Genova, May 20. N. S.

THE Prince of *Vaudemont* arrived here the 17th instant, and came by Land from *Monaco*, the ill weather we have had of late not permitting the two Gallies of *Turfs*, which were appointed to fetch him from thence to put to Sea. He lay that night in the Duke of *Turfs*'s Palace, in the Suburb of *St. Peter d' Arena*, and the day following was Entertained in this City by the Marquis of *Grillo*, at whose House he was Complimented by the Persons of chiefest Quality; and this day he set out for *Milan*. He declined receiving the Compliments of the Senate, because they would not give him the Title of Highness; but the Senate have given Orders, that Provision be made for him in his Journey through their Territories at the Charge of the Republick. Deputies from the City of *Milan* came hither to attend him, but he deferred giving them Audience till his arrival at *Pavia*, where he will be met likewise by those of the Senate of *Milan*; and the Marquis of *Leganez* intends to come as far as the Frontiers of that State to meet him. The Inhabitants of *Mondovi* have refused to pay a new Tax the Duke of *Savoy* has lately laid upon Salt, whereupon he has ordered some Troops to march that way to force them to it.

Madrid, May 23. The Court continues at *Toledo*; and the King's Health is very much mended; and he goes abroad almost every day to Hunt or to take other Diversions. The Queen was lately Indisposed, but is very well again. The Imperial and French Ambassadors have been at *Toledo* to wait on the King. The arrival of the Gallions at *Cadiz* is daily expected. The Marquis of *Beliadries*, who is appointed to be Governor of *Centa*, will be going thither in a few days. We have the following Account from that Place: On the 3d instant, the Besieged saw a Body of Horse and Foot, with 40 laden Mules, come into the Moors Camp, among whom there appeared to be some Persons of Consideration, seeing the Alcaide who Commands at the Siege, went to meet them. The same day the Enemy plied their Cannon very warmly and shot several Bombs into the Town. The 4th, they invited the Besieged to a Parley, which being refused, they continued firing as before. On the 7th, The Moors received another Reinforcement, with which they are said to be 16000 strong. They again called upon the Spaniards, to know if they would come to a Parley, and how the King of *Spain* did, but no Answer was returned them. That day the City was supplied by 18 Vessels laden with all manner of Provisions, and two Gallies sent from *Gibraltar*, which brought in with them a Sattee they had taken, having on Board 7 Moors, who reported, That one of their Generals was killed in the Trenches by a Shot from the Town; and that they have lost one of their best Gunners, who was a Renegade. They continue the Siege with great Obstinacy.

Warsaw, May 27. The Peace and Tranquillity of this Kingdom being happily restored by the Agreement between the King and the Gentlemen of the *Rokotz*, and the Submission the latter have made thereupon; The King's Ministers do now employ their Care to Compose the Differences that have of late given so much Trouble to the Great Dutchy of *Lithuania*, and for this Reason, Orders have been sent to Prince *Sapieha*, and the *Sieur Oginsky*, the Heads of the two Contending Parties, to forbear all further Acts of Hostility against each other, and Commissioners will be sent by the King to endeavour to Reconcile them. The Cardinal Primate continues here; but has not yet taken the Oath of Fidelity to the King; which he would do in a General Diet, but the King will not have it delayed so long; 'Tis probable this Point will be soon adjusted. The Senate was assembled this day to consider of the Proposals of Peace made by the Turks; but this does not stop the preparations for the War. The Forces the King has sent for from *Saxony* are daily expected, and those which are coming from *Hungary*, are ordered to take the shortest way to *Russland*, where is appointed the Rendezvous of the Army. The Duke of *Wirtemberg* is arrived here to Command the King's German Forces.

Vienna, May 28. The Count of *Martinitz*, the Emperor's Ambassador to the Pope, is lately arrived here from *Rome*, having obtained Leave to return on account of his private Affairs. The Preparations for the Campagne are made with much diligence. The 6 new Vessels built here are now ready to receive their Complement of Men, who are daily expected from *Hamburg*, and other Places, where they have been raised by the *Sieur d'Assenberg*, who is to Command the Emperor's Fleet on the *Danube*. We hear from *Hungary*, That the Forces of *Brandenburg* are marching homewards, and those of *Saxony* to *Poland*. Our Letters from *Hermanstadt* say, The Turks are at work to repair *Vypalanka*; and that they had Advice, That the Grand Signior intended to go from *Adrianople* on the 13th of this month, and to lie in his Tents near that place, in order to march towards *Hungary*, so soon as the Asiatick Troops were arrived.

Francfort, June 4. The *Sieur Desbordes*, Governor of *Philipsburg*, has sent an Express hither to give Notice, That in case the Town of *Rhinfeldt*, with it's Dependencies, be restored by the Landgrave of *Hesse*, to the Landgrave of *Rhinfeldt*, by the 10th instant, he will be ready with his Garrison to march out of *Philipsburg* on the 17th, and that *Fribourg*, *Brisack*, and the Fort of *Keyl*, shall in a short time after be likewise Evacuated.

Cologne, June 6. The Baron of *Hettcrman*, Envoy from the Elector *Palatine* to the *States General*, is lately come to *Dusseldorp*, and will be dispatched back in a few days with new Instructions about some Matters in Dispute concerning the County of *Ravesteyn*.

Hamburg, June 6. We hear from *Coningsberg* of the 30th past, That the Elector of *Brandenburg* was arrived there from *Frederickshof*, and had given Audience to the Count of *Ablefeld*, Envoy from the King of *Denmark*; and that his Electoral Highness would set out the next day for *Joansbourg* in *Prussia*, where it is thought he will have an Interview with the King of *Poland*.

Paris, June 7. This day there was a Review of the Troops of the Household in the Plain of *Archers*, where the King, the Dauphin, the young Princes of *France*, and divers Persons of Quality were present. On the 3d instant, *Baron Wieser*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector *Palatine*, had his Audiences of Leave at *Versailles*, of the King, the Dauphin, the Duke and Dutches of *Burgundy*, and the Dukes of *Anjou* and *Berry*. The same day, the Baron of *Schonborne*, Brother to the Elector of *Meitz*, and his Envoy Extraordinary, had his first Audience of the Dauphin at *Versailles*, as likewise of the Duke and Dutches of *Orleans*, the Duke de *Chartres*, and Mademoiselle Daughter to the Duke of *Orleans* at *St. Clou*. That day also, *Baron Tettau*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Landgrave of *Hesse Cassell*, had his Audience of Leave of the Dauphin. The *Marquis de Ferwaques*, Governor of the Provinces of *Maine* and *Perche*, being lately dead, the King has appointed the *Marquis de Bullion* his Brother to succeed him. *Prince Gaston*, second Son to the Great Duke of *Tuscany*, went hence last Monday for *Flanders*; The King intends to Present him with a Sword richly set with Diamonds; which not being ready, will be sent after him. The Archbishop of *Cambray*'s Book is much Censured here at Court, especially by the Archbishop of *Paris*, and the Bishop of *Meaux*; and the Abbot of *Beaumont*, the Abbot of *Langeron*, and two other Gentlemen, who attended the Princes of *France*, and *Monsieur. Finelon*, an Officer of the Guard du Corps, being thought to favour the Opinions contained in the said Book, are removed from their Employments. The Weather being here very Cold and Wet, considering the time of the year, the Shrine of *St. Genevieve* has been carried in Procession in the usual manner, with Prayers for a more favourable Season.

Brussels, June 8. Letters from *Madrid* of the 25th past say, The King of *Spain* was much better since his being at *Toledo*, and having found such Benefit by the Air of that place, his stay there would be longer then was at first intended. The Baron of *Plettemberg*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Bishop of *Munster*, went hence yesterday for the Court of *France*. *Baron Grisper* died here yesterday, he had been Governor to *Prince Charles of Vandement*, and was Colonel of a Regiment of Foot.

Hague, June 10. N. S. The Envoy of *Morocco* has given Notice of his Arrival to the States General, and will have Audience in a short time. The Envoy of *Brandenburg* will likewise have his in a few days. The *Sieur de Bonrepos*, the French Ambassador, is shortly expected back from *Aix la Chappelle*. An Express is lately arrived here from *Monsieur Heemskirke*, the Dutch Ambassador at *Paris*, with some Dispatches that are thought to relate to the Affair of the *Tariff*.

Portsmouth, June 1. This day His Majesty's Ship the *Lancaster*, a 3d Rate, of 80 Guns, was brought into the new Dry-Dock, built of Stone; and yesterday a new 4th Rate, of 50 Guns, called the *Worcester*, was Launched at *Southampton*, being built by *Mr. Robert Winter*.

Sheerness, May 30. This day was Launch'd at this place a new 5th Rate of 32 Guns, called the

Bridgewater, built by *Mr. Shortis*, Master-Shipwright of this place; and a Week ago another at *Woodbridge*, call'd the *Hastings*, built by *Mr. Betts*, which is ordered to be brought hither to be laid up.

Chatham, May 31. This day was Launch'd here the last of the 27 new Ships appointed by a late Act of Parliament to be Built for His Majesty's Service, being a 3d Rate of 80 Guns, named the *Somerfer*, begun by *Mr. Robert Lee*, the Master-Shipwright, and finished by his Son, *Mr. William Lee*, his Assistant.

Portsmouth, June 2. The Honourable *Ralph Gray Esq.* Governor of the *Barbadoes*, sailed yesterday from *St. Helens*, being on Board His Majesty's Ship the *Soldadoes Prize*, in Company of His Majesty's Ships the *Queenborough*, *Speedwell*, and *Rupert Prize*, all bound to the *West Indies*.
