Rome, May 24. N. S.

THE Pope, who has been Indisposed, is very well again, and has given this week the usual Audiences to the Foreign Ministers. The Envoy of Poland now here, having Orders to Notify the King his Master's Accession to the Crown, to the several Courts of Italy, intends to go hence in few days to perform that Commission. The Book published sometime ago by the Archbishop of Cambray, having been sent to the Pope by the Court of France, where the said Archbishop is Charged with favouring the Quietists, a Congregation of Cardinals was appointed to Examine the said Book, who have met several times, and are much divided in their Opinions concerning it. Orders have been given to the Pope's Gallies that are to join the Venetian Fleet this Summer, to put to Sea with all possible Expedition. We hear from Naples, That the Duke of Medina Celi is continued Viceroy of that Kingdom for 3 years longer. The Prince of Belvidera has lately taken Orders, which has occasioned a Report, That the Pope has promised him a Cardinal's Cap.

Leghorne, May 26. This week the *James*, laden with Fish, and the *Isabella*, laden with Hides, came into this Port both from Ireland; as also, the *Resolution*, Captain Croncker Commander, from Lisbon, and the *Ruth*, Captain Archer, with Bale Goods. The *Thomas and Ann*, Captain Gibbs Commander, is ready to sail for London. We have Advice by some Barks from Algiers, That the Plague is broke out in those Parts.

Milan, May 28. The Prince of Vaudemont, our Governor, arrived here last Saturday. He was met at Tortona, a Place on the Frontiers of this State by the Marquis of Leganez, and at Pavie by Deputies from our City and Senate, and from the other Cities of this Dutchy; and since his arrival, he has received the Visits and Compliments of Cardinal Caccia, the Foreign Ministers, and all the Persons of Quality that are in Town.

Warsaw, May 30. The Emperor having Communicated to this Court the Proposals made by the Turks for setting on Foot a Treaty of Peace, and desired the King would send Ambassadors to Vienna with the necessary Powers to this effect, the Senate here have been assembled to consider thereof, but have not yet taken any Resolution in this Matter. The Queen-Dowager has acquainted the King, that she lies under an Obligation to go to Rome, to perform a Vow she lately made, and desires she may have leave to depart out of this Kingdom accordingly, which has been likewise considered by the Senate, but nothing yet resolved. The Primate seems still unwilling to take the Oath of Fidelity to the King before the meeting of the General Diet, but would be allowed in the mean time to Sit and Vote in the Senate; This the King and the rest of the Senators will not consent to, and the Cardinal finding he cannot gain this Point, will in all probability yield it.

The Differences and Animosities in Lithuania are much encreased since the Assault made on the Deputies from the Discontented Nobility, in their Journey hither; And a Party of Prince Sapieha's Men have lately plundered the Suburbs of the City of Wilda, because of their Adhering to the Interests of the Sieur Oginsky. At the same time the Army in Lithuania take part with their General Prince Sapieha, and have sent Deputies to Court to make Complaints against the Sieur Oginsky, as well as to sollicit the Payment of their Arrears; which has been already granted to the Forces of Poland, to Enable them to take the Field this Summer against the Turks. The late Troubles in this Kingdom have much hindered the Preparations for the next Campaign, especially the providing the necessary Magazines, the want whereof may prove a great obstacle to the Design of Besieging Caminier. However, the King's Forces continue their march towards Russeland; and those which came from Prussia are arrived in the Neighbourhood of this place, where they will stay a few days to refresh themselves. The Letters from Lemberg of the 14th say, The Tartars have lately supplied Caminier with Provisions, and afterwards made an Incurision into the Territories of this Kingdom, but had not time to commit the Spoil they intended, being alarmed by the notice they had of the march of some of our Forces, and retiring thereupon in great haste and disorder.

Vienna, May 31. The Imperial Court continues at Laxembourg, where the Prince of Lorraine, Bishop of Osnabrug, lately received from the Emperor, the Investiture of the Fiefs belonging to that Bishoprick. Don Pathisco de Sousa, Envoy of Portugal, has had his Audience of Leave of their Imperial Majesties, and intends to go hence the next week. An Express is arrived here from Poland, with an Account, That all Matters are accommodated with the Cardinal Primate, and the Gentlemen of his Party, which puts the King of Poland very much at Ease, and will Enable him to pursue with greater Vigour the War against the Turks. A great Train of heavy Cannon is preparing here in order to be forthwith sent to Peter Waradin. Several Recruits, and other Forces, pass daily by this place in their way to Hungary; and Orders are given for providing the Magazines there with all things necessary for the Subsistence of the Army. Our Letters from Peter Waradin say, Some Turkish Horse are come to Nissa, and that their Foot are gathering about Belgrade; and that on Advice, that the Turks of Belgrade came frequently in their Sacks towards Titul, to alarm the Country, the Baron of Nheim, who Commands at Peter Waradin, had sent 3 Barks with Soldiers along the Danube to observe them. We have an Account from Transylvania, That the Turks continue with great diligence to repair the Fortifications of Vypalanka, and to build others along the Save, by which they intend to cover Belgrade: That they take the like Care to provide for the security of Temeswar, and are getting ready a great quantity of Provisions for

for the use of that Garison, which will be Convoyed thither by a strong Party of Turks, who are afterwards to make an Inroad in those Parts; upon Advice of which, the Baron of *Habersbourg* has posted some Forces at such Places as he judges most convenient to prevent their Design. The Turks have prepared a very great Convoy of Provisions and Ammunition, which they are sending to *Caminice*, under a Guard of 8000 Jannissaries and 25000 Tartars. Part of these Forces are to remain at *Caminice* to strengthen the Garison of that place, and the rest design to make an Incur-sion into *Poland*. Our last Advices from *Adriano-ple* say, The Grand Signior is gone to his Tents near that place, and has sent Orders for the speedy marching of his Troops, especially those which are expected from *Asia*.

Francfort, June 8. The Emperor's Envoy, Count *Beynembourg* went hence last Thursday for *Mentz*, in order to be present at the Evacuation of *Rhinfeldt*, which is appointed to be on the 10th instant. He lately received an Express from *Cassell*, with advice, That the Landgrave of *Hesse Cassell* makes some difficulty to deliver up the Town of *St. Goar*, which depends on that of *Rhinfeldt*, pretending to have a right to keep Garison there as he did before the War, tho' he is willing to restore the Sovereignty of that Place to the Landgrave of *Rhinfeldt*, who opposes this Pretension, alledging, That the keeping a Garison there formerly, was only at his Desire, and not out of any Right the Landgrave of *Hesse* had to the same; but it is believed, this Dispute will be soon adjusted.

Paris, June 9. The Bailly of *Noailles* intends to be going by the latter end of this week for *Mar-seilles*, to Command a Squadron of 7 Gallies designed to Cruise in the *Mediterranean*. It is much discoursed, That the Duke of *Lorraine* will make a Journey hither, and continue some time at this Court. Several French Regiments which are at present in *Alsace*, are ordered to march to *Dan-phine*, and to Quarter there. An Order of Council has been lately published, Commanding the Intendants of the several Provinces to oblige those who have laid in great quantities of Corn and Wine, in order to make an Advantage by it, in case these Provisions grow Scarce and Dear, as is much apprehended, to Sell them at the Current Market Prices. They write from *Stras-bourg*, That the *Sieur Vauban* has given Directions for Building a Fortress on this side the *Rhine* over-against *Brisack*. It is said he will also cause some new Fortifications to be added to the Town of *Colmar*, and several small Forts to be built along the *Rhine* on the *Alsace* side, as far as *Philipsburg*.

Brussels, June 12. Thirty two great Guns have lately been taken out of our Arsenal and sent to *Luxemburg*, with 8 Mortars from *Mechlen*, and a considerable quantity of Provisions and Ammu-nition for the Service of that Garison. The *Sieur Bronckhoven* intends shortly to be going for *Lis-le*, to Confer as a Commissioner on the part of *Spain*, with those sent thither by the French King, touch-ing the Limits of the French and Spanish Ter-ritories in the *Netherlands*. We hear from the French Foot have lately been Disbanded at *Arras*, and the best Soldiers Incorporated in the Regi-ments that are kept on Foot; That at *Tournay*, half of the Regiment of *Sorbeck* has been Dismiss'd, and that the like was doing in other Places.

Hague, June 13. N. S. The *Sieur Bonrepas*, Am-bassador from *France*, is returned from *Aix la Cha-pelle*, and will now shortly make his publick Entry. The *Sieur de Chamilly*, who is going Ambassador from the French Court to the King of *Denmark*, is expected here to-morrow in his way thither.

The Count *de Goes*, Envoy from the Emperor to the States General, has Notified his Arrival to the several Ministers Residing here, and has thereupon received the usual Visits. Monsieur *Hop* is daily expected from *Amsterdam*, in order to begin his Journey to the Imperial Court, whither he is going to Reside on the part of this State. The Count *de Frise* is expected the next week, be-ing appointed by the King of *Denmark* to Re-side here in the Room of Monsieur *Lenthe*. Mon-sieur *Geldermalsen*, who was sent by the States to view the Fortifications of *Grave* and *Nimeguen*, and to give Directions for Repairing the same, is re-turned, and has given the States an Account of his Journey.
