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Genova, Sept. 21. N. S.

**T**HE Squadron of French Galleys, commanded by the Bailly of *Novilles*, arrived here yesterday from *Naples*, and to morrow they will sail again for *Marselles*.

*Lemberg, Sept. 17.* The Forces of this Crown marched on the 8th of this Month from *Mnasterzyck* to *Podnize*, but were hardly encamped when the Tartars advanced with their whole Force, being about 5000 Men, and attack'd them; our Troops were at first put into some Disorder, and the Enemy set fire to the Suburbs of the Town of *Podnize*, and having taken some of our Baggage, and several Prisoners, retired again. The next day the Poldanders put themselves in order of Battle, and the Tartars renewed the Engagement with a great deal of Fury; It lasted 8 hours, and our Troops, who were not above 7000 strong, defended themselves very well, and at last the Enemy retired towards *Caminiec*. We have yet no particular Account of the Number of the Slain, and of the Prisoners on either side, only 'tis said, that on ours several Officers are missing. The King was then at *Brezesnau* with his German Forces, and having received Advice of this Action, gave Orders immediately for the Army to march to join the Forces of *Poland*. Part of the Forces of *Lithuania*, commanded by General *Willinsky*. are on their March to do the like.

*From the Imperial Camp near Berzkerk, Sept. 19.* On the 13th of this Month our Foot repass'd the *Bzgle*, as the Horse did the 14th, and the Army encamped on the other side that River. The same day we received an Account from *Peter-Waradin*, that the Ottoman Army commanded by the Grand Visier, encamped the 13th Instant near *Bizgrade*, where the Cham of *Tartary* arrived some days before; That they were encamped along the *Save*, and were making a Bridge of Boats over that River, and had repaired their Bridge over the *Danube*, and sent a Detachment of 4000 Men on this side the River to guard the same. On the 16th Colonel *Deak*, who was sent two days before with a Party of *Hussars* towards *Temeswaer*, returned to the Camp, and brought an Account, that he had engaged a Party of that Garrison, and taken some Prisoners, who informed him, That Provisions were grown very scarce there, and that they expected to be shortly supplied from *Belgrade*. That day a Detachment was sent with Fascines to repair the Ways between the Camp and *Sablia*, from whence we receive most of our Provisions, and another Party of 300 Men was commanded to guard the Bridge of Boats over the *Tayffe*, which keeps the Communication with that Place, and some Troops were posted likewise along the River side to secure the Passage thither by Water. On the 17th, Prince *Eugene* of *Savoy* having received Advice from the Turkish Army near *Belgrade*, that a strong Party was gone from their Camp with a considerable Supply of Ammu-

munition and Provisions towards *Temeswaer*, and were to pass over the *Danube* the 16th, left the Command of all the Foot and a Detachment of 1600 Horse to General *Heister*, and went himself with all the rest of the Horse to endeavour to intercept this Convoy.

*Vienna, Sept. 27.* My Lord *Paget's* Secretary is come hither again from *Belgrade*, to acquaint this Court with his Excellency's arrival at that Place; and has brought a Message from the Grand Visier concerning the Negotiations for a Peace, which shews the good Disposition they are in on that side to bring the same to a speedy Conclusion; whereupon the Ambassadors for the Emperor, *Venice*, and *Muscovy*, are ordered to hasten their Departure, and accordingly they will in two or three days begin their Journey to *Hungary*, their Equipages being already sent away. An Express arrived here from the Palatine of *Pofin*, the King of *Poland's* Ambassador for the said Treaty, with an Account of his Arrival at *Buda*. The Place of Congress is appointed between *Peter-Waradin* and *Salankemen*, and a House all of Wood is building there for that purpose, which is so contrived, that all Dispute about the Rank in the Room where they are to meet, may be avoided. Our Advices from *Hungary* say, The Imperial Army, commanded by Prince *Eugene* of *Savoy*, continues encamped at *Berkerke*, and the Turks near *Belgrade*. The Letters from *Transilvania* give an Account, that the Body of Forces commanded by General *Rabutin* marched the 10th of this Month from *Deva* (where they had continued some days) to *Dobra*; the 11th they proceeded to *Wintzen*, and the 12th they encamped between *Mullenbach* and *Reismark*. These Letters add, that the Garrison of *Temeswaer* was in great want of Provisions. We have Advice by the way of *Valachia*, that the Muscovites have made an Iruption in *Tartary*, and have defeated a considerable Body of Tartars who would have opposed them.

*Francfort, Octob. 5.* The Elektor Palatine left this Place the 29th of the last Month, and is returned to *Weynheim*. The Evacuation of *Brisac* being fixed for the 7th Instant, Prince *Lewis* of *Baden* is gone thither from *Walduth*, where he has continued some days; and after having taken Possession of that Place, he intends to visit *Fryburg*, *Rhinfeldt*, and the Fort of *Kiel*.

*Gow, Octob. 8.* His Majesty continues at this Place with the Duke of *Cell*. The Elektor of *Hanouer* is expected here this evening. My Lord *Lexington* is come to *Linghen* in his way hither.

*Brussels, Octob. 9.* The Electores of *Bavaria* returned hither last night from *Holland*, and was met about a Mile out of Town by the Elektor, accompanied by several Persons of Quality. Monsieur *Dyckvelt* has been to confer with the Pensioner of *Holland* at *Moorajck*, and is come back hither. The States of *Brabant* are assembled, to consider of raising the Supply demanded of them. The Baron *d'Ire* is on his Departure for *Paris*, whither he
