SILICOSIS AND ASBESTOSIS—WORK-MEN'S COMPENSATION.

The Home Secretary gives notice that in pursuance of his powers under section 47 of the Workmen's Compensation Act, 1925, as extended by the Workmen's Compensation (Silicosis and Asbestosis) Act, 1930, he proposes to make a Scheme (which may be cited

as the Silicosis and Abestosis (Medical Arrangements) Scheme, 1931) to provide for the appointment of a Medical Board to give the necessary certificates in all cases where compensation is claimed for silicosis or asbestosis, and to carry out periodic medical examinations of workers employed in certain specified processes involving exposure to silica or asbestos dust.

The Home Secretary further gives notice that he proposes at the same time to amend the Metal Grinding Industries (Silicosis) Scheme, 1927, and the Various Industries (Silicosis) Scheme, 1928, with a view (1) to provide for the certification by the Medical Board of cases arising under these Schemes, and (2) to extend the right to compensation to workmen who, though not totally disabled, are found on examination by the Medical Board to be suffering from the disease to such a degree as to make it dangerous for them to continue in the employment, and are for that reason suspended by the Board from employment.

The Home Secretary further proposes to make a Scheme (to be cited as the Asbestos Industry (Asbestosis) Scheme, 1931) to provide for the payment of compenation by employers of workmen employed in certain processes involving exposure to asbestos dust.

Any employers, or others affected, who may desire to submit any observations upon the Draft Schemes for consideration of the Secretary of State, are asked to do so in writing to the Under Secretary of State, Home Office, Whitehall, London, S.W. 1, within 30 days from the date of this notice.
