WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Union of Benefices Measure, 1923, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Scheme bearing date the 12th day of December, 1935, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting in pursuance of the Union of Benefices Measure, 1923, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for the sale of certain land which was formerly the site of a Church at Colnbrook and is situate in the New Parish of Saint Thomas, Colnbrook, in the Diocese of Oxford:

"Whereas the said Church, which was a consecrated building, was demolished in or about the year 1847 and it has been represented to us and it appears to be desirable that the site thereof should now be sold:

"Now, therefore, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, with the consent of the Right Reverend Thomas Banks, now Bishop of Oxford (in testimony whereof he has hereunto set his hand), do humbly recommend and propose to Your Majesty as follows, that is to say:—

"1. That the site of the said Church and the ground annexed or belonging thereto (not being ground forming part of a Churchyard which has been used for burials) shall be sold and disposed of by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, at such time or times and in such manner in all respects as we shall deem expedient. Provided always that such sale or disposal shall be subject to the conditions and restrictions imposed by the said Union of Benefices Measure, 1923.

"2. That the net proceeds to arise from the sale or sales to be made by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, as aforesaid, after payment thereout of all costs and expenses of and in relation to such sale or sales and to the carrying into effect of this Scheme shall be held and invested by us for the benefit of the Benefice of Saint Thomas, Colnbrook.

"Provided always that this Scheme shall not take effect until the consents and approval which by the said Union of Benefices Measure, 1923, are made requisite to the sale under the powers conferred by that Measure of the site of any Church shall be obtained to the sale hereby proposed of the site of the said Church and of any ground annexed or belonging thereto.

"And provided also that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Union of Benefices Measure, 1923, or of any other Measure of the National Assembly of the Church of England or Act of Parliament."

And whereas drafts of the said Scheme have been duly published in accordance with the provisions of the said Union of Benefices Measure, 1923, and Notices have been transmitted to the persons or bodies entitled under the same Measure to receive Notice requiring any objections to such draft Scheme to be stated or transmitted in writing to the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners within the time prescribed in the Statutory Rules applicable to proceedings under the said Union of Benefices Measure, 1923:

And whereas the prescribed time has elapsed and no such objections have been so stated or transmitted to the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners:

And whereas public notice of the certification to His Majesty in Council of the said Scheme and the consent thereto in writing of the Bishop of Oxford has been duly given in the manner and within the time prescribed in the Statutory Rules aforesaid:

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to affirm the said Scheme and to order and direct that the said Scheme and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the date when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Measure.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Oxford.

WHEREAS the Right Reverend Arthur Cayley, Lord Bishop of Gloucester, has, under Section 26 of the Pluralities Act, 1838, made a Representation to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Cosmo Gordon, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, in the following terms:—

"We, Arthur Cayley, by Divine Permission Bishop of Gloucester, do in pursuance of the Twenty-sixth Section of the Pluralities Act, 1838, hereby represent to your Grace as follows:—

"1. There is in the County of Gloucester and our Diocese of Gloucester the Rectory or Benefice of Huntley the Parish whereof contains an estimated present population of about Three hundred and ninety-four. The net annual value of the Benefice arising from Tithe rent-charge grants from the Ecclesiastical Commissioners and Queen Anne's Bounty glebe lands fees and other sources is Three hundred and ninety-four pounds or thereabouts. The Parish Church of St. John the Baptist Huntley contains Three hundred and ninety sittings.

"2. There is also in the same County and Diocese the Rectory or Benefice of Taynton containing an estimated present population of about Four hundred and sixty-four. The net annual value of this Benefice arising from Tithe rent-charge grants from the Ecclesiastical Commissioners and Queen Anne's Bounty glebe lands fees and other sources is Four
