The Turks have prepared a very great Convoy of Provisions and Ammunition, which they are sending to Caminice, under a Guard of 8000 Jannisaries and 25000 Tartars. Part of these Forces are to remain at Caminies to strengthen the Garison of that place, and the rest design to make an Incursion into Poland. Our last Advices from Adrianople say, The Grand Signior is gone to his Tents near that place, and has sent Orders for the speedy marching of his Troops, especially those which are expected from Asia.

Francfort, June 8. The Emperor's Envoy, Counc

Beynembourg went hence last Thursday for Mentz, in order to be present at the Evacuation of Rhinfelds. which is appointed to be on the 10th instant. lately received an Express from Cassell, with advice That the Landgrave of Helfe Caffell makes some difficulty to deliver up the Town of St. Goar, which depends on that of Rhinfeldt, pretending to have a right to keepGarison there as he did before the War, tho he is willing to restore the Soveraignty of that Place to the Landgrave of Rhinfeldt, who opposes this Pretention, alledging, That the keeping a Garison there formerly, was only at his Delire, and not out of any Right the Landgrave of Hesse had to the same; but it is believed, this Dis-

pute will be soon adjusted.

Paris, June 9. The Bailly of Noailles intends to be going by the latter end of this week for Marfilles, to Command a Squadron of 7 Gallies de-figned to Cruise in the Mediterranean. It is much discoursed, That the Duke of Lorraine will make a Journey hither, and continue some time at this Court. Several French Regiments which are at present in Alface, are ordered to march to Danphine, and to Quarter there. An Order of Council has been lately published, Commanding the Intendants of the several Provinces to oblige those who have laid in great quantities of Corn and Wine, in order to make an Advantage by it, in case these Provisions grow Scarce and Dear, as is much apprehended, to Sell them at the Current Market Prices. They write from Stragbourg, That the Sieur Vauban has given Directions for Building a Fortress on this side the Rhine overagainst Brifack. It is said he will also cause some new Fortifications to be added to the . Town of Colmar, and several small Forts to be built along the Rhine on the Alface fide, as far as Philipsh arg.

Bruffels, June 12. Thirty two great Guns have lately been taken out of our Arlenal and fent to Luxemburg, with 8 Mortars from Mechlen, and a confiderable quantity of Provisions and Ammunition for the Service of that Garison. The Sieur Bronekhoven intends shortly to be going for Life, to Confer as a Commissioner on the part of Spain, with those fent thither by the French King, touching the Limits of the French and Spanish Ter-titories in the Netherlands. We hear from the French Conquests, That above 40 Companies of French Foot have lately been Disbanded at Arras, and the best Soldiers Incorporated in the Regiments that are kept on Foot; That at Tournay, half of the Regiment of Sorbick has been Difmis'd, and that the like was doing in other Places.

Hague, June 13. N. S. The Sieur Bonrepos, Ambassador from France, is returned from Aix la Chapelle, and will now shortly make his publick Entry. The Sieur de Ghamilly, who is going Ambassador I from the French Court to the King of Denmark, is expected here to morrow in his way thither. bre, he will be kindly received.
