

the train to be three feet on the ground; the coronet to be according to her degree, viz., a circle or rim with six silver balls upon the same.

That the robe or mantle of a Viscountess be like that of a Baroness, the cape to be powdered with two rows and a half of ermine, the edging of the mantle two inches in breadth, and the train a yard and a quarter; the coronet to be according to her degree, viz., a circle with sixteen silver balls thereon.

That the robe or mantle of a Countess be as above, the cape to be powdered with three rows of ermine, the edging three inches in breadth, and the train a yard and a half; the coronet to be according to her degree, viz., a circle with eight silver balls raised upon points or rays, with small strawberry leaves between.

That the robe or mantle of a Marchioness be as above, the cape to be powdered with three rows and a half of ermine, the edging four inches in breadth, the train a yard and three-quarters; the coronet to be according to her degree, viz., a circle with four strawberry leaves and four silver balls raised upon points of the same height as the leaves alternately.

That the robe or mantle of a Duchess be as above, the cape to be powdered with four rows of ermine, the edging five inches in breadth, the train two yards; the coronet to be according to her degree, viz., a circle with eight strawberry leaves, all of equal height.

And that the caps of all the said coronets be of crimson velvet, turned up with ermine, with a gold tassel on the top.

THE Earl Marshal's Orders concerning the Dress to be worn by Peeresses with their Robes of Rank at Their Majesties' Coronation.

The Dress worn by a Peeress consists of a Kirtle of crimson velvet, bordered all round with a narrow edging of miniver pure, scalloped in front, plain otherwise. The Kirtle, which may be fastened down the back or in front, opens from the waist widening gradually down to the ground. It may be gathered back in three festoons, each tied with a bow of gold tinsel. The sleeves should be about nine inches long, and have two narrow rows of miniver, below which are five lappets varying in length, the outer one three inches, the inner one one inch, each edged in a similar manner with miniver. White lace sleeves may be worn below these lappets.

The Kirtle is worn over the usual full court dress, without train: the petticoat (or skirt) should be white or slightly cream coloured,

with lace, embroidery, or brocade, in accordance with the taste of the Peeress. The brocade must be of gold or silver, as it would not be correct to introduce any colour. Feathers and veils will not be worn, but a tiara must be worn.

Jewels may be worn round the neck, on the bodice and on the petticoat.

Robes and Kirtles worn at previous Coronations may be worn at the forthcoming Coronation.
