Warsaw, June 2. N. S.

THE King intends to go hence in a day or two for Joansberg in Prussia, to have an Interview with the Elector of Brandenburg, who will come thither from Coningsberg. The Proposals which have been made to this Court for Treating a Peace with the Turks, are still under Consideration; And at the same time, the Preparations for carrying on the War go on with all possible Diligence, it not being probable any Treaty can be concluded before the Campaign is over. The King's Forces therefore continue their march towards Russia, and the Saxon and Danish Regiments that served in Hungary are also moving that way. Orders have been given for the Artillery designed for the use of our Army, to be sent forthwith to the place of Rendezvous; And a Train of heavy Cannon is expected from Saxony, with several Regiments the King has sent for from his Territories in Germany. The Affairs of Lithuania do now chiefly employ the Care of the Ministers at this Court, and the Accommodation of the Differences in that Dutchy is looked upon to be of such Consequence, that it is believed, the King of Poland will go thither in Person after he is returned from Joansberg, to Endeavour to reconcile the two Parties of Sapieha and Oginski, in case it cannot be effected by the Commissioners he has appointed for this purpose.

Vienna, June 4. Their Imperial Majesty's came on Saturday last to their Palace of La Favorita, and returned the same evening to Luxembourg, where the Court will continue most of the Summer. Mr. Schreyer, Secretary to my Lord Paget His Majesty of Great Britain's Ambassador at the Ottoman Port, who lately arrived here with some Dispatches relating to the Treaty of Peace proposed to be set on Foot between the Christian Princes and the Turks, is preparing to leave this place in order to his return to Adrianople: From whence we hear, That the English Ambassador intends to go with the Sultan into the Field, and it is very probable, the Peace may be treated of in Hungary. The Prince of Lorraine, Bishop of Osnabrug, having received the Investiture of the Imperial Fiefs belonging to the Bishoprick of Osnabrug, as well as Osnabrug, is gone to take Possession of them. Yesterday was held a great Council of War, in which several Resolutions were taken concerning the Campaign, which they propose to open about the end of this month. Above 200 Seamen are lately arrived from Hambourg, where they were Lified by the Sieur d'Assemburg, who is to Command the Emperor's Fleet on the Danube, and several more are shortly expected from that and other Places, who are to serve in the said Fleet, which waits only for its Complement of Men to fall down to Peter Waradin. The Ar-

tillery designed for the Service of our Army, is sent to Verismarton, whither all the Regiments are marching from their Quarters; and care is taken that the Magazines in those Parts be sufficiently Stored with all manner of Provisions for their Subsistence. Our Letters from Transilvania say, The Turks continue with great Earnestness to repair Vypalanka, being covered by a Body of 2000 Men, with some Cannon, to prevent our Parties insulting their Workmen. Our last Advices from Adrianople tell us, The Port had dispatched a Capigi Bassa to the Cham of Tartary, with a considerable Sum of Money, and Orders for his joining the Turkish Army this Summer with a greater number of Forces than was at first intended. We hear, the Bassa who is to Conduct the great Convoy designed for Caminiet, passed the Danube on the 10th of May with some Troops at Karfall, and was on his march to Badziack, where he will be joyned by all the Forces designed for that Service.

Frankfort, June 11. All things being ready for the Evacuation of Rhinsfeldt, it is not doubted but the same was performed yesterday. In the mean while, the Prince of Baden, and General Thungen, have sent two Officers to the French Governors of Philipsbourg, Fribourg, and Brisack, and the Fort of Keyl, to know what time they will fix for delivering up of those Places. The Emperor's Minister, Count Boyembourg, came hither lately from Mentz, but returned to that place this Evening, the Elector being expected there this night or to morrow from the Baths at Embser. We hear from Strasbourg, That the Deputies from the Elector Palatine were again come thither to Demand the Rolls and other Papers of State which the French carried away from Heidelberg, and are to restore according to the Treaty of Peace. The Marquis d'Uxelles is returned there from visiting the Frontier Places, and the Sieur de Vauban, Chief Ingenier, is shortly expected.

Hambourg, June 13. The Forces the King of Denmark is sending into the Service of the King of Poland, and who came by Sea from Copenhagen, landed this day at Travemunde, where, after they have refreshed themselves, and are joined by some others that are ordered thither from Oldembourg, they will continue their march to Saxony. We hear from Poland, That the Animosities in Lithuania continue to a great heighth, and that it was believed some of the King's Forces would be sent to that Dutchy, to oblige the two Great Factions to forbear all further Hostilities, and to secure the Quiet of the Country; And that the Queen Dowager of Poland was preparing for her Journey to Roma, where she intended to continue some time. Our Advices from Dantzicke say, The Sieur Desalleurs, Envoy from France to the Elector of Brandenburg, passing through that Place in his way to Koningsberg, two of the Magistrates went

to Compliment him, and offered him a Present of Wine, which he refused, and let fall some Expressions that shewed the Continuance of the King his Master's Displeasure against that City on account of their late Carriage towards the Prince of Conti. The Letters from Joansburg in Prussia of the 4th instant, say, The Elector of Brandenburg was going out of Town to meet the King of Poland, who was expected that afternoon, and would continue there till the 6th, when he intended to return to Warsaw, and his Electoral Highness to Comingsberg.

Paris, June 17. N. S. On the 14th instant my Lord Portland went to Versailles, and had a private Audience of the King in his Closer, where his Excellency took his Leave; as he did afterwards of the Dauphin, and of the Duke and Dutches of Orleans at St. Clou. The King has sent his Excellency his Picture richly set with Diamonds, as likewise a Present of all the Stamps and Prints Engraved at the Lowure, consisting in Twelve large Folio's, which last was brought him by the Abbot de Louvois, Library-Keeper to the King. And his Excellency has Presented to the King Nine very fine Horses. He intends to leave this place to morrow, and to stay two days with the Prince of Conde at Chantilly, and thence to continue his Journey to Dunkirke, and so to Calais, where he will Embark for England. The Sieur Vittemant, Rector of our University, the Abbot le Fevre, Major-General Puissegur, Lieutenant-Colonel of the King's Regiment, and the Sieur de Monvielle, Captain in the same Regiment, are appointed to attend the Dukes of Burgandy, Anjou, and Berry, in the Places of those who are removed on account of their favouring the Opinions contained in the Book, lately writ by the Archbishop of Cambray. We have Letters from Spain of the 22th of May, which say, His Catholick Majesty's Health daily mends; And that the Marquis de Harcourt, Ambassador from this Court, having in the Name of his most Christian Majesty, offered a Squadron of Gallies and Men of War to carry what Succours should be thought necessary for the Relief of Ceuta and Oran, the Court of Spain had not accepted of it, but had made the Ambassador a Compliment in Answer to his Memorial.

Dublin, June 2. The Lords Justices have caused a Proclamation to be published for Proroguing the Parliament of this Kingdom from the 7th day of June instant, to the 5th of July next.

Plimouth, June 7. Yesterday the Honourable Mr. Gray, Governor of the Barbadoes, arrived here on Board His Majesty's Ship the Soldadoes Prize, in Company of His Majesty's Ships the Speedwell, Queenborough, and Rupert Prize, who will sail again this evening to pursue their Voyage to the West Indies.
