

On arrival at Wolferton Station the Royal Coffin was taken from the Gun Carriage and placed in the Royal Train by the Bearer Party of the King's Company Grenadier Guards.

The Coffin was made of Oak cut on the Sandringham Estate, and was covered by the Royal Standard.

Guards of Honour of the Royal Navy, the Army, and the Royal Air Force were mounted at King's Cross Station and Westminster Hall.

On the arrival of the train at 2.30, the Royal Coffin was removed by an Officer and ten men of the King's Company Grenadier Guards and placed upon a Gun Carriage drawn by "F" Battery, Royal Horse Artillery.

The Imperial Crown was placed upon the Coffin, which was covered by the Royal Standard.

The Gun Carriage, flanked by the Bearer Party of the Grenadier Guards, was preceded by Mounted Police.

Mounted Police closed the Procession.

On arrival at Westminster Hall, where members of both Houses of Parliament were present, the Coffin was taken from the Gun Carriage by the Bearer Party of the King's Company Grenadier Guards, and was received by the Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord Great Chamberlain, the Earl Marshal, and the First Commissioner of Works, and carried to the Catafalque prepared for it in the following order:—



When the Royal Coffin had been placed upon the Catafalque, HIS MAJESTY THE KING, HER MAJESTY QUEEN MARY, and the other Royal Mourners stood at the head of the Coffin.

The Gentlemen at Arms and the Yeomen of the Guard took their customary places on either side.

The Lord Great Chamberlain, The Earl Marshal, the First Commissioner of Works, the Dean of Westminster, Garter, and Black Rod, took their stand at the foot of the Coffin.
