PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

Persons Act, 1933, it is, amongst other things, enacted that His Majesty may, by Order in Council, specify as respects the metropolitan police court area the places (which, notwithstanding anything in the Metropolitan Police Courts Acts, 1839 and 1840 (2 & 3 Vict. c. 71 and 3 & 4 Vict. c. 84), may be places other than police courts) in which juvenile courts are to sit, and assign as a division to each such place such portion of that area as may be specified in the Order: and direct the manner in which for the purposes of the constitution of a juvenile court in that area two justices of the peace for the County of London shall be selected from the panel of such justices nominated from time to time by the Secretary of State:

And whereas such an Order in Council may contain such supplemental, incidental and consequential provisions as appear to His Majesty in Council to be necessary for the purposes of the Order and such Orders in Council may by section 105 of the said Act be revoked or varied by a subsequent Order in Council:

And whereas an Order in Council was made on the fifth day of October, 1934 (S.R. & O. 1934 (No. 1132)):

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to

Order, and it is hereby ordered accordingly, that-

- (1) the Order in Council made on the fifth day of October, 1934, is hereby varied by the substitution in the schedule of the words "Stamford House, Goldhawk Road, Shepherds Bush, W.12" for the words "Lindsey Hall, The Mall, Notting Hill Gate, W.8."
- (2) This Order shall come into force on the 15th July, 1935.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by the Extradition Acts, 1870 (33 & 34 Vict. c. 52) to 1932 (22 & 23 Geo. V. c. 39), it was, amongst other things, enacted that, where an arrangement has been made with any foreign State with respect to the surrender to such State of any fugitive criminals, His Majesty may, by Order in Council, direct that the said Acts shall apply in the case of such foreign State; and that His Majesty may, by the same or any subsequent Order, limit the operation of the Order, and restrict the same to fugitive criminals who are in or suspected of being in the part of His Majesty's dominions specified in the Order, and render the operation thereof subject to such conditions, exceptions and qualifications as may be deemed expedient:
