to the Civil Service Commissioners, when called upon to do so, the permission of his Commanding Officer to attend the examination, dated before the commencement of the competition, and given in accordance with such orders as may from time to time be issued.

Persons holding situations in the Civil Service must obtain the permission of the authorities of their Department to attend the Examination before the commencement of the competition.

Persons upon whose training for the occupation of teacher public money has been spent cannot be appointed until the consent of the appropriate education authority has been notified to the Civil Service Commissioners.

Candidates should take all three subjects in Section A; in Section B they may offer subjects up to a maximum mark of 600, provided that not more than four of the subjects numbered 9 to 14, or more than two of the subjects numbered 15 to 21, or more than two of the subjects

numbered 27 to 31 may be offered.

A candidate desiring to offer any of the subjects 28 to 31 must produce evidence satisfactory to the Civil Service Commissioners of laboratory training in an institution of university rank. For Geography, other equiva-

lent training will be required.

The test in Viva Voce, Section C, will be held at a later date than the examination in the other subjects; of the candidates who obtain the highest aggregate marks in these subjects a certain number, to be determined

by the Civil Service Commissioners, will be summoned for Viva Voce. The final order of merit among the candidates admitted to Viva Voce will be determined by their performance in the examination as a whole.

6. Candidates must obtain such an aggregate of marks in the examination as a whole, apart from the Viva Voce marks, as to satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners.

7. Candidates whose handwriting is not easily legible will suffer a deduction of marks

on that account. 8. When vacancies are offered for competition under more than one Department, candidates will be allowed to choose, according to their place on the list, between the several classes of vacancy available.

9. Applications for permission to attend an Examination must be made at such time and in such manner as the Civil Service Commis-

sioners may appoint.

10. A fee of £2 will be required from every applicant for permission to attend an Examination; this fee is not returnable in any circumstances. A further fee of £4, being the balance of the prescribed fee of £6, will be required from every candidate attending such Examination.

The Civil Service Commissioners further give notice that an Open Competitive Examination will be held in London under the foregoing Regulations, the written work commencing on the 7th July, 1936.

Not fewer than 20 vacancies for Assistant Inspectors of Taxes and 10 vacancies for Third Class Officers will be filled on the result of this examination, if so many candidates should be found to be qualified in all respects.

No person will be admitted to Examination from whom the Secretary of the Civil Service Commission has not received, on or before the 7th May, 1936, an application, in the Candidate's own handwriting, on a prescribed form, which may be obtained from the Secretary at once.
