THE FAIRS ACT, 1873.

(36 AND 37 VICT. CAP. 37.)

WILTON FAIRS.

The Secretary of State for the Home Department hereby gives notice that by Memorial dated the 2nd June, 1932, a representation has been duly made to him by the Wilton Town Council that Fairs have been annually held in the Borough of Wilton on the 4th day of May and the 12th day of September, and that it would be for the convenience and advantage of the Public that the dates on which such Fairs are to be held in future should be the first Thursday in May and the second Thursday in September respectively. On the 19th day of July, 1932, the Secretary of State will take such representation into consideration, and any person who may desire to object to the alteration of the dates of the Fairs should intimate his objections to the Secretary of State before that day.
