

In Section A candidates take all subjects; in Section B the candidate may offer subjects up to a maximum mark of 600, provided that not more than four of the subjects numbered 11 to 16, or more than two of the subjects numbered 17 to 23, or more than two of the subjects numbered 29 to 33 may be offered.

A candidate desiring to offer any of the subjects 30 to 33 must produce evidence satisfactory to the Civil Service Commissioners of laboratory training in an institution of university rank. For Geography, other equivalent training will be required.

6. Candidates must obtain such an aggregate of marks in the examination as a whole, apart from the viva voce marks, as to satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners.

7. Candidates whose handwriting is not easily legible will suffer a deduction of marks on that account.

8. When vacancies are offered for competition under more than one Department, candidates will be allowed to choose, according to their place on the list, between the several classes of vacancy available.

9. Applications for permission to attend an Examination must be made at such time and in such manner as the Civil Service Commissioners may appoint.

10. A fee of £2 will be required from every applicant for permission to attend an Examination; this fee is not returnable in any circumstances. A further fee of £4, being the balance of the prescribed fee of £6, will be required from every candidate attending such Examination.

The Civil Service Commissioners further give notice that an Open Competitive Examination will be held in London under the foregoing Regulations, the written work commencing on the 5th July, 1932.

Not fewer than 30 vacancies for Assistant Inspectors of Taxes will be filled on the result of this examination, if so many candidates should be found to be qualified in all respects. No announcement can yet be made as to vacancies for Third Class Officers in the Ministry of Labour.

No person will be admitted to Examination from whom the Secretary of the Civil Service Commission has not received, on or before the 5th May, 1932, an application, in the Candidate's own handwriting, on a prescribed form, which may be obtained from the Secretary at once.

##### ROAD TRAFFIC ACT, 1930.

Notice is hereby given under the Rules Publication Act, 1893, that it is proposed by the Minister of Transport after the expiry of at least forty days from this date in pursuance of the power conferred upon him by the Road Traffic Act, 1930, to make Regulations modifying Regulation 32 of the Public Service Vehicles (Licences and Certificates) (No. 2) Provisional Regulations, 1931.

And notice is hereby further given that on account of urgency the Minister of Transport has under Section 2 of the Rules Publication Act, 1893, made the Public Service Vehicles (Licences and Certificates) (Amendment) Provisional Regulations, 1932, to come into force forthwith as Provisional Regulations and to continue in force until Statutory Rules have been made in accordance with the provisions of Section 1 of that Act.

For the purposes of the Electricity (Supply) Acts, 1882 to 1928, and all Orders and Licences made or granted and issued thereunder, and any Local Act relating to the supply of electricity, the Electricity Commissioners approve of the construction and pattern of the meter (hereinafter described) for the measurement of electrical energy when supplied on the constant pressure, two wire, single phase alternating current system and known as the Societe des Compteurs de Geneve "Rex" Type SIP.IA. SGT2. Two Part Tariff Prepayment Induction Watthour Meter, rated sizes 2.5, 5, 10, 20, 50 and 100 amperes, 110, 200, 220, 230 and 240 volts, at a frequency of 50 cycles per second.

Provided that the meter be constructed as described in the specification and drawings deposited at the National Physical Laboratory, Teddington, Middlesex, dated and numbered 15th June, 1931, and 30th October, 1931, and No. 136, and be in accordance with the pattern meter No. 838516 deposited at the National
