The KING has been pleased, by Letters Patent under the Great Seal of the Realm, bearing date the 4th instant, to present the Reverend Francis Underhill, M.A., D.D., Warden of Liddon House, Curate in Charge of Grosvenor Chapel, South Audley Street, Westminster, and Canon Theologian of the

Cathedral Church of Liverpool, to the Deanery of the Cathedral Church of Rochester, void by the resignation of the Very Reverend Reginald Thomas Talbot, M.A., D.D., late Dean thereof.

The Home Secretary gives notice that in pursuance of Section 2 (1) of the Employment of Women, Young Persons and Children Act, 1920, he has made an Order authorising the employment on two day-shifts, of women of 18 and young persons of 16 years of age and over in cutting and creasing folding cartons on platen machines in the folding box department at the works of Messrs. Hunt Partners, Limited, Theydon Road, Clapton, E.5, subject to the conditions that a worker shall not be employed in the afternoon shift in consecutive weeks, and that suitable cloakroom and messroom accommodation, washing facilities and facilities for sitting shall be provided; that standardised wet and dry bulb thermometers shall be maintained where humidity is artificially produced; and that the Secretary of State may at any time require the occupiers to make such special arrangements for the conveyance of workers living at a distance or otherwise for the welfare of such workers as may be necessary to prevent hardship.
