

are desirous that the whole Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to the said Benefice of Saint Mark, Kemp Town, should be transferred in the manner which is hereinafter recommended and proposed:

"And whereas the said George Kennedy Allen, Bishop of Chichester, has executed this Scheme as hereinafter mentioned in token of his willingness to accept jointly with the other persons hereinafter mentioned the transfer of the said Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage hereinafter recommended and proposed and also in token that the same transfer has that consent of the Bishop of the Diocese which by the Acts in the hereinbefore mentioned Act recited or by some or one of them is made necessary:

"And whereas the transfer of the Patronage of the said Benefice of Saint Mark, Kemp Town, which is hereinbefore mentioned and hereinafter recommended and proposed will in our opinion tend to make better provision for the Cure of Souls in the Parish or District in or in respect of which the right of Patronage or Advowson so recommended and proposed to be transferred as aforesaid arises or exists, that is to say, in the Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Mark, Kemp Town:

"Now, therefore, with the consents of the said George Kennedy Allen, Bishop of Chichester, Bertrand Yorke Bevan, Joseph Montague Harris, Herbert Henry Lankester and George Meggitt Hanks being the persons whose consents as Patrons is required by the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts and of the Act of the 1st and 2nd years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 106 (in testimony of which consents they have signed and sealed this Scheme), with the consent of the said George Kennedy Allen, Bishop of Chichester (in testimony whereof he has signed this Scheme and sealed the same with his Episcopal Seal), and with the consent of the persons to whom together with the said Bertrand Yorke Bevan, Joseph Montague Harris, Herbert Henry Lankester, and George Meggitt Hanks and the said George Kennedy Allen, Bishop of Chichester, it is hereinafter recommended and proposed that the said Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage should be transferred, that is to say, with the consent of the Reverend Alfred Carey Wollaston Rose, of the Vicarage, Brighton, Clerk in Holy Orders and a Prebendary in the Cathedral Church of Chichester, and Herbert John Allen, of Deeping, Roedean, Brighton, Esquire (in testimony whereof they have signed and sealed this Scheme) we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the whole Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to the said Benefice of Saint Mark, Kemp Town, shall be transferred to the said George Kennedy Allen, Bishop of Chichester; Bertrand Yorke Bevan; Joseph Montague Harris; Herbert Henry Lankester; George Meggitt Hanks; Alfred Carey Wollaston Rose, and Herbert John Allen,

and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said George Kennedy Allen, Bishop of Chichester; Bertrand Yorke Bevan; Joseph Montague Harris; Herbert Henry Lankester; George Meggitt Hanks; Alfred Carey Wollaston Rose; and Herbert John Allen, their heirs and assigns for ever as Trustees upon the trusts declared by a certain Indenture already prepared and intended to be executed by the said George Kennedy Allen, Bishop of Chichester; Bertrand Yorke Bevan; Joseph Montague Harris; Herbert Henry Lankester; George Meggitt Hanks; Alfred Carey Wollaston Rose; and Herbert John Allen.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of any of them, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Chichester.

**WHEREAS** the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Union of Benefices Measure, 1923, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Scheme bearing date the 31st day of July, 1930, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting in pursuance of the Union of Benefices Measure, 1923, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for effecting certain alterations of boundaries affecting the Parishes of the Benefices of Faversham, Ospringe, and Preston next Faversham, and the Parish of Goodnestone (being one of the Parishes of the United Benefice of Goodnestone with Graveney), all situate in the County of Kent and in the Diocese of Canterbury:

"Whereas Commissioners appointed at our request by the Right Reverend Cosmo Gordon, Archbishop of Canterbury, pursuant to the provisions of the said Union of Benefices Measure, 1923, to inquire into and report upon the union of the said Benefice of Faversham and another Benefice, in making their Report
