Venice, Sept. 12. N. S.

THE Senate have appointed Signior Molino, who was formerly Generalissimo of the Forces of this Republick, and Signior Razzini, at present their Ambassador at the Emperor's Court, to be their Commissioners and Plenipotentiaries for the Treaty of Peace with the Turks, wherein they are to be assisted by Signior Nicolosi, one of their Secretaries, who is already gone to Vienna, and Signior Molino will follow in a few days in Company of Signior Loredano, who is to succeed in the Embassy at that Court. Several Recruits are arriv'd at the Lido, in order to embark on the Convoy which is preparing here for the Levant. We expect with impatience to hear from our Fleet, having for some time had no other Advices concerning them, than by a Vessel come in here this week from Smirna, the Master whereof says, That when he sailed from thence, they were cruising near the Island of Stanchio in the Archipelago; and that the Ships from Barbary, after having been several days at the Isle of Facchi, were gone to join the Ottoman Fleet, who 'twas believed would, as soon as they had received this Reinforcement, come out of the Dardanelles; so that we may shortly hear of some Action on that side. We have Letters from Dalmatia of the 28th of August, which say, That the Bassa of Bosnia had appeared with a strong Body of the Enemy's Troops on the Frontiers of Croatia, upon which the Proveditor Marcello had assembled the Venetian Forces in those Parts, and intended to march to Mantchi to observe the Enemy.

Turin, Sept. 6. The Duke of Savoy went from hence last Thursday for Mondovi; and after having made a short stay there, he intends to go and visit the Garison of Pignerol. Orders are given for repairing our Citadel, which received great Damage by the blowing up of the Magazine that was set on fire by Lightning some Weeks ago, and divers Workmen have been sent for from several of the neighbouring Cities, to be employ'd therein.

Lemberg, Sept. 4. The King of Poland designs in a few days to go from hence to Halitz, where most of his German Forces (which, when all join'd together, will consist in 30000 Men,) are already arrived. The Army of the Crown continues in the mean time encamped near Monasterzek. We hear, the Garison of Caminiec make frequent Excursions on our Frontiers, notwithstanding they have often been re-ull'd with Loss by our Forces which are posted in those Parts. The Queen-Dowager, with Prince Constantine her Son, have taken Leave of the King, and are gone to Javarow, in order to set out from thence on their Journey to Rome. Prince Alexander, who was lately made Captain of the King's Guards, continues here, and will attend him during the Campaigne.

Vienna, Sept. 13. The Court continues at Ebersdorf. But their Imperial Majesties intend to come hither to morrow, to assist at the Celebration of the Anniversary Feast for the Deliverance of this City from the Siege in the year 1683, and the next day they will return to Ebersdorf. The Emperor's Plenipotentiaries for the Peace with the Turks, are preparing their Equipages in order to their Journey to the Frontiers, which they will begin in a few days; and in the mean while they have frequent Conferences with the Emperor's Ministers, and with those of the Republick of Venice and the Czar of Muscovy, concerning the Matters they are to Treat of. A farther Supply of Ammunitions was sent some days ago down the Danube for the Service of our Army in Hungary, and Magazines are provided on the Frontiers of Transilvania and Upper Hungary, to supply them from time to time with Provisions and Ammunition during their stay on that side the Danube. Our last Advices from the Army say, That the Bridges over the Theysse being ready, they passed that River the 3d Instant, and encamped over-against Titul, and the Artillery and Baggage followed the next day. Prince Eugene, who commands them, had posted Lieutenant-Colonel Nicubourg and the Count of Thierheim with a Party of 600 Men on each side the Bridge over the Morass of Pillowar, as well for the Security of that Pass, as to maintain the Communication with Peter-Wradin. General Spilberg was left with a Regiment near Titul, and had Orders to build some Redoubts to cover that place, and they were making a Fort likewise to secure their Bridge over the Theysse; Prince Eugene had sent the Quartermasters-General Cref-tien and Conty to mark out a Camp near Bergskerk, intending to march thither in 2 or 3 days. They had been some days without any certain Advices of the Motion of the Enemy, several Parties which were sent out to make Prisoners, and to get Intelligence, not being yet returned; but it's believed, they are still encamped near Semendria. The Turkish Fleet on the Danube continues near Belgrade.

Francofort, Sept. 21. The Elector Palatine is expected here next week from Weynheim, and great Preparations are making for his Reception. He intends in his way hither to make a Visit to the Landgrave of Hesse Darmstadt, and having passed some days here, to go and view that part of his Territories which is situate along the Rhine. His Electoral Highness has given Directions for making some Fortifications at Mannheim. The Elector of Mentz is gone from Mentz to Aschaffenburg.

Hamburg, Sept. 23. The Exportation of Corn has been forbid here, by reason of the like Prohibition in Denmark, the Country of Lunenburg, and other Neighbouring Parts. We hear from Caralserson, That the King of Sweden, with the Queen-Mother and the rest of the Court,

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were come thither to accompany the Duke and Duchesse of *Holftein Gottorp*, who designed to embark there in a few days, in order to their return home.

Loo, Sept. 25. Sir *Joseph Williamson*, his Majesty's Ambassador Extraordinary at the *Hague*, came thither yesterday to receive His Majesty's Commands before his Departure for *Cell*; as did likewise Mr. *Hil*, His Majesty's Envoy to the Elector of *Baravia*, from *Flanders*. To-morrow part of His Majesty's Servants and Equipages are to set out for *Cell*. And His Majesty continues his Resolution, of beginning his Journey thither next Tuesday, being the 30th Instant.

Hague, Sept. 26. Deputies from the several Colleges of the Admiralty are arrived here, to confer with those of the States; and it's said, they will receive Directions for the Building of 13 new Men of War. The Baron of *Bloemberg*, Envoy from the Duke of *Courland*, had this week his Audience of Leave of the States-General, from whom he received the usual Present, and is set out from hence on his return home. The Pensioner of *Holland*, who went some days ago to *Loo*, is expected back here in 4 or 5 days.

Paris, Sept. 27. N. S. The Court returned to *Versailles* the 24th of this Month from *Compiègne*. The Earl of *Jersey*, Ambassador Extraordinary from the King of *England*, having desired a private Audience, and this day being appointed for it, his Excellency is accordingly gone to *Versailles*, being accompanied by Monsieur de *Saintot* Introducer of Ambassadors, and Mr. *Prior* Secretary of the Embassy. Monsieur d'*Odyck*, Ambassador Extraordinary from the States-General, having obtained Leave to return home, is preparing for his Journey, and intends to take his Audience of Leave in a few days. The King's Journey to *Fontainebleau* holds for the 3d of the next Month; and the Marriage of Mademoiselle d'*Orleans* and the Duke of *Lorraine* will be celebrated there the 12th, by which time the Courier is expected back with a Dispensation from *Rome*. They write from *Compiègne*, that the last of the Forces which were encamped near that place, marched from thence the 25th Instant. This Court has made a new Regulation of Commerce and Navigation in the French Isles in *America*, by which they forbid all Strangers to trade thither. The Business about settling the Dutch Commerce, is quite at a stand for the present. Our Letters from *Machid*, dated the 9th of this Month, give an account. The King of *Spain* was so well recovered of his last Illness, that he was abroad with the Queen the day before; and there was a Discourse of his removing to *Tolcdo* for the change of Air.

Plymouth, Sept. 16. Vice-Admiral *Aylmer*, with the Squadron of His Majesty's Ships under his Command, passed by this Port last night on their Voyage to the *Streights*, having a fair Wind.

Deale, Sept. 18. Yesterday His Majesty's Ship the *Tyger* sailed from hence, to cruize off of *North-Yarmouth* for the Security of our Fishery there.

Note, That the Buoy upon the East-end of the *Red-Sand*, and all the other Buoys not here mentioned, are continued in their Places, for Marks to such as may make use of the Old Channel.
