the south and upon the south east by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Saint Savour, Luton, from the said Parish of Luton, at the junction of the road called Farley Hill with the road leading past the northern side of Stockwood Park, and extending thence eastward along the middle of the last mentioned road for a distance of 151 chains or thereabouts to a point opposite to the middle of the footpath leading past the eastern side of the house and premises known as Whitehill, and extending thence north eastward to and along such footpath and along the roadway in continuation thereof for a distance in all of 12<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> chains or thereabouts to the junction of such roadway with Castle Street, upon the boundary which divides the said Parish of Luton from the said New Parish of Saint

Paul, Luton. "II. And also all that portion of the said New Parish of Christ Church, Luton, which is bounded upon the south west by the said Parish of Caddington, upon the south east by the said Parish of Luton, upon the east by the said New Parish of Saint Saviour, Luton, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the north and upon the north west, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Saint Saviour, Luton, from the said New Parish of Christ Church, Luton, at a point in the roadway leading from Milton Road to Buxton Hill due south of the south western corner of Luton Cemetery, and extending thence westward to and along the middle of such roadway for a distance of 161 chains or thereabouts to a point opposite to the eastern end of the fence forming the boundary between the close num-bered 203 upon the Ordnance Survey Map of the Borough of Luton published in the year 1924 on the scale of 25 inches to a mile and also upon the said map or plan annexed to this Scheme or Representation from the close numbered 209 upon the same maps, and extending thence south westward to and along the said fence and in a straight line in continuation thereof for a distance in all of 23 chains or thereabouts to a point in the middle of the footpath leading from Farley Farm to Chaul End, and extending thence south westward in a straight line for a distance of 29 chains or thereabouts to the northern corner of the premises attached to the house known as Inion's Farm, upon the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Christ Church, Luton, from the said Parish of Caddington.'

And whereas drafts of the said Scheme or Representation have been transmitted to the Patrons and to the Incumbents of the Cures affected by the arrangements which are contemplated by such Scheme or Representation and such Patrons and Incumbents have with the exception hereinafter mentioned respectively signified their assent thereto:

And whereas the Vicar or Incumbent of the Vicarage of the New Parish of Christ Church, Luton, has not signified his assent to the said Scheme or Representation:

And whereas a period of more than one calendar month has elapsed since drafts of the said Scheme or Representation were transmitted to the said Patrons and Incumbents:

And whereas the said Scheme or Representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council: Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme or Representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Saint Albans.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissigners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the 3rd and 4th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 113, of the Act of the 6th and 7th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 37, and of the Act of the 19th and 20th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 104, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Scheme, bearing date the 19th day of June, 1930, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the 3rd and 4th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 113, of the Act of the 6th and 7th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 37, and of the Act of the 19th and 20th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 104, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for constituting a separate District for spiritual purposes to be taken out of the Parish of West Derby, in the County of Lancaster and in the Diocese of Liverpool:

"Whereas we are satisfied that the said Parish of West Derby is a Parish wherein or in parts whereof the provision for public worship and for pastoral superintendence is insufficient for the spiritual wants of the inhabitants thereof, and it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular part of the said Parish of West Derby which is hereinafter mentioned and described should be constituted a separate District in the manner which is hereinafter set forth:

"And whereas there is not at present within the limits of the said proposed separate District any consecrated Church or Chapel in use for the purposes of Divine Worship:

"And whereas by a certain Deed of Grant bearing date on or about the 19th day of June, 1930, and made or expressed to be made under the authority of the 'New Parishes Acts, 1843, 1844 and 1856' or some or one of them, between the Reverend Joseph Percy Noël Potter, Rector or Incumbent of the Rectory of the said Parish of West Derby, of the first part, the Reverend Percy Stewart, of Polesacre, Crawley, in the County of Sussex, Clerk in Holy Orders, the Patron of the said Rectory
