 13 chains or thereabouts to a point opposite to the middle of the roadway leading to Intake Wood, and extending thence south eastward to and along the middle of the said roadway for a distance of 11 chains or thereabouts to the gateway at the entrance to Intake Wood, and extending thence first north eastward and then south eastward along the fence forming the north eastern boundary of Intake Wood for a distance of 31 chains or thereabouts to the point where it meets the fence forming the north western boundary of the close numbered 310 upon the Ordnance Survey Map of the Civil Parish of Clipstone published in the year 1916 on the scale of 25 inches to a mile and also upon the map or plan annexed to this Representation, and extending thence north eastward along the last mentioned fence for a distance of 11 chains or thereabouts to the point where it reaches the western side of Clipstone Road, and extending thence first eastward to and then southward along the middle of Clipstone Road for a distance of 15½ chains or thereabouts to a point opposite to the western end of the fence forming the northern boundary of the close numbered 309 upon the said maps, and extending thence south eastward first to and along such fence and then in a straight line in continuation thereof (thereby crossing the stream called Vicar Water) for a distance in all of 24 chains or thereabouts to the fence forming the eastern boundary of the close numbered 306 upon the said maps, and extending thence first southward and then south eastward along the last mentioned fence and along the fence forming the northern boundary of the close numbered 389a upon the said maps for a distance in all of 14½ chains or thereabouts to the point where the last mentioned fence meets the fence forming the western boundary of the Nottingham and Ollerton Branch Line of the London and North Eastern Railway and extending thence first south eastward to and then south westward along the middle of the said line of railway for a distance of 1 mile and 10 chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said Parish of Edwinstowe from the said Parish of Mansfield Woodhouse."

And whereas the said Representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Representation, and to order and direct that the same and every

part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Southwell.
