Under authority of a Warrant under His Majesty's Royal Sign Manual, the Governor-General of India, on the 16th April, 1932, at an informal Investiture held at Peshawar, conferred the honour of Knighthood upon Lieutenant-Colonel Sir Ralph Edwin Hotchkin Griffith, C.I.E.

(His Majesty's approval of this Knighthood was signified on 1st January, 1932.)

The Home Secretary gives notice that in pursuance of Section 2 (1) of the Employment of Women, Young Persons and Children Act, 1920, he has made an Order authorising the employment on two day-shifts, of women of 18 and young persons of 16 years of age and over at the Hale End Works of The British Xylonite Company Limited, Larkshall Road, Walthamstow, E.4, subject to the conditions that a worker shall not be employed in the afternoon shift in consecutive weeks and that suitable cloakroom and messroom accommodation and washing facilities shall be provided; and that the Secretary of State may at any time require the occupiers to make such special arrangements for the conveyance of workers living at a distance or otherwise for the welfare of such workers as may be necessary to prevent hardship.
