

from incumbrances and the said Gertrude Mary Jacques is therefore the Patron or person entitled to present or nominate to the said Benefice in case the same were now vacant:

"And whereas the said Gertrude Mary Jacques is desirous that the whole Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to the said Benefice of Burton Latimer should be transferred to and be vested in the Bishop of Peterborough for the time being:

"And whereas the Right Reverend Claude, now Bishop of Peterborough, is willing to accept such transfer, and in token of such his willingness and also in token that the same transfer has that consent of the Bishop of the Diocese which by the hereinbefore mentioned Acts or by some or one of them is made necessary he the said Claude, Bishop of Peterborough, has executed this Scheme as hereinafter mentioned:

"And whereas the transfer of the Patronage of the said Benefice of Burton Latimer which is hereinbefore mentioned and hereinafter recommended and proposed will in our opinion tend to make better provision for the cure of souls in the parish or district in or in respect of which the right of Patronage or Advowson so recommended and proposed to be transferred as aforesaid arises or exists, that is to say, in the Parish of Burton Latimer:

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said Gertrude Mary Jacques, being the person whose consent as Patron is required by the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts and of the Act of the 1st and 2nd years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 106 (in testimony of which consent she has signed and sealed this Scheme) and with the consent of the said Claude, Bishop of Peterborough (in testimony whereof he has signed this Scheme and sealed the same with his Episcopal Seal), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the whole Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to the said Benefice of Burton Latimer shall be transferred to the said Claude, Bishop of Peterborough, and his successors in the same Bishopric and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Claude, Bishop of Peterborough, and by his successors in the same Bishopric for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have

been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Peterborough.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Union of Benefices Measure, 1923, duly prepared, and laid before His late Majesty King George the Fifth in Council, a Scheme bearing date the 16th day of January, 1936, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting in pursuance of the Union of Benefices Measure, 1923, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for effecting the union of the Benefice (being a Vicarage) of Herodsfoot and the Benefice (being a Rectory) of Duloe, both of which Benefices are situate in the County of Cornwall and in the Diocese of Truro:

"Whereas Commissioners appointed at our request by the Right Reverend Walter, late Bishop of Truro, pursuant to the provisions of the said Union of Benefices Measure, 1923, to inquire into and report inter alia upon the union of the said two Benefices of Herodsfoot and Duloe duly made their Report to the said Bishop of Truro and therein recommended the union of the said two Benefices and the terms for effecting the union, and the said Bishop of Truro signified in writing his approval of the said Report:

"And whereas we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, have prepared this Scheme for the union of the said two Benefices based upon the terms recommended in the said Report:

"And whereas the said Benefice of Duloe is now full the Reverend Thomas Malcolm Layng being the present Incumbent thereof and the said Benefice of Herodsfoot is at present vacant:

"And whereas the Patronage of the said Benefice of Herodsfoot now belongs to the Incumbent for the time being of the said Benefice of Duloe:

"Now, therefore, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, with the consent of the Right Reverend Joseph Wellington, now Bishop of Truro (in testimony whereof he has signed this Scheme), and with the consent of the said Thomas Malcolm Layng (testified by his signing this Scheme), do humbly recommend and propose to Your Majesty as follows, that is to say:—

"1. That the said Benefice of Herodsfoot and the said Benefice of Duloe shall be permanently united together and form one Benefice with Cure of souls under the style of
