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Messina, March 18. N. S.

Two Dutch Men of War are lately put in here, one bound for *Smirna*, and the other for *Scanderoon*, to bring home their Merchant Ships in those Ports. Two English Vessels passed yesterday through the *Fare*, going from *Legborne* for *Gallipoli*. The *Sicilian-Galley*, and the *Messina-Factor*, are in this Harbour waiting for the opportunity of a Wind to Sail for *Lipari*, and thence to *England*.

Rome, April 5. Cardinal *Grimani* made his Entry here on the 3d instant in the usual manner, and is to receive his Cap from the Pope's own Hand in a Consistory which is Summoned against next Monday for that purpose. It is much discourfured here, That a Marriage is Treating between the King of the *Romans* and the Princess of *Hanover*, Daughter of *John-Fredrick*, Duke of *Hanover*, who died in the year 1680. The Imperial and Venetian Ambassadors having renewed their Instances for some Supplies towards carrying on the War against the *Turks*, the Pope has promised to give 6000 Crowns to the Emperor, and half that Sum to the Republick of *Venice*. Count *Altamira*, who arrived here some time ago, with the Character of Ambassador from the King of *Spain*, is preparing for his publick Entry. Frequent Consistories are held to consider of the Affairs of *Poland*, which Kingdom this Court endeavours by all manner of good Offices to restore to its former Tranquillity, that the King of *Poland* may be able to make a Diversion on that side against the Ottoman Forces. The Muscovite Prince *Szaremset* is lately arrived here from *Venice*, with several Muscovite Gentlemen in his Company; and was received by the Pope with a great deal of Civility. The Prince *Ursini*, Duke of *Bracciano*, died lately in this City, and in him ended that Family, which was one of the chiefeft and most Ancient in *Italy*.

Genova, April 6. Our Senate having appointed Signior *Justiniani* to go with the Character of their Envoy to His Majesty of *Great Britain*, Orders have been given him to prepare for his departure, and he intends to set out for *England* towards the latter end of this month. Two Gallies of the Duke of *Turris's* Squadron are fitting out here to attend the General of the Gallies of *Naples*, who is at *Barcelona*, and intends shortly to go for *Naples*. We hear several Vessels belonging to the Coasts of *Barbary* are Cruising off the Islands of *Corfica* and *Sardinia*.

Legborne, April 7. The *William and Ann* sailed hence last Monday for *Newfoundland*, as did likewise the *Macclesfield*, and the *Mazarine*, for *Gallipoli*, and the *St. Andrew* for *England*.

Dantzick, April 19. By our last Letters from *Warsaw* we have Advice, That the King of *Poland* returned to that place the 14th instant; that the Cardinal Primate had put off the Meeting of the Gentlemen of his Party, which he had ap-

pointed for the 15th of this month at *Lowitz*, till the 5th of *May*, and that he had sent a Supply of Men and Ammunition to the *Sieur Oginsky*, to enable him to continue his Opposition to the Family of *Sapieha* in *Lithuania*. An Envoy is lately come to *Warsaw* from the Czar of *Muscovy*, to Congratulate the King of *Poland's* Accession to the Crown, and to Offer in his Masters Name, an Assistance of a considerable number of his Forces: Some of the Elector of *Brandenburg's* Servants passed by here this week in their way to *Coningsberg*; where his Electoral Highness is expected in 8 or 10 days.

Vienna, April 16. The Duke of *Lorraine*, with Prince *Francis Anthony*, his youngest Brother, having taken Leave of their Imperial Majesty's, the King of the *Romans*, and the rest of the Court, set out from this place last Monday, accompanied by General *Auersberg*, and several other Persons of Quality. His Highness will take *Olmütz*, *Prague*, and *Ratisbonne* in his way; and the Prince of *Commerci*, with the young Prince of *Vaudemont*, went hence yesterday morning with a delign to overtake him, and accompany him several days Journey. The Preparations against the next Campaign are continued with much diligence, and several Barks are daily sent down the *Danube*, some with Soldiers, and others with Provisions and Ammunition for our Magazines in *Hungary*. The like care is taken to fit out our Fleet on the *Danube*, in order to its being ready by the month of *May*, when it is intended our Armies shall take the Field, and the new built Gallies are to fall down to *Peter Waradin* about that time, Cardinal *Collonitz*, who went lately to *Presburg* to sollicite the speedy payment of the Supplies which the States of *Hungary* have agreed to give his Imperial Majesty, is returned here, and has brought 400000 Florins in part of payment. Our last Letters from *Caransebes* inform us, That a Party of *Turks* being come out of *Temeswaer*, to make an Incurfion into the Country thereabouts, some Hussars were sent out of *Sandovir*, who met the Enemy, and put them to flight, killing some, and making others Prisoners; and that a Party of *Heydukes* had taken several Mules laden with Provisions which were going to *Temeswaer*. The same Advices confirm those we had already received of the arrival of a *Bassa* with a considerable Sum of Money, and a Reinforcement of 3000 *Turks* at *Belgrade*; and add, That the *Turks* raise Men in the Neighbouring Provinces, and force the Country People into their Service.

Francfort, April 23. The Circle of the *Upper Rhine* are still assembled, and have now agreed upon the number of Forces they are to furnish towards the Garison of *Philipsburg*. The Count de *Boinenburg*, Envoy from his Imperial Majesty, went hence this morning for *Cassel*. 'Tis believed the French will now in few days Evacuate the Places they are to restore in *Germany*.

Paris, April 25. The Baron of Bothmar, Envoy Extraordinary from the Duke of Zell, had on the 22th instant his Audience of Leave at Versailles, with the usual Ceremonies, and intends to be going home in a fortnight. The French King went the next day to Marly, where he will stay the remaining part of the week. Monsieur d'Iberville went this day for Mentz with the Character of Envoy from this Crown. The Marquis de Harcourt's Equipages will be sent hence to morrow for Havre de Grace, in order to their being carried by Sea to Spain. We hear from Rochefort, That some Men of War are fitting out there for the West Indies; and it is said, the Sieur Renaud, an Ingenier, is ordered to go along with them, and to visit the Fortified Places in those Parts, which are under the Dominion of the French.

Brussels, April 27. Last Friday the Council of State and War were extraordinarily assembled, after which the Elector of Bavaria went to Hunt at Treuvre, and returned hither last night. The Abbot de Polignac, late Envoy of France to the Crown of Poland, is come hither from the Hague in his way homewards. Our last Letters from Madrid, which are of the 11th instant, N. S. say, The King of Spain's Health mends daily, and that the Count de Harrach, Ambassador from the Emperor, was arrived there, and had a private Audience of his Catholick Majesty. We hear, the French will now very speedily Evacuate the Places they are to restore in Germany; and that the Ships fitting out at Brest will shortly sail for the Straights.

Hague, April 29. N. S. The Baron de Bosen, Envoy from the King of Poland, arrived here some days ago from Denmark, and will shortly be going for Poland. The Deputies of the several Colleges of the Admiralty are expected here against the Meeting of the States of Holland and West-Friesland the beginning of the next month. The Count de Goe is shortly expected from the Court of Vienna, to succeed Count Straatsman, who is recalled from his Embassy here.

Yarmouth, April 22. This day passed through our Road a Ship from Russia, Thomas Alleston Commander, which was supposed to have been lost.
