WHEREAS by the Statutes made by the University of Durham Commissioners and approved by His late Majesty in Council on the 22nd day of November, 1909, it is provided that six Members of the Senate of the University shall be appointed by His Majesty in Council:

And whereas Sir Thomas Hugh Bell, Baronet, being one of the Members so appointed, is deceased, and it is necessary to appoint another Member in his place:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to appoint Christopher William, Lord Barnard, to be a Member of the Senate of the University of Durham in place of Sir Thomas Hugh Bell, Baronet, deceased.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by the National Economy Act, 1931, it is enacted that during the period of one month after the commencement of that Act (that is to say, the thirtieth day of September, 1931) His Majesty may, in respect of certain services, including police, make such Orders in Council as appear to Him to be expedient for the purpose (among other purposes) of effecting economies in the expenditure falling to be defrayed out of moneys provided by Parliament or out of any fund established by the enactments relating to any of the said services:

And whereas it is expedient for the purpose aforesaid that the provisions hereinafter contained should have effect:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue of the enactment hereinbefore recited and of all other powers enabling Him in that behalf, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. After the date of the making of this Order:—

(a) no allowance shall be granted under subsection (3) of section six of the Police Pensions Act, 1921, to a member of a police force who was not in receipt of an allowance under that subsection at the said date; and

(b) an allowance under the said subsection to a member of a police force who was in receipt of such an allowance at the said date shall in no case bear a higher proportion to his pay for the time being than the proportion which the allowance of which he was so in receipt bore to his pay at that date.

2. This Order may be cited as the National Economy (Police) Order, 1931.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by section one of the Chartered Associations (Protection of Names and Uniforms) Act, 1926, it is provided that His Majesty may by Order in Council on the application of any association incorporated by Royal Charter, not being an association representative of any profession or business, protect:—

(a) the name of the association; and

(b) any special name or designation specified in the Order and used by the association for the members thereof, or for the members of any organisation constituted by the association in pursuance of their charter; and

(c) any uniform with distinctive markings or badges used by the association and described in the Order; and

(d) any badge to be worn without uniform used by the association and described in the Order:

And whereas it is further provided by the said section that an Order in Council thereunder shall not be made unless notice of the application for an Order has been given in such manner and accompanied by such particulars as the Secretary of State may direct, and that the Secretary of State shall consider any objections to an Order which are made by or on behalf of any persons or societies affected or likely to be affected by the Order:

And whereas the British Legion, being an association incorporated by Royal Charter and not being an association representative of any profession or business, has in pursuance of the said Act made the application which is set out in the Schedule to this Order:

And whereas notice of the said application has been duly given as required by the said Act and the Secretary of State has considered all the objections to the making of an Order in Council in pursuance of the application aforesaid:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. The name "The British Legion" and the badges to be worn without uniform specified in paragraph (b) of the said application are hereby protected under the said Act.

2. This Order may be cited as "The Chartered Associations (British Legion) Protection Order, 1931."
