

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a District Chapelry should be assigned to the said Church of Saint James, Pokesdown, situate as aforesaid:

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Frank Theodore, Bishop of Winchester (testified by his having signed and sealed this Representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said New Parish of Pokesdown which is described in the Schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a District Chapelry to the said Church of Saint James, Pokesdown, situate as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint James, Pokesdown'.

"And with the like consent of the said Frank Theodore, Bishop of Winchester (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said Church of Saint James, Pokesdown, situate as aforesaid, and that the fees or dues to be received in respect of the publication of banns and of the solemnization or performance of marriages, churchings, and burials should be paid and belong to the Minister of the same Church for the time being.

"THE SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint James, Pokesdown, being:—

"All that part of the New Parish (sometime District Chapelry, of Pokesdown, in the County of Southampton and in the Diocese of Winchester, which is bounded upon the north west partly by the New Parish of Saint John the Evangelist, Holdenhurst, and partly by the District of Saint Mary, Bournemouth, upon the south west partly by the said District of Saint Mary, Bournemouth, and partly by the New Parish of Saint Andrew, Boscombe, all in the said County and Diocese, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the south east and upon the north east, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Saint Andrew, Boscombe, from the said New Parish of Pokesdown, at the junction of Parkwood Road with Darracott Road, and extending thence north eastward along the middle of Darracott Road for a distance of $23\frac{1}{2}$ chains or thereabouts to its junction with Seabourne Road and Ashbourne Road and extending thence north eastward along the middle of Ashbourne Road for a distance of $7\frac{1}{2}$ chains or thereabouts to its junction with Cromwell Road and extending thence eastward along the middle of Cromwell Road for a distance of $2\frac{1}{2}$ chains or thereabouts to its junction with Southbourne Road and extending thence northward along the middle of Southbourne Road for a distance of 9 chains or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge which carries Southbourne Road across the Bournemouth Direct Line of the Southern Railway, and extending thence north eastward along the middle of the said line of railway for a

distance of 22 chains or thereabouts to a point opposite to the middle of Hambledon Road and extending thence north westward to and along the middle of Hambledon Road for a distance of $10\frac{1}{2}$ chains or thereabouts to its junction with Christchurch Road, and continuing thence north westward in precisely the same direction and in a straight line for a distance of 47 chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Pokesdown from the said New Parish of Saint John the Evangelist, Holdenhurst."

And whereas the said Representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Winchester.

TO THEIR MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTIES—KING GEORGE V AND QUEEN MARY.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR MAJESTIES:
