

The Lord Chamberlain of the Household stood behind the King's Chair of State.

The Lord Steward of the Household passed to his seat as a Peer.

The Lord President of the Council stood near the North-east Pillar.

The Prime Ministers passed to the seats provided for them in the Choir.

The Archbishop of York passed to his seat on the North side of the Altar.

The Lord High Chancellor stood near the South-east Pillar.

The Archbishop of Canterbury proceeded to the Altar.

Windsor Herald, York Herald, and Maltravers Herald Extraordinary stood near the North-west Pillar.

THE QUEEN, with her Supporters and Attendants, preceded by Her Majesty's Lord Chamberlain and the Lords bearing her Regalia, passed on the North side of her Throne to her Chair of State on the South side of the Area, making her humble adoration, and stood by her chair until the arrival of His Majesty.

The Mistress of the Robes and the Ladies bearing Her Majesty's Train stood behind the Queen's chair, and supported Her Majesty's Train during the Ceremony as occasion required.

The Queen's Lord Chamberlain and the Lords who bore Her Majesty's Regalia stood near Her Majesty, the Lord Chamberlain on the right hand. The Bishops, her Supporters, stood on either side of Her Majesty.

The Serjeants at Arms passed to their places near the Theatre.

The Gentleman at Arms who guarded Her Majesty remained at the foot of the steps ascending to the Theatre.

The Ladies of the Bedchamber and the Women of the Bedchamber passed to the seats provided for them.

The Treasurer and the Private Secretary to the Queen passed to their seats.

Lancaster Herald, Somerset Herald, Chester Herald, and Richmond Herald stood near the South-west Pillar.

Lyon King of Arms, Ulster King of Arms, the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, and the Lord Mayor of London stood near the South-east Pillar throughout the Ceremony.

Clarenceux King of Arms and Norroy King of Arms stood near the North-east Pillar.

The High Constable of Scotland passed to his seat as a Peer.

The Lord High Steward of Ireland passed to his seat as a Peer.

The Lord Great Chamberlain, the Lord High Constable, and the Earl Marshal, with the Archbishop of Canterbury (after his devotions at the Altar), and Garter King of Arms, took their places near the South-east Pillar.

The Bishops bearing the Bible, the Chalice, and the Paten passed to their places on the North side of the Altar.

THE KING, with his Supporters and Attendants, preceded by the Lords bearing His Majesty's Regalia, passed on the South side of his Throne to his Chair of State on the South side of the Area, making his humble adoration, and their Majesties, after their private devotions (kneeling at their faldstools), took their respective seats. The Bishops, his Supporters, stood on either side of His Majesty: the Lords bearing the four Swords stood on His Majesty's right hand, the Sword of State being nearest to the Royal Person; the Lords bearing the rest of His Majesty's Regalia stood about the King's Chair; His Majesty's Train bearers and the Groom of the Robes stood behind His Majesty.

The Gentlemen at Arms who guarded His Majesty remained at the foot of the steps ascending to the Theatre.

The Master of the Horse and the Captain General of the King's Bodyguard for Scotland passed to their seats as Peers.

The Gold Stick in Waiting and the Vice-Admiral of the United Kingdom passed to their seats.

The Lord in Waiting passed to his seat as a Peer.

The Captain of the Honourable Corps of Gentlemen at Arms and the Captain of the Yeomen of the Guard passed to their seats as Peers.

The Keeper of His Majesty's Privy Purse and the Private Secretary to the King passed to their seats.

The Comptroller, Lord Chamberlain's office, the Crown Equerry, the Groom in Waiting, the Equerries to the King, the Silver Stick in Waiting, and the Field Officer in Brigade Waiting passed to their seats.
