PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by treaty, capitulation, grant, usage, sufferance, or other lawful means His Majesty the King has jurisdiction in Egypt:

And whereas provision is made by the Egypt Order in Council, 1930, S.R. & O. 1930 (No. 744), p. 539 (in this Order referred to as "the Principal Order"), for the exercise of such jurisdiction:

And whereas by the Egypt (Red Sea Light Dues) Order in Council, 1932, S.B. & O. 1932 (No. 864), p. 522, provision was made for the levying of certain light dues on British ships passing through the Suez Canal after or before a voyage through the Red Sea:

And whereas it is now desirable to reduce the Dues prescribed in the Order in Council of 1932 aforesaid:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in this behalf by the Foreign Jurisdiction Acts, 1890 and 1913, 53 Å 54 Vict. c. 37 and 3 & 4 Geo. V. c. 16 or otherwise in His Majesty vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered as follows:—

1. This Order may be cited as the Egypt (Red Sea Light Dues) Amendment Order in Council, 1935, and shall be read as one with the Egypt (Red Sea Light Dues) Order in Council, 1932, the Principal Order and with any Order amending the latter.

2. Article 2 of the Egypt (Red Sea Light Dues) Order in Council, 1932, is hereby amended by the substitution of the words "one twentieth of one penny" for the words "one sixteenth of one penny".

3.—(1) This Order shall come into force on the fifteenth day of March, 1935.

(2) This Order shall be published in notices exhibited in the London Gazette and in Ilis Majesty's Consulates in Egypt.

Majesty's Consulates in Egypt. (3) Proof shall not in any proceeding or matter be required that the provisions of the preceding paragraph of this article have been complied with nor shall any act or proceeding be invalidated by any failure to comply with these provisions.

The Right Honourable Sir John Simon, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein.
