WHEREAS by section 18 of "The Extradition Act, 1870", it is among other things enacted that if, by any law or Ordinance made after the passing of the said Act by the legislature of any British possession, provision is made for carrying into effect within such possession the surrender of fugitive criminals who are in, or suspected of being in, such British possession, Her Majesty may, by Order in Council applying the said Act in the case of any foreign state, or by any subsequent Order, either...

Suspend the operation within any such British possession of the said Act, or of any part thereof, so far as it relates to such foreign state, and so long as such law or Ordinance continues in force there and no longer;

Or direct that such law or Ordinance, or any part thereof, shall have effect in such British possession, with or without modifications and alterations, as if it were part of the said Act:

And whereas by an Ordinance numbered 6 of 1877, enacted by the Legislature of the Gold Coast Colony, the short title of which was "The Extradition Ordinance", it was provided that all powers vested in and acts authorized or required to be done by a police magistrate or any justice of the peace in relation to the surrender of fugitive criminals in the United Kingdom under "The Extradition Acts, 1870 and 1873", should be vested in and should in the Colony be exercised and done by any District Commissioner in relation to the surrender of fugitive criminals under the said Acts:

And whereas by an Order of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria in Council bearing data the 23rd day of November, 1877, it was directed that the said Extradition Ordinance, 1877, should have effect in the Colony of the Gold Coast as if it were part of the Extradition Act, 1870:

And whereas by an Ordinance numbered 8 of 1935, enacted by the Legislature of the Gold Coast Colony, the short title of which is "The Extradition Ordinance, 1935", it is provided that the Extradition Ordinance of the Gold Coast Colony shall be repealed and that "all powers vested in, and acts authorized or required to be done by, a police magistrate in relation to the surrender of fugitive criminals in the United Kingdom under the Extradition Acts, 1870 to 1932, are hereby vested in, and may in the Colony be exercised and done by, any District Magistrate in relation to the surrender of fugitive criminals under the said Acts" and that "all powers vested in and acts authorized or required to be done by any justice of the peace in relation to the surrender of fugitive criminals in the United Kingdom under the Extradition Acts, 1870 to 1932, are hereby vested in and may in the Colony be exercised and done by any District Magistrate or District Commissioner in relation to the surrender of fugitive criminals under the said Acts ":

And whereas it is further provided by the said Ordinance that the said Ordinance shall not come into operation until His Majesty shall by Order in Council direct that the said Ordinance shall have effect within the said Colony as if it were part of "The Extradition Act, 1870", but that the said Ordinance shall thereafter come into operation as soon as such Order in Council shall have been published in the Gold Coast Gazette and with effect from the date of such publication:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, in pursuance of "The Extradition Act, 1870", and in exercise of the power in that behalf in the said Act contained, doth by this present Order, by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, revoke the said Order of the 23rd day of November, 1877, without prejudice to anything lawfully done thereunder and to the continuance and completion as if this Order had not been made of any proceedings pending at the date of this Order, and direct that the said Ordinance.
