DOLGELLEY FAIRS.

The Secretary of State for the Home Department hereby gives notice that by Memorial dated the 8th January, 1931, a representation has been duly made to him by the Dolgelley Urban District Council that Fairs have been annually held in Dolgelley on the 2nd June and the 2nd October respectively, and that it would be for the convenience and advantage of the Public that such Fairs should be abolished. On the 23rd day of February, 1931, the Secretary of State will take such representation into consideration, and any person who may desire to object to the abolition of the Fairs should intimate his objections to the Secretary of State before that day.
