FOURTH DIVISION OF ESCORT, The Life Guards.

Yeomen of the Guard.

On arrival at the Chapel, the Representative Officers of Foreign Services, the General Officer Commanding the London District and his Staff, the Aides-de-Camp, and the other Naval, Military, and Air Force representatives ranged themselves on either side of the steps leading to the West Door of the Chapel, and proceeded into the Chapel at the end of the Procession. The Pursuivants and Heralds, and the Kings of Arms (except Garter), when the Procession reached the Choir, took their places on either side of the Entrance. Black Rod and Garter passed into the Choir.

At the West Door of the Chapel the Royal Remains were received by:—

The Archbishop of Canterbury.

The Archbishop of York.

The Bishop of Winchester, Prelate of the Order of the Garter.

The Bishop of Oxford, Chancellor of the Order of the Garter.

The Dean of Windsor, Register of the Order of the Garter,

with the Canons, Minor Canons, Lay Clerks and Choristers of St. George's Chapel.

The Procession moved up the Nave, headed by the Choir and Clergy, and the opening Sentences of the Burial Service were chanted by the Choir.

The Earl Marshal and the Lord Steward walked immediately in front of the Coffin, which was followed by The King, the other Members of the Royal Family, the Royal Representatives, and the remainder of the Procession.

His Majesty The King stood at the Head of the Coffin.

The Lord Steward took his place at the Foot of the Coffin.

The Lesson was read by The Bishop of Winchester. The Hymn "Abide with me" was then sung, and the Sentence "I heard a Voice from Heaven" was sung by the Choir.

The Prayers were read by The Archbishop of Canterbury and The Archbishop of York.

Sir Gerald W. Wollaston, Garter Principal King of Arms, pronounced the Styles of His late Most Sacred Majesty of Blessed Memory;

"Thus it hath pleased Almighty God to take out of this transitory life, unto His Divine Mercy, the late Most High, Most Mighty, and Most Excellent Monarch George the Fifth, by the Grace of God, of Great Britain, Ireland, and the British Dominions beyond the Seas, King, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India, and Sovereign of the Most Noble Order of the Garter.

"Let us humbly beseech Almighty God to bless with long life, health and honour, and all worldly happiness, the Most High, Most Mighty, and Most Excellent Monarch, our Sovereign Lord Edward the Eighth, now, by the Grace of God, of Great Britain, Ireland, and the British Dominions beyond the Seas, King, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India, and Sovereign of the Most Noble Order of the Garter."

"GOD SAVE THE KING."

The Choir sang "God be in my head and in my understanding" and the Archbishop of Canterbury then pronounced the Benediction.

The King's Company Colour of the Grenadier Guards was handed to The King by Colonel G. E. C. Rasch, D.S.O., and placed on the coffin by His Majesty.

As the sentence of committal to the grave was read by the Archbishop of Canterbury, earth was cast upon the Coffin by The King, from a silver casket, handed to His Majesty by the Hon. Sir Derek Keppel, G.C.V.O., K.C.B., C.M.G., C.I.E., Master of the Household to His late Majesty.

Knights of the Most Noble Order of the Garter were present in St. George's Chapel.
