The Civil Service Commissioners hereby give notice that the following Regulations are published with the approval of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, viz.:—

REGULATIONS RESPECTING OPEN COMPETITIVE EXAMINATIONS FOR THE SITUATION OF CARTO-GRAPHER IN THE HYDROGRAPHIC DEPARTMENT OF THE ADMIRALTY.

These Regulations are liable to alteration from time to time.

1. The limits of age for this situation are 19 and 25; candidates must be of the prescribed age on the first day of the examination. A candidate who attained the age of 19 on the first day of the examination would be admitted, but a candidate who attained the age of 25 on that day would not be admitted.

In reckoning age for competition the follow-

ing allowances will be made:-

(i) Persons who have served or are serving in the Army, Navy or Air Force may deduct from their actual age any time during which they have so served.

(ii) Persons who have served in any established civil situation to which they were admitted with the certificate of the Civil Service Commissioners may deduct from their actual age any time not exceeding two years which they may have spent in such service.

2. Every candidate must be a natural-born British subject, the child of a person who is or was at the time of death a British subject; provided that exception may be made in the case of natural-born British subjects who have satisfactorily completed a period of not less than five years' service on full pay in His Majesty's Regular Forces.

Provided also that if the Civil Service Commissioners are satisfied, in the case of any candidate who is a British subject but does not fulfil all the requirements of the rule as to nationality and descent, that the candidate is so closely connected by ancestry and upbringing with His Majesty's dominions that an exception may properly be made to that rule, they may accept such candidate as eligible provided that this discretion shall not be exercisable unless (a) the father or the paternal grandfather of the candidate was a natural-born British subject, and (b) neither the father nor the paternal grandfather had acquired any other nationality by naturalization or by any other voluntary and formal act.

The consent of the authorities of the Admiralty is required before the child of a naturalised British subject can be appointed to that Department.

3. No person actually serving in the Army, Navy or Air Force will be eligible for admission to the examination unless he produces to the Civil Service Commissioners, when called upon to do so, the permission of his Commanding Officer to attend the examination, dated before the commencement of the competition, and given in accordance with such orders as may from time to time be issued.

Persons upon whose training for the occupation of teacher public money has been spent cannot be appointed until the consent of the

appropriate education authority has been notified to the Civil Service Commissioners.

Persons holding situations in the Civil Service must obtain the permission of the authorities of their Department to attend the examination before the commencement of the competition.

4. Candidates must satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners as to their health and character. Female candidates must be unmarried or widows, and will be required to resign their appointments on marriage.

5. The subjects of examination and the marks they will carry are as follows:—

(1) Physical Geography ... ... 100 (2) Cartography ... ... 100 (3) Surveying ... ... 100 (4) Two of the following:—

(a) French or German; (b)
Political and Economic Geography; (c)
Oceanography; (d)

Oceanography; (d)
Mathematics ... 100 each.

Candidates must obtain such a mark in each of the first three subjects and such an aggregate number of marks in the examination as a whole as to satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners.

6. Application for permission to attend an examination must be made in the writing of the candidate, at such time and in such manner as may be fixed by the Civil Service Commissioners.

7. A fee of £6 will be required from each

candidate attending the examination.

The Civil Service Commissioners further give notice that an Open Competitive Examination will be held under the foregoing Regulations, in London, commencing on the 21st February, 1933.

At least one vacancy will be filled on the result of this examination, if the necessary candidate should be found to be duly qualified.

No person will be admitted to examination from whom the Secretary of the Civil Service Commission has not received, on or before the 12th January, 1933, an application, in the candidate's own handwriting, on a prescribed form, which may be obtained from the Secretary at once.

1. Candidates must have attained the age of 22, and shall as a rule not exceed the age of 26 on the 1st April of the year in which the competition is held, but in special circumstances candidates above 26 may be admitted with the approval of the Treasury and the Civil Service
