the Bishop of Chelmsford has been duly given in the manner and within the time prescribed

in the Statutory Rules aforesaid:

And whereas no appeal has been made to His Majesty in Council within the period of one month after the date of the said public notice in accordance with the provisions of the said Measures against the said Scheme or any part thereof by any person who has made objection as aforesaid to the said draft Scheme:

And whereas the said Scheme has been

approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to affirm the said Scheme and to order that the Benefices therein recommended to be united shall be united to the extent and for the purposes recommended in the said Scheme and further to order and direct that the said Scheme and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the date when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Measures.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Chelmsford.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the 6th and 7th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 37, and of the Act of the 19th and 20th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 104, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Scheme, bearing date the 25th day of November, 1937, in the words and figures following, that is to

say:—
"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the 6th and 7th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 37, and of the Act of the 19th and 20th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 104, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for constituting a separate District for spiritual purposes to be taken partly out of the New Parish (sometime Consolidated Chapelry) of Saint Luke, Blakenhall, partly out of the New Parish (sometime Particular District) of the Holy Trinity, Ettingshall, and partly out of the Parish of Sedgley, all in the County of Stafford and in the Diocese of Lichfield:

"Whereas we are satisfied that the said New Parish of Saint Luke, Blakenhall, the said New Parish of the Holy Trinity, Ettingshall, and the said Parish of Sedgley, are Cures wherein or in parts whereof the provision for public worship and for pastoral superintendence is insufficient for the spiritual wants of the inhabitants thereof and it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular portions of the said New Parish of Saint Luke, Blakenhall, of the said New Parish of the Holy Trinity, Ettingshall, and of the said Parish of Sedgley which are hereinafter mentioned and described, should be constituted a separate District in the manner which is hereinafter set forth:

And whereas there is not at present within the limits of the said proposed separate District any consecrated Church or Chapel in use for

the purposes of Divine Worship:

"And whereas by an Order of the Court dated the 2nd day of November, 1936, and made in the matter of the Trusts of the Will of the late Henry Marson, deceased, and of the Will of the late Sarah Anne Marson, deceased, it is directed (inter alia) that a sum of £28,000 shall be paid to the Lichfield Diocesan Trust and shall be held by such Trust as a 'Stipend Fund' the income whereof shall be applied as to one half in paying the stipend of the Minister or Incumbent for the time being of the said proposed separate District (called in the said Order, 'the Rough Hills District '):

"And whereas the said sum of £28,000 is now held by the said Trust for the purpose aforesaid and the moiety of the income of the said Stipend Fund which will be available for the stipend of the Minister of the said proposed separate District when duly licensed thereto is

not less than £300 per annum:

"And whereas the Lichfield Diocesan Trust as the body in which the said Stipend Fund is vested has nominated to us the Bishop of Lichfield for the time being as the person to whom it is desired that the whole right of Patronage of the said proposed District and when such District shall have become a New Parish then of the said New Parish should be

assigned:

Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Edward Sydney, Bishop of Lichfield (in testimony whereof he has signed sealed this Scheme), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that all those portions of the said New Parish of Saint Luke, Blakenhall, of the said New Parish of the Holy Trinity, Ettingshall, and of the said Parish of Sedgley, which are described in the Schedule hereunder written, all which portions together with the boundaries thereof are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, shall, upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme as aforesaid, become and be constituted a separate District for spiritual purposes and that The District of the same shall be named Saint Martin, Rough Hills'.

And we further recommend and propose that the whole right of Patronage of the said District so recommended to be constituted and, when such District shall have become a New Parish as aforesaid then of such New Parish and the nomination of the Minister or Incumbent thereof shall without any assurance in the law other than this Scheme and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid, be assigned to and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Edward Sydney, Bishop of Lichfield, and

his successors for ever.
